**UTAH IMMIGRATION LAWSUIT

Two national organizations are suing Utah to halt a new immigration law they claim encourages racial profiling. The National Immigration Law Center argues legislation signed by Gov. Gary Herbert in March is just as unconstitutional as a similar Arizona law that is before the courts. The American Civil Liberties Union also joined the lawsuit filed Tuesday in federal court in Salt Lake City. The most controversial parts of Arizona's law are on hold pending a trial. They include a provision that would require

police officers who are enforcing other laws to question the immigration status of those they suspect are in the country illegally.

**CALIFORNIA DREAM ACT

College students who entered the country illegally appear closer than ever to receiving financial aid in California. On a party-line vote of 51-21, the state Assembly approved a bill Thursday that allows those students to collect privately-funded college scholarships. Assemblyman Gil Cedillo, a Democrat from Los Angeles and the author of AB130, has introduced a similar bill every year since 2005. Former Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, a Republican, vetoed the legislation repeatedly, but Democratic Gov. Jerry Brown made a campaign pledge to sign it. Dozens of Democrats in the Assembly spoke in support of the bill, arguing that students should not be punished because their parents brought them into the country illegally. They said immigrant labor makes comfortable, middle-class standards of living possible and that California should reward skilled and educated immigrants.

**FLORIDA HISPANICS GREW MORE DIVERSE

During the past decade, Floridians got older and were less inclined to get married. More unrelated Floridians moved in together and the number of unmarried domestic partners grew. Thursday's release of new demographic data from the U.S. Census Bureau offers a new prism into Florida's changes over the last decade. Floridians grew older in the past decade. The median age went from 38.7 in 2000 to 40.7 in 2010. Floridians were less likely to be married. The share of husband and wife households declined from 50.4 percent in 2000 to 46.6 percent in 2010. Sumter County had the highest rate of husband-wife households while the college towns of Alachua and Leon counties had the lowest.

U.S. employment increased more than expected in April as private companies created jobs at the fastest pace in five years, pointing to underlying strength in the economy, even though the jobless rate rose to 9.0 percent. Nonfarm payrolls rose 244,000 last month, the most in 11 months, the Labor department said on Friday. The private sector accounted for all of the job gains last month, with payrolls rising 268,000, the largest rise since February 2006. The gain in overall payrolls, above economist' expectations for a 186,000 increase, was supportive of views the economic recovery would regain speed this quarter after stumbling in the first three months of the year on high commodity prices. **UTAH IMMIGRATION

Two civil rights groups asked a federal judge Friday to stop a Utah immigration law from taking effect next week, saying it would create a police state and violate constitutional rights to due process. The American Civil Liberties Union and the National Immigration Law Center sought the injunction in federal court in Salt Lake City seeking to delay the law, which is modeled on Arizona's enforcement measure. Because the law could force people to prove their citizenship when arrested for any crime, there is the very real danger of racial profiling by police officers if it goes into effect, said Karen Tumlin, the law center's managing attorney.

Describing the border with Mexico as more secure than ever, President Barack Obama says Republicans who insisted on tougher enforcement

should now be ready to move on and deal with comprehensive immigration reform. But instead, he says they're still demanding more. In a speech in Texas along the border today, Obama pointed to an increase in border agents, and the near-completion of a border fence. And he said more cargo is being screened. But he said Republicans will "never be satisfied." Obama is pushing for legislation offering a pathway to citizenship to the nation's 11 million illegal immigrants -- amid opposition from majority Republicans in the House. He's trying to convince Hispanic voters that he's not the one standing in the way of immigration reform.

UTAH IMMIGRATION BILL LAWSUIT SALVADOR DURAN. SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH PKG 2:13

People arrested for serious crimes in Utah will be required to prove their citizenship -- and those stopped for minor offenses may be too -- under a new immigration law that took effect Tuesday. But it may be short-lived. Civil rights groups are seeking to block the law on constitutional grounds, and a judge will consider whether to halt its enforcement at a hearing set for Tuesday afternoon. The law, signed by Republican Gov. Gary Herbert in March, requires police to check the citizenship status of anyone arrested for a felony or class-A misdemeanor, while giving them discretion to check the citizenship of those stopped for traffic infractions and other lesser offenses. Class A misdemeanors include theft, negligent homicide and criminal mischief, while felonies range from aggravated burglary to rape and murder. Civil rights attorneys spent much of Monday trying to persuade state officials to voluntarily delay the law's implementation. U.S. District Judge Clark Waddoups has a hearing scheduled in Salt Lake City where he could decide to halt enforcement of all or some of the law.

TEXAS APPROVES SANTUARY CITIES VO :18

After taking the unusual and controversial strategy of cutting off debate, the Texas House late Monday voted 99 to 47 in favor of a ban on "sanctuary cities," despite objections that the measure was unnecessary and will increase racial profiling against Hispanics. House Republicans voted to end debate by calling for an immediate vote on the bill, shutting down debate on amendments after four hours of sometimes heated discussion. Democrats roundly criticized the tactic almost as emotionally as the underlying legislation, and faulted House Speaker Joe Straus for allowing the maneuver

**GEORGIA HB-87 LAW SIGNED

Georgia's Republican governor signed Friday a tough new state law cracking down on illegal immigrants that is similar to one enacted in Arizona last year, handing new powers to police in the southern U.S. state. The law authorizes police in Georgia to investigate the immigration status of criminal suspects they think may be in the country illegally. It also requires many private employers to check the immigration status of newly hired workers on a federal database called E-Verify. Enforcement of U.S. immigration laws traditionally is handled by federal, not state, authorities. The Georgia measure is the latest to gain favor among Republicans at the state level who accuse Democratic President Barack Obama and the federal government of failing to stem illegal immigration.

**LOTTERY VISA MISTAKE

A computer glitch corrupted the State Department's annual worldwide lottery for U.S. immigrant visas and the results will be scratched, the Obama administration said Friday, disappointing tens of thousands of would-be immigrants who were notified this year that they had won a

chance to come and live legally in the United States. Nearly 15 million people had entered the 2012 lottery hoping to win one of 50,000 U.S. immigrant visas available under a wild-card program for people who otherwise would have little hope of getting a coveted U.S. visa. Applicants for the random drawing do not have to have the usual family or employer sponsor. The lottery selects 90,000 winners, a total that is then winnowed down through attrition, interviews and strict educational and occupational criteria.

**SAN FRANCISCO, SANCTUARY CITY

San Francisco's mayor said Tuesday that the city will no longer automatically report illegal immigrant youths to federal authorities when they are arrested on felony charges—a shift he said stays true to the city's longstanding sanctuary city policy. Mayor Edwin Lee told the Board of Supervisors at its weekly meeting that juveniles who are first-time offenders, enrolled in school and can show family ties to the San Francisco Bay area would not be reported to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, the San Francisco Chronicle reports. Lee said his directive follows the intent of San Francisco's 22-year-old Sanctuary City ordinance, which requires local officials not to hand immigrants to federal authorities unless they're charged with serious crimes. Lee's position falls in the middle ground between his predecessor Gavin Newsom's hard-line policy toward arrested juveniles and the more liberal stance adopted by the Board of Supervisors. Supervisors passed a law in 2009 that would have required the city to report only juveniles who have been convicted of felonies—not just arrested. Newsom refused to enforce it.
