**JUSTICE DEPARTMENT SETTLES ALLEGATIONS OF IMMIGRATION-RELATED EMPLOYMENT DISCRIMINATION AGAINST MARICOPA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

The Justice Department today reached a settlement agreement with the Maricopa County Community College District in Arizona, resolving allegations that the district engaged in a pattern or practice of discrimination against non-citizens in the hiring and employment-eligibility verification process. The district, which consists of 10 community colleges and two skill centers, has agreed to pay \$45,760 in civil penalties and \$22,123 in back pay to settle a lawsuit filed by the Justice Department on Aug. 30, 2010. According to the department's findings, the district had a policy of requiring newly hired workers who are not U.S. citizens but are authorized to work to present specific documentation that is not required by federal law.

**IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT TEXAS

A bill that would allow Texas law enforcement officers to question people they detain about their citizenship status was revived Friday in the state Senate. Hispanic lawmakers promise an emotional fight to stop it before the end of the legislative session. The so-called "sanctuary cities" bill revived by the Senate Transportation and Homeland Security Committee would prohibit local governments and police agencies from adopting policies that ban officers from asking people they detain about whether they are in the country legally. Hispanic senators say they worry police will use the law to harass Latinos.

While the Tennessee State Legislature has shelved controversial "Arizona-style" immigration rules for this session, rules regarding expanded use of the federal E-Verify system could be closer to passage. The proposed law, called HB 1378, would require all Tennessee businesses to check the status of all prospective employees through the federal database. Many business groups have argued against the laws, saying it would add too many additional costs and liabilities for businesses across the state.

**CANCER AND CELLPHONES

Using a mobile phone may increase the risk of developing certain types of brain tumour and consumers should consider ways of reducing their exposure, World Health Organisation (WHO) cancer experts said on Tuesday. A working group of 31 scientists from 14 countries meeting at the WHO's International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) said a review of all the available scientific evidence suggested cell phone use should be classified as "possibly carcinogenic". The classification, which puts mobile

phone use in the same broad IARC cancer risk category as lead, chloroform and coffee, could spur the United Nations health body to look again at its guidelines on mobile phones, the scientists said. But more lengthy and detailed research is needed before a more definitive answer on any link can be given.

SANCTUARY CITIES BILL FILED FOR TEXAS SESSION

Gov. Rick Perry, a Texas House Republican is pressing for an immigration enforcement bill that has been one of the most controversial issues before the Legislature this year. Rep. Burt Solomons of Carrollton has filed a new version of the so-called sanctuary cities bill. It bans police agencies from adopting policies that prohibit officers from asking people they detain whether they are in the country legally. The bill was one of Perry's top priorities in the regular session but it failed without a vote in the Senate. Perry, a Republican, has not yet added it to the agenda of the 30-day special session which began Tuesday, but said he still considers it an important issue. Perry's agenda items so far include bills on school spending, Medicaid and congressional redistricting. He has the power to add more. Solomons did not immediately return a telephone message Wednesday seeking comment. None of Texas' major cities claim to be sanctuary cities, but many police departments discourage their officers from asking about immigration status. Democrats in the House and Senate fiercely oppose the measure and Hispanic lawmakers say they worry police will use the law to harass Latinos. The immigration bill will likely pass if Perry adds it to the agenda.

12 MILLION LATINOS WORKERS HAVE NO PAID SICK DAY BENEFITS

A new analysis released today by the National Partnership for Women & Families, Latino Workers and Their Families Need Paid Sick Days (Spanish), shows that Latino workers and their families suffer when they lack basic workplace protections like paid sick time. Latinos are the fastest growing segment of the United States' workforce, yet nearly 12 million Latino workers - 60 percent of the Latino workforce - don't have a single paid sick day to use to recover from common illnesses.
