Díaz defends the work, strategies and campaign of President Barack Obama that resulted in his re-election.</p> <p>We also analyze America's demographics, from a socio-political point of view with Dr. Roberto Patricio Korzeniewicz. He argues that the important Latino growth was key in this election, and how that increase in this sector of the population was a pivotal factor in shaping the election's results.</p> <p>And since this election also served as an opportunity for a referendum on various issues across the Nation, Public Policy expert Dr. Emilio Viano joins us in the show for a brief analysis on the legalization of marijuana and gay marriage, the upholding of the Health Reform and public funding for abortion in Florida, as well as the rejection from citizens to eliminate death penalty in California. Statehood was favored, a historic choice for Puerto Ricans, who currently hold a Commonwealth status with the United States. But the new Governor, Alejandro García Padilla does not support this status proposal; yet, the official representative of the island before Congress does. This poses many questions in terms of the future of this decision, and also of the possibilities of Puerto Rico becoming the 51st state of the Union.</p> <p>About this political controversy, we get to speak with Puerto Rican Resident Commissioner, Pedro Pierluisi; and also with the recently appointed president of the Puerto Rican Senate, Eduardo Bhatia. Bhatia supports the Commonwealth option for the island. New Jersey's Congressman, José Serrano also joins us to talk about the island's political status and the next possible steps Congress could take on the issue.</p> <p>Another important topic this week is the discussion of the so called fiscal cliff. The federal Congress and White House are trying to find ways to avoid an "impasse"; labor unions are also urging both to find an agreement to best interests of the working class in the United States, which include Hispanic workers and their communities. President Obama has urged the Republicans on the Capitol Hill to approve taxes for the wealthiest, but also seeks guarantees for federal aids. But Republicans have rejected the White House proposals, and have presented fiscal counter proposals, which haven't been accepted by the President. This impasse could quickly put the Nation in what has been called a fiscal cliff.</p> <p>How does the situation affect the average American and also the Hispanic community? How does it impact the Real State market, and particularly the mortgages of millions of families in the country? Those are topics we cover in this week's show with Economy expert, Isaac Cohen, with Public Certified Accountant, Ivonne Ramos, and with Margarita Velázquez Rebollal. The latter is the Executive Director of Community Services of Nevada, an affiliate of National Council of La Raza, and mortgage expert. She also explains a relief foreclosure federal program, that can benefit many Hispanic families across the U. Though they've been thoroughly revised by the judges, the decisions were postponed for next year.. a move that has left thousands of gay couples in the dark. The LGBT community (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender community) are demanding equal rights and consideration, just as any other U.S. citizen.</p> <p>What are the consequences of any decision the Supreme Court may issue on this controversial topic for this community, especially for the LGBT Hispanic couples? Is it being addressed more as a moral issue rather than a civil rights one? And what are the gay marriage activists doing to further their cause? The subject is widely discussed in our next show with Lisbeth Meléndez Rivera, LGBT activist, and with attorney Iván Espinoza, representing a prestigious legal firm specialized in civil rights for the gay community.</p> <p>Also, during 2012, Immigration has been the most important issue among Hispanics. It's also been a year when millions of people have won great victories for their legal status, yet there are more challenges to be fought during the new year that will soon start. 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<p><b>December 23, 2012</b></p> <p>SHOW #41 - WASHINGTON DC -2012- (WFDC)</p>	<p><b>Host:</b> Armando Gúzman</p>	<p>The recent massacre of Newtown, Connecticut has sparked a heated public debate on the use and bearing of firearms in the United States, particularly on high caliber or assault guns. On the one hand, there are those who demand an immediate ban on arms and tougher controls on the access and licensing of powerful firearms. On the other hand, there are groups supporting the Second Amendment of the Constitution, that provides civil liberties, among which is the free access to guns and firearms.</p> <p>This is the debate that we bring to our show this week, and we have the opportunity to discuss it with the Secretary General of the Organization of American States (OAS), Hon. José Miguel Insulza, who defends the eradication of firearms in the United States and the Hemisphere. His point of view is in line with an OAS international accord, which paradoxically, the United States has yet to ratify.</p> <p>In favor of arm bearing, Nevada State Senator, Rubén Kihuen, will join us in the show. Although he defends civil access to firearms from a security and recreational standpoint, he also agrees that the recent violent events demand control measures, especially for people with mental health issues or questionable interests.</p> <p>But, will we soon see the end of this debate, especially after the creation of a Presidential Task Force to handle the issue?
