ECONOMY

1/16/12 Austin Energy

Duration :45 seconds

Austin's Mayor says he does not support the Austin Energy rate hike as it is proposed right now. Mayor Lee Leffingwell says the current proposal is not fair, because most of the increase falls upon those who are using the least amount of electricity. Austin Energy says that they are looking at a 75-million dollar shortfall for the year without an increase, a figure Leffingwell says needs to be studied before any increase happens. Leffingwell thinks a rate increase is necessary, but hopes the increase doesn't pack such a sudden punch. Lee Leffingwell, Austin Mayor stated that we have to make sure we pay attention to those impacts and if necessary due it on a phase in basis. You can voice your concerns at a public meeting February 2nd at City Hall. That hearing starts at 6pm.

1/17/12 Church Energy Meeting

Duration :35 seconds

There's also worry the new rates would put an extra burden on the poor. A group at St. Theresa's Catholic Church met this evening to discuss the impact the changes might have on low income customers. The group says it will get involved to try to make sure the rate changes are fair to everyone. Margie Medrano with Moved to Action, "We have to make sure we take care of the earth and they provide green energy, but that it's not so expensive that it unfairly impacts the poor." The group says it is also keeping an eye on the rates as they relate to churches.

2/13/12 Austin Green Energy

Duration 1:40 minutes

The old Suburban Lodge motel off I-35 and Oltorf will re-open this summer, with an all-new, energy efficient flair. Sunshine Mathon of Foundation Communities heads up the design of the site soon to be a 120-unit green apartment community for low income Austinites. It came together thanks to the city's rebate program. Sunshine Mathon, Foundation Communities: "They help cover some of the costs of the window replacements, cover some of the costs of the attic insulation." Josh Hinkle: "With energy efficiency, you have to give a little to gain a lot more. In the last year, Austin Energy has put in \$30 million to green projects like this. It could help cut back on the \$77 million deficit it now faces." Carlos Cordova: "By reducing the amount of electricity customer's use, we don't have to go purchase electricity during the hottest part of the summer...And it also helps us delay when we have to build the next power plant." Still, Austin Energy is asking its customers to pay more for most around a 12 percent hike. That's why critics and even some council members are asking for a lower, temporary fix, until the utility re-evaluates its financial situation. Regardless, Austin Energy says people could avoid most of any new cost by going green. Bill Oakley, consumer advocate: "The people who are in the best position to afford solar rooftops and expensive energy conservation or weatherization improvements are the people who have a lot more money." Mathon says his apartment project wouldn't have been possible without the city's help. Still, some critics wonder "what's the best balance between long term goals and short-term needs." A costly green initiative or lower energy rates right now.

2/16/12 Water Costs

Duration :55 seconds

Water is precious, and in Austin it's also expensive. Of the ten largest cities in the state, Austin pays 53% more for its water than the average of those other nine cities. There are reasons. Austin is fast growing with growing needs in infrastructure. Not all cities have the same water treatment process, and there is also the difficult Hill Country topography to deal with serving customers. There's also another reason for our high water costs. 52% of the Austin Water Utility's expenses go to service debt. "Debt for water treatment plants, wastewater treatment plants, and huge infrastructure some of which is related to annexations." "All of that debt we've issued in the past or are currently issuing is related to capitol improvements in our system." Some of that debt will be retired in coming years, but the utility also intends to spend \$200-million a year in improvements to their infrastructure. That means you can expect a rate hike of 19% by the year 2016.

3/13/12 Gas Prices

Duration :55 seconds

A new survey reveals those high gas prices are also starting to change the spending habits of many Americans. Here in Austin we're paying 3-58 a gallon. That's only a penny higher than a week ago, but it's 15 cents higher than a month ago. A new Triple-A survey shows: 60-percent of Americans are combining more trips and errands. 34-percent say they've delayed major purchases. And 16-percent say they're driving more fuel-efficient vehicles. Not good news for the economy, and President Obama feels pressure to do something. President Obama: "I think the American people understand that you know, we don't have a silver bullet when it comes to gas prices. But they're hurting right now. It's like a tax on your paycheck every time you fill up." The reason behind the price hike:

The threat of military action against Iran. US refinery capacity is down. And while US consumption is down, demand is growing in developing countries like China and India. It all adds up to higher prices.

3/14/12 Electric Cabs

Duration 1:26 minutes

For folks downtown, they try and catch a ride. It doesn't take long to realize that it can be a frustrating process. And that is part of the reason why Alex Born decided to create the electric cab. A greener alternative to getting around town. Chris Nelson said "I noticed that people could not get short range rides it was next to impossible to do." Something else that was nearly impossible for the electric cab company was getting a permit to operate from the city. After over 200 citations, the company finally got the green light this week. You could've knocked me over with a feather when i got the voicemail from the transportation department that the fight was over. But pedi cab drivers aren't too keen on the competition. Alex Born a Pedicab Driver "Yea I don't really like the whole golf cart thing I think its kind of stupid. It doesn't make me feel very good I don't like all the competition we have." As for Electric cabs, they say it wont put a stop to their expansion. They want to add to their current fleet of 7. "We are looking to expand about two to three vehicles per month." An alternative to traditional cabs that Born says will not only help the environment but the economy as well. "We are working right now to move a manufacturer into Austin and that will not only provide jobs to the people driving the vehicles but the people making them as well."

SAFETY

1/16/12 Cruise Ship Wreck

Duration 1:00 minute

Twenty nine people are now missing and six confirmed dead who were on board the sinking cruise ship off the coast of Italy. Two Austin men who survived are still in Rome tonight. "Steve Garcia" and "Blake Miller" made it onto a life boat - when the "Costa Concordia" went down Friday. Garcia is a teacher in Round Rock. Miller works for the Stephen F. Austin Hotel downtown. Costa, owned by Miami-based Carnival Corporation, says there may have been significant "human error" on the part of the captain. They say the ship went off course and was way too close to shore. The captain was arrested for questioning, under suspicion of manslaughter and abandoning ship before everyone on board evacuated. But he says, his navigation systems showed the way was clear. Steve Garcia's mother watched her son's interview on NBC's Today Show from her home in San Antonio. Chris Garcia, Steve's Mom says, "Our hearts have been in our throats, my husband and I have just been holding on." She also says, "Just seeing him was the best thing for us, just seeing his face there, we know he's in one piece." Rescuers continue searching for the missing. Two Americans remain unaccounted for a couple from Minnesota.

1/17/12 White House Lockdown

Duration :25 seconds

The White House was locked down tonight. It started during an "Occupy DC" rally outside. Someone threw what appeared to be a smoke bomb over the White House fence, according to the Secret Service. About a thousand protesters participated in the rally. The crowd has been dispersed, and no one was arrested. At the time, President Obama was not home. He was out to dinner with the First Lady to celebrate her birthday.

2/12/12 Gas Leak

Duration 1:15 minutes

The seven victims, including a seven year old child, lived in four apartments. That child was discovered unconscious. They were all taken to St. David's Medical Center. "Several people were complaining of headache, nausea and different odors in the building, odors of gas. The fire department responded as well. Using sniffing type equipment they were able to determine there was high levels of carbon monoxide as well as natural gas." A neighbor who smelled nothing says the apartment complex does warn people who may be using their heater for the first time of the winter season. "They usually go around and tell people or you can call them and they'll send someone to do it for you, but if you're not checking your pilot they'll come and check it for you." Justin Marler inspects heaters for a living. He says it's important for you to take the right safety precautions where your heater is stored. You want to make sure your closet is properly weather stripped, and your closet, your combustion closet is isolated from your house. Secondly you want to make sure your vent pipe hasn't been disturbed. I find this often. When someone gets a new roof on a house the vent pipe will be disturbed and will actually be kicked out of place by the roofers. And no one will know it."

2/12/12 House Fire

Duration 1:00 minute

It was a neighbor who saw an unusual amount of smoke coming from the chimney at the back of this house. That neighbor ran to the house to alert the homeowners and then called 911. Fire crews say the family who lives in this house recently moved in. With our cold weather, they decided to build a fire in their fireplace but were unaware their chimney was not clean. This sent smoke billowing through the chimney--eventually setting fire to the second floor and attic. The homeowners and their children along pets were able to make it out safely. Fire crews are now urging other homeowners to learn from this fire. Chris: It is just a reminder that in these cold days, we need to adhere to fire prevention type of behavior including making sure your chimney is clean and that when a fire is in your fireplace it is out before you go to bed." The family will not be able to get back into their house tonight. While there is no damage estimate, fire crews tell us that roughly 30 percent of the house is damaged.

2/18/12 Marathon Chopper

Duration :50 seconds

As thousands of runners line up for the Austin marathon in about 24 hours, Austin police officers will be hovering thousands of feet above them. APD's "Air One" will fly over the race an extra step to keep runners and everyone on the ground- safe. They'll look for hazards- and watch for frustrated drivers who try to go through dozens of traffic barricades set up Downtown. Steve says "Hopefully if we pick that up we would be able

to provide advanced notice to people further down the route that there might be a problem coming their way that they might be able to intercept to prevent someone from getting injured.” So here's fair warning, lots of roads will be closed around Downtown this weekend. The course Sunday morning winds from the State Capitol - south through downtown and South Congress - back north on South 1st Street - west along Ceasar Chavez past MoPac then back toward the Capitol on 15th.

3/12/12 Baby Food Recall

Duration :25 seconds

Gerber is recalling some of its powdered formula because of a bad smell. Gerber is recalling its "Good Start Gentle Powdered Infant Formula" sold in a 23-point-two ounce plastic container with an expiration date of March 5th, 2013. The move comes after some consumers reported a foul smell coming from the jars. Gerber says the product is safe, but is offering free replacements.

3/13/12 Highway 29 Improvements

Duration :30 seconds

Friends of two students killed in a wreck on Texas Highway 29 pleaded with county commissioners today to help make that Burnet County road safer. The students presented a petition with 500 names to commissioners. They are asking the county to consider lower speed limits and adding turn lanes on state highway 29. Tex-DOT representatives listened as the students spoke in commissioners court today. Judge Donna Klaeger, a Burnet County Judge says, "It remains high priority on the list for Burnet County I appreciate the teenagers who came out and understand the importance of speaking up." Caleb and Sierra Harden were killed last month on Highway 29 when their car hit the back of a school bus.

POLITICS

1/16/12 MLK National Day

Duration :40 seconds

Governor Perry and Newt Gingrich began their day paying tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. They both attended a community breakfast in Myrtle Beach in his honor. Civil Rights leaders marked the holiday at Dr. King's memorial in Washington, D.C. Reverend Al Sharpton helped lay a wreath at the monument's "Stone of Hope." Rev. Al Sharpton, Civil Rights Activist: "As we go through a day of service and a day of celebration let us remember the work is still yet to be done." The first family took part in a service project at a DC area school to mark the occasion. They helped spruce up the library. President Obama thanked the volunteers for their service, and referenced a quote on the King memorial that's generated some controversy over its context. President Barack Obama: "If you look at that speech talking about Dr. King as a drum major, what he really said was that all of us can be a drum major for service, all of us can be a drum major for justice, there's nobody who can't serve or who can't help somebody else. And for the first time ever some 200 thousand documents, including Dr. King's handwritten note cards and sermons, are available for you to read online courtesy of the King Center.

1/16/12 South Carolina GOP Debate

Duration 1:35 minutes

Today, former Utah Governor Jon Huntsman dropped out of the race, giving the current GOP frontrunner a bigger voter cushion with his endorsement. Huntsman: "I believe that candidate is Gov. Mitt Romney." Huntsman's departure leaves Perry in dead last behind Romney another Texan and two people highly regarded by conservatives right now. Perry: "We're the most consistent fiscal conservative in the race." Over the weekend, more than 150 evangelical leaders from across the nation met at a Texas Ranch and voted to endorse Rick Santorum as the best conservative alternative to Romney. Santorum: "Grassroots leaders here are lining up behind us and giving us that surge we need coming down to this last week." GOP presidential history is often on the side of someone who has played this game before. Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, and John McCain all became the nominee after losing in the Republican race before. Both Romney and Paul fit into that category. Each ran in 2008. For Perry, this is a first. Perhaps he'll try again in 2016? They're not Perry's strong point, but two debates are between him and South Carolina's primary next weekend. Winning the nomination is more than a long shot. But he has these two chances left to either bring Romney down with his vulture capitalism notion or ride off into the sunset quietly with his dignity still mostly intact.

2/13/12 Obama Budget

Duration :35 seconds

Today, President Obama unveiled his budget for the next fiscal year. It fleshes out the themes outlined in his state of the union address. Shared sacrifice, raising taxes on the wealthy and investing money to create new jobs is his goal. The plan would slash four trillion dollars from the deficit over the next decade. Congressional republicans say the president is ignoring a spending crisis. Senator Rob Portman, (R) Ohio: "There's not really anything in this budget to get this economy moving again." Senator John Barrasso, (R) Wyoming: "Someone asked if this budget is dead on arrival - no it's debt on arrival." House Republicans plan to unveil their own budget plan next month.

2/16/12 Bond Election

Duration 1:10 minutes

There are more than 100 pages, with more than 100 possible projects in this booklet. They total around 1-and-a-half billion dollars. But, the task force now has the more difficult task of whittling this list down so it totals no more \$400 million dollars. A majority of the projects on the list are not surprisingly related to transportation and mobility, including major streetscape projects for East 6th, Congress Avenue, North Burnet, North Lamar and East Riverside Drive along with more bike paths and better sidewalks. There are also requests for several fire stations, more affordable housing projects, and park improvements. Many people in the meeting tonight came out as a business trying to vie for a piece of that money. But, we caught up with some Austinites who attended the meeting, and just moved to town. They're finding it difficult to get around. Jessica Tunon says, "I actually wanted to find out a little bit more. I had spoken with the City of Austin, 311 and the public works department and I'm finding that there is just a lot of bureaucracy involved with getting sidewalks and safety, and just trying to find out more where the money is going, how much money it takes and how many years

it will actually be done and when it will be done." ((Did you get any of those questions answered tonight?)) No!"

3/12/12 GOP Politics

Duration 1:40 minutes

The GOP Southern Swing continues today. Looking to energize their campaigns while taking aim at the president, Newt Gingrich and Rich Santorum addressed the Gulf Coast Energy Summit in Biloxi. Rich Santorum, Presidential Candidate "We want to make sure that we have a candidate that can go up against President Obama who can make the case about energy in our future. who can draw a sharp contrast." Newt Gingrich, Presidential Candidate "These people are ideologically committed to a fantasy land and if you read the president's energy speeches he's in cloud cuckoo land." A new Washington Post, ABC News Poll does seem to indicate that President Obama is running out of gas when it comes to the issue of oil. Almost two-thirds of Americans say they disapprove of the way the president has handled price increases at the pump, and that seems to be fueling a drop in his overall job approval numbers. Forty-six percent of those asked give the president a thumbs-up for his work in the White House, but fifty percent disapprove. Looking to seize the shift in momentum, Mitt Romney, Republican Presidential Candidate says "I think it's time to send a president to Washington who can fix things in this country."

3/14/12 Voting Rights Act

Duration :25

Texas wants to challenge the constitutionality of the federal Voting Rights Act. It's the latest move in the ongoing legal battle over Texas' rule requiring voters to show photo ID's at polling places. On Monday, the Justice Department declared that that rule could disenfranchise hundreds of thousands of registered Hispanics statewide. Today, Texas asked a federal panel weighing its photo ID requirement to allow it to challenge the constitutionality of a key provision of the Voting Rights Act.

CRIME

1/17/12 Deadly Teen Crash

Duration :40 seconds

A 14-year-old driving a stolen pickup truck died in a crash after a high-speed police chase outside Houston. DPS Troopers tried to pull over the truck in Rosharon with three teenagers inside late last night. Troopers said the truck driver was speeding. John Sampa, Department of Public Safety: "The truck was traveling down this dirt road, lost control and flipped multiple times, ejecting the driver. The other two were not ejected." The driver died at the scene. The two passengers, 12 and 13 years old, were taken to Houston's Memorial Hermann Hospital, where they were treated and released. Troopers said the truck was stolen from a contractor for Comcast and the teenagers were seen tossing marijuana out of the window during the chase.

1/18/12 First Murder of the year

Duration 1:45 minutes

In a room full of more than 100 people you could see the worry on many faces. "We're tense, we don't know what's going to happen next, you're just really scared." Police chief Art Acevedo says officers are still following up on leads in the murder of Esme Barrera and possibly related attacks of two other women. "Hopefully there are some leads and some progress with the investigation." What many want to know most--is are they safe? "In some sense the fact that people are alarmed tells you that it is a rare occurrence, I think it's important for the public to understand it's still a safe neighborhood." People who live in neighborhoods closest to the Barrera murder scene are even more alert and active than before New Year's Day. "I think public safety starts not just with the police department but it starts with the community we serve. People being good neighbors, being nosy neighbors, calling when they see something out of place is important." Although rumors have spread since the murder and attacks--the police chief addressed what crimes he has heard about--and what he hasn't. "You don't get info from blogs you get info directly from the sources the police department and that's why I'm glad we have this dialogue." "It helped calm our fears a little, what is truth with statistics and everything, we are in a safe neighborhood and I'm glad about that." In fact, police say in the neighborhoods from I-35 to Lamar and MLK to 45th Street, robberies, aggravated assaults, burglaries and auto burglaries were down this past year compared to 2010. But the chief says he knows there are still challenges. "That's just statistics. To the people that are the victims, to Esme Barrera's family, it doesn't matter if we're the safest city in the country. On that night, at that time, we failed the Barrera family as a community, as a police department and our goal now is to bring them some justice."

2/14/12 Walnut Creek Arrest

Duration 1:35 minutes

The McGovern family visits Walnut Creek Park often, but on this day, it's extra special. "The weather was so beautiful we just decided to come to the park and have a picnic for Valentine's Day." Besides a popular place for families to spend time with each other, the park is becoming a popular place for something darker. "It's a little concerning." "I'm surprised they don't go someplace more private." Last week, four men were caught by police and arrested for lewd and indecent behavior. Undercover officer catching most of them either touching or exposing themselves in a nearby bathroom. But that's not the first time this has happened. Just last month, four more were arrested. And tracking incidents going back the past seven years, there have been at least 50 more arrests made in this park for the same thing. Austin Police report the woods here are littered with used condoms and discarded underwear. But some of the people that frequent this park aren't even aware of it. Donna Drake says, "I don't want to see it, but I haven't ever thought I would." Donna Drake has a pair of bodyguards with her because she sometimes walks alone. In the past year, there has also been at least one assault - where a single female jogger was attacked by a total stranger. "I definitely feel safer with them." McGovern says, "That's one of your jobs as a parent is to make sure you keep them safe." But for those park-goers who enjoy coming here - they're not going to let the criminals spoil their fun. McGovern says, "That is something that's going to happen everywhere. People are going to find a place to be gross." "Nothing is going to ruin my experience right now."

2/14/12 Capital Murder Sentence

Duration :30 seconds

It's a sentence of life without parole for a man who shot a teen who two ladies lured away from an Austin bar. A Williamson County jury found Bobby Burks guilty of Capital Murder - in the death of 19-year old Raul Torres. Almost two years ago, two women picked up Torres in a bar off East Riverside and asked him and a friend to take them home to Taylor. Once they got to Williamson County, one of the women pretended to get sick and asked them to pull over. That's where Burks was waiting with a gun to rob them. He shot Torres, who died later at the hospital.

3/12/12 Afghan Shooting

Duration :25 seconds

A weekend act of violence in Afghanistan is threatening to change the future of the war. An Army staff sergeant is accused of killing 16 people, most of them women and children. The early Sunday morning shooting spree in the "Kandahar Province" is fanning the flames of anti-American sentiment, and straining the already difficult relationships between the U.S. and Afghanistan leaders. Brian Moar has this top story.

3/14/12 Cocaine Trafficking

Duration :40 seconds

Authorities say cocaine has been harder to find in Central Texas after they arrested 22 people last week. 34-year-old "Vivid Kahey" is believed to be the "ring leader" who oversaw a large-scale distribution operation. Police say he had 21 people working for him selling cocaine. They were delivering about five pounds a week. But police admit, taking major players off the street drives up the demand and the price. Sean says, "We do our best to stay on top of who may be trying to take that piece of the market and I will say I have every confidence this case will lead us to the next group of players down the road." Investigators tell KXAN they had been tracking the drug dealers for about a year. Police began the arrests last week.

EDUCATION

1/17/12 Vista Ridge – No Hate

Duration :40 seconds

A local high school is fighting back against bullying. Today, students at Vista Ridge High School celebrated becoming part of the nationally recognized "No Place for Hate" initiative. And it was a big party. Dozens of students joined a lunch time flash mob - meant to deliver a strong message. Austin Heath a 12th Grader: "I really don't appreciate what the bullies do and I think it's a big problem in school and i just wanted to show everyone that it's not ok to bully." The students and staff have organized more shows of unity against bullying using posters, displays - even live action exhibits. Organizers hope students get the point that bullying simply should not be a part of their school.

1/19/12 Apple Textbooks

Duration :45 seconds

"Apple" changed the way many of us listen to music and watch movies. Now, the company is hoping to change the way kids study. That good, old backpack loaded down with heavy textbooks could give way to an iPad filled with digital versions. Apple announced today it is teaming up with the three companies that publish 90 percent of the textbooks sold in the U-S. They plan to sell interactive, electronic versions of textbooks for 15 dollars or less...starting with high school math and science. Natali Morris, Tech Analyst They have embedded video. They have 3-d modeling, they can make your own graphic card, they can make note cards, flash cards. Apple says one-and-a-half million iPads are now being used in education. But, so far, the company has not revealed any new plans to increase that number or somehow defray the cost of iPads for students.

2/13/12 Hearing Aid Donation to Students

Duration :50 seconds

A Round Rock student can celebrate his grades likely getting better soon. A local company is stepping up to help him to hear better in class. "Drew Guardado" a fifth grader in Round Rock Christian Academy has had trouble hearing since he was a small child. He used to wear traditional hearing devices which are bulky. But, a donation from Cook Hearing and Balance has changed all that. The company donated the new "bluetooth" hearing aids to Drew. Now he'll be able to hear his teacher talking from greater distances and concentrate better on his work. Drew Guardado/5th Grader Round Rock Christian Academy: it's helped me in class before I was not being able to hear, now I can understand the teachers a lot better, now I'm starting to get my grades, well my grades are starting to go higher. Drew says his new hearing aids are so small that people he encounters rarely notice them.

2/14/12 Lakeway Addiction Center

Duration 1:00 minute

The city of Lakeway is trying to stop construction of a new drug treatment center going up next to an elementary school. The dirt is already being moved on the lot next to Lakeway Elementary. Before the foundation is poured parents, locals and even city leaders are calling for them to relocate. "Recovering Ways" a Utah-based company says the facility is not a halfway house. It's a place where sober alcoholics and recovering drug addicts go to continue healing after detox. This is what their Utah Facility looks like. Patients are screened and they don't accept criminals. Concerned citizens say they still need to go somewhere else. Chris Wilson says, "The fears are that someone from the facility could wander into the school or wander into the school playground and be in some kind of deranged state and possibly harm a student or a teacher." The city is trying to figure out if there's anything they can do to stop construction, because the center is not classified the same way as a drug rehab center where people go to get clean.

3/12/12 School Breakfast

Duration :35 seconds

If you think school lunches can be unhealthy, school breakfasts aren't much better. Experts at the Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine studied breakfast menus for 30 school districts across the country. They found 90-percent of them featured processed meat. They also had more sodium, fat and cholesterol than kids should have in a day. The worst meal was the ham, egg and cheese breakfast which had 18-hundred milligrams of sodium. Other unhealthy options included cheesy scrambled eggs, maple-flavored pork pancake wrap and donuts. One-in-three schools offered low-fat options like oatmeal.
