Shooting of U.S. agents (ICE) in Mexico

Mexican and U.S. authorities are investigating the attack of two Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) special agents in San Luis Potosi, who were returning to Mexico City after meeting with U.S. personnel. Special agent Jaime Zapata was killed and a second agent, Victor Avila, was wounded. Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano and Attorney General Eric Holder announced the formation of a joint task force led by the FBI to help the Mexican government find the perpetrators. In an exclusive interview, Mexico's Ambassador to the United States, Arturo Sarukhan talks about the repercussions of this incident. Will this violent act change the relationship between Mexico and the United States? Has the Mexican government lost control of parts of its territory to the drug cartels?
