A federal database that tracks the number of unidentified human remains recently ranked Arizona as having the third highest count, only behind New York and California. The Pima County Medical Examiner, stated this was due to migrant deaths. Migration pattern changes would decrease the number but nobody knows when or if this will every happen.

But Border Patrol hasn't released data to show whether tougher punishments are working.
