**DEPORTATION DECISION

A federal appeals court reopened the case Wednesday of a Bay Area man who was deported to Mexico in 2005 and struck down a regulation that prevented him from presenting evidence that his son, a U.S. citizen, had been diagnosed with mental illness just before he was sent out of the country. The Justice Department's rule applied to illegal immigrants who have been ordered deported but claim to have new evidence supporting their right to remain in the United States, such as recent family hardship. The regulation prohibited them from introducing such evidence after a judge ordered them deported.

Toyota Motor Corp. built its reputation in the U.S. as a maker of safe and dependable vehicles, but the quality of the Japanese automaker's fleet continues to be tarnished by serious safety recalls. Toyota said Thursday it is recalling 2.3 million vehicles in the U.S. to fix accelerator pedals with mechanical problems that could cause them to become stuck. The announcement comes just months after it recalled 4.2 million vehicles due to gas pedals that could become trapped under floor mats, causing sudden acceleration. That problem was the cause of several crashes, including some fatalities.

The U.S. government Tuesday banned hand-held "texting" by drivers of large commercial trucks and buses to avoid the danger of distracted driving. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood said in a statement the prohibition takes effect immediately. It follows a similar ban in December for drivers of federal government vehicles.

Toyota is suspending U.S. sales of eight recalled vehicle models to fix accelerator pedals that stick. As part of the plan, Toyota is halting production at five manufacturing facilities for the week of Feb. 1 to assess and coordinate activities. There are 2.3 million vehicles involved in the recall, which was announced last week. The Japanese automaker says the sales suspension includes the 2009-2010 RAV4, the 2009-2010 Corolla, the 2009-2010 Matrix, the 2005-2010 Avalon, the 2007-2010 Camry, the 2010 Highlander, the 2007-2010 Tundra and the 2008-2010 Sequoia.

Toyota says it is recalling 75,500 vehicles in China for the same gas pedal problem behind the U.S. and European recalls. Toyota Motor Corp. has Thursday informed Chinese authorities it will start a recall in February for RAV4 sport utility vehicles that were manufactured in China between March 2009 and January 2010, says spokeswoman Ririko Takeuchi. They use the same problem parts in accelerators that caused the recent spate of massive recalls in the U.S. Toyota said earlier Thursday it will also recall vehicles in Europe, although it has not said the number of vehicles involved.

Honda is recalling 646,000 Fit hatchbacks worldwide because of a glitch that could cause water to enter the power window mechanism, causing components to overheat. A spokeswoman says the recall affects the 2007-2008 models of the Fit, which is sold in other countries as the Jazz and City. The recall affects Asia, Latin America, Europe, South Africa and North America. About 140,000 vehicles are affected in the U.S. In South Africa, one person was killed last year in a vehicle fire related to the malfunction. The spokeswoman says no injuries have been reported in the U.S.

**TOYOTA GAS RECALL

Toyota Motor Corp. has told employees that it has figured out how to fix a problem with sticking accelerator pedals and will brief them on the details on Friday. The company said in an e-mail to employees obtained by The Associated Press that it presented the remedy to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The memo did not say when the repairs would make their way to customers. The company said on its Web site that engineers are working around the clock to fix the problem in eight of its models, including the top-selling Camry midsize sedan. The automaker and the company that makes the gas pedal systems says the accelerators rarely stick.
