That's where Cruz-Torralva and his daughter hid behind a bush to avoid getting caught by border patrol. The patrol vehicle accidently ran over him and his daughter, killing her. Now he's in the Yuma County Jail. Yesterday, he was charged with child endangerment. Yuma sector border patrol agents are still investigating the case, but did release a statement, calling the case a tragic and unfortunate accident. They also say criminal smugglers operating in this area knowingly place illegal aliens in danger by crossing them in harsh, sparsely populated desert terrain and by instructing them to conceal themselves from border patrol agents.

So badly, enough radioactive materials to make two dirty bombs made their way across the US Border with Canada and Mexico. The Government Accountability Office set up a test in December last year. Two teams of investigators, both loaded with radioactive materials crossed the US border at the same time, one through a land port in Canada, the other closer to home in Mexico. They found new radiation portal monitors installed at the Nogales port of entry three years ago, in fact, detect the materials, and the vehicles were inspected accordingly. But, the problem came when the investigators presented counterfeit documents. The GAO's report says they acted as employees of a fictitious company and used Nuclear Regulatory Commission documents they found over the internet to prove it. According to the report, Customs and Border Protection inspectors never questioned the paperwork, and the shipments came through. Congressional hearings are now underway to discuss what the federal government has done to protect the US against nuclear terrorism.
