From same-sex marriage in New Hampshire to payday loans in Kentucky, new state laws taking effect on New Year's Day will change the way people live. California becomes the first state to bar restaurants from cooking with trans fat - partially hydrogenated oils that have been linked to strokes and heart disease. Restaurants will be prohibited from using oils, margarines and shortening containing more than half a gram of trans fat per serving. Violators are subject to \$1,000 fines. Illinois becomes one of at least 18 states where it is illegal to send or receive text messages or e-mail while driving.

The Census Bureau kicks off its \$300 million campaign Monday to prod, coax and cajole the nation's more than 300 million residents to fill out their once-a-decade census forms. UCLA study says legalizing undocumented immigrants would help the economy Based on surveys done after the 1986 amnesty program, it concludes that even during the recession, legalizing undocumented workers would benefit the economy. Even during the ongoing recession, immigration reform legislation that legalizes undocumented immigrants would boost the American economy, according to a new study out of UCLA. The report said that legalization, along with a program that allows for future immigration based on the labor market, would create jobs, increase wages and generate more tax

revenue. Comprehensive immigration reform would add an estimated \$1.5 trillion to the U.S. gross domestic product over 10 years, according to the report.

### **NJ-MEDICAL MARIHUANA APPROVAL**

The New Jersey Assembly has approved a bill allowing chronically ill patients access to medical marijuana. The compromise bill now heads to the Senate, which had approved a less restrictive version. Gov. Jon Corzine supports the legislation and could sign it before leaving office next week. New Jersey would become the 14th state to allow medicinal marijuana use. The bill would allow patients with ailments like cancer, AIDS and multiple sclerosis to buy up to 2 ounces of marijuana a month at state-monitored dispensaries. Home growing would remain illegal, as would driving while high. Assemblyman Reed Gusciara, a bill co-sponsor, says New Jersey's Compassionate Use Marijuana Act would be the nation's strictest such law.

### **IMMIGRANTS TUITION**

Students who are illegal immigrants made personal plea to New Jersey lawmakers this week, urging them to pass the bill allowing them to get in state tuition rates. To be eligible, they would be required to pledge to take steps to legalize their immigration status. Ten states already have a law similar to the one New Jersey is trying to pass. Democrats are counting on momentum in the final days of governor Jon Corzine's administration since incoming republican governor-elect Chris Christie opposes the measure.

### **IMMIGRANTS DEATHS**

As Immigration Customs Enforcement (ICE) led raids continue unabated across the country, community based organizations, organized labor, immigration law and policy experts, and religious groups will host a press conference to call on the U.S. Department of Justice to immediately cease and initiate a comprehensive investigation into the dramatic rise in violence against immigrants, immigration raids & check points across the southland. On January the 4th a Border Patrol agent shot and killed an undocumented immigrant near Douglas, Arizona, after the deceased allegedly threw rocks at the immigration officer. Many legal U.S. citizens with birth certificates registered by midwives are reported to have denied entry by U.S. immigration authorities along the Mexico-U.S. border. Moreover, those who are denied had previously attempted to obtain U.S. issued passports but were denied because of official suspicion that their birth certificates had been obtained fraudulently.
