ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

OVERVIEW

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM April 10, 2006. The report covers the period from January 1 through March 31, 2006. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainment. Below, each problem/need is a brief description of some news segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to, or address, the problem or need.

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NOON If a deal between Delphi and the UAW isn't reached by February 17, Delphi could begin bankruptcy proceedings to cancel current UAW contracts. 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3. Violence

5PM LOC/NEWS 1/4/06 1:20
While the number of crimes and shooting continue to go up, the number of cops on the streets is down from recent years. This happens at a time when gunmen are turning one Saginaw eastside neighborhood into a mini-war zone.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/5/06 :48
There are currently dozens of unsolved crimes in Saginaw County, and the one thing police say is the underlying problem is that no one is willing to come forward with any information. The prosecutor says the key to a witness protection program is staffing.

5PM LOC/NEWS 1/6/06 1:27
Four suspects were charged with receiving and concealing stolen firearms. Two of them also face drug charges. They allegedly stole a number of firearms from homes and businesses in Bay, Tuscola and Gladwin Counties, including 18 guns from a sporting good store in Gladwin County.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 2/10/06 :23
Jury deliberations are expected to begin today for the man accused of attacking another man with a samurai sword. It happened back in August, 2004.

11PM LOC/NEWS 2/21/06 2:35
The Genesee County prosecutor says this crime is the most brutal murder he's ever seen. He's referring to Jermaine Hammond who tortured a Flint man and woman in 1990. As recently as December, 2005 he scuffled with police after reportedly trying to kidnap his girlfriend in a Flint neighborhood.

6PM LOC/NEWS 2/24/06 1:33
Flint City Police and the Genesee County Sheriff's Department are just a few of the agencies Mayor Williamson is calling together to stop crime. Prosecutor Leyton hopes to strengthen the witness protection since getting people to come forward is a challenge.

530PM LOC/NEWS 3/15/06 1:14
Police distributed flyers to business owners today describing a masked man who held up the Lapeer County Bank and Trust in Metamora Township. The gunman could be connected to a party store holdup, a grocery store robbery and another holdup at a Fenton movie theatre.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 3/30/06 :21
The Midland Daily News was broken into Monday. An employee actually startled the thief, who was searching the building for money. The burglar took off with about \$30.

4. Guns in School

6PM LOC/NEWS 1/14/06 :30
A 15-year-old boy brought a pellet gun to school, pointed it at other students and forced one of them into a closet. He led deputies and a SWAT team on a chase within the school, which ended in a bathroom. He was shot and is currently on life support while his organs are harvested in Florida.

6PM LOC/NEWS 1/26/06 1:45
After seven hours of deliberation a judge announced a mistrial in the case against a student from Saginaw High. It was learned there was more security video which was not made available. The student was on trial for shooting a fellow student inside the school on October 20, 2005.

5PM NAT/NEWS 1/26/06 :15
An iris scan security program has been installed in a New Jersey school district. It's the second one in the country to install this type of security protection. Each child is allowed up to four names in the system for parents or other guardians to be permitted in the building.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 2/1/06 :48
A student at Valley Lutheran High School brought a gun into school and showed it to another student. That student told school officials about the incident, and it was reported to the police. The student's locker and backpack were searched and he was then sent home with his mother. She searched his room, found the gun, and took her son and the gun to the Saginaw Police Department. The teen is currently in the Juvenile Detention Center.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 2/24/06 :20
A 16-year-old Oregon student is in police custody, after opening fire on his classmates. The suspect was holding the gun to his own head, but police managed to take him into custody, after shooting him four times. He is said to be in good condition though.

NOON LOC/NEWS 2/24/06 :52
A student at a Mt. Pleasant high school was turned in when a teacher overheard the word gun. A gas-powered handgun was stashed in the student's glove compartment. The student had no prior disciplinary history. The school district, by law must recommend expulsion. A hearing will occur to determine whether or not the student will be expelled.

WEEKEND WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 2/4/06 :19

Bay City Police have identified two suspects who they say shot three people in a recent shooting. It happened around 2 p.m. last Sunday morning in the 300 block of North Farragut.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 2/9/06 :36

Two Livingston County teenagers are behind bars for allegedly selling guns to fellow classmates. The Sheriff's Department in Pinckney say they found four guns in the trunk of a car. None of the guns were loaded; the teens apparently just wanted to make some money.

NOON LOC/NEWS 3/1/06 :25

Saginaw police are investigating the city's latest murder. A 14-year-old was gunned down near his home in the 800 block of South 14th Street last night. Witnesses claim he was an innocent bystander.

530P LOC/NEWS 3/15/06 1:28

A standoff and shooting that wounded two people in Saginaw has come to an end. Police were called, this afternoon, to the west side of Saginaw for a shooting on Hayes and North Harrison. A standoff ensued with one suspect surrendering to police after about an hour and a half.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 3/31/06 :30

Police are trying to sort out a double shooting in the City of Saginaw last night. It's believed that one of the victims actually managed to drive to the hospital. At this time there is no word on the extent of the injuries.

In 2004 Rutan won the \$10 million Ansari X prize. - "Kinky For Governor"**- an interview with irreverent Jewish country singer Kinky Friedman, who, despite his lack of experience is campaigning as an independent to be the next governor of Texas. Focuses on Hollis-Eden, a small San Diego-based biotech company whose drug Neumene was approved by the Pentagon as a treatment for radiation exposure. Last September, the Department of Health and Human Services announced that it would commit to purchase the drug, but only 100,000 doses, an amount considered by experts to be totally inadequate. Includes interviews with: Bob Marsella, vice president of Hollis-Eden; Richard Hollis, CEO of Hollis-Eden; Lee Hamilton, vice chairman, the 9/11 Commission; Rep. Tom Davis, (R-VA). 01/03/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Blood Feud"** - Nancy Seaman, an award-winning teacher living in Farmington Hills, Michigan, an exclusive Detroit suburb, was accused of the 2004 hatchet/stabbing murder of her husband, Bob. She admits killing him, but says it was self-defense, claiming that he had been mentally and physically abusing her for years. The couple's two sons -- Greg and Jeff -- differ concerning their parent's marriage and the life they all shared. Greg sympathizes with his mother, claiming that his father was abusive and that his mother's life was in danger. Jeff, who testified for the prosecution, denies that his mother was a battered wife. Nancy Seaman was tried and found guilty of murder in the first degree and was sentenced to life in prison. This past August, the judge in the case ordered Nancy Seaman's conviction reduced from first to second-degree murder. If the ruling is upheld Nancy's life sentence could be reduced to as little as seven and a half years. Includes interviews with: Nancy Seaman; her sons Greg and Jeff; defense attorney Larry Kaluzny; Lisa Ortlieb, prosecutor in the case and director of Oakland County's Domestic Violence Unit; and Dr. Lenore Walker, an expert on abused women. (C: Maureen Maher - Sr. P: Katie Boyle - P: Nancy Kramer) (OAD: 04/09/05, with an update) No individual segment titles were used in this episode.

01/07/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Girl Next Door"**- reports on two instances in which forensic sculptors were called upon to help identify murder victims:

- 1) on the night of May 1, 2003, a teenage girl's body was found in a trash bag left behind a restaurant in Castro Valley, California. The gruesome discovery became detective Scott Dudek's obsession and touched the entire community, which came to call the young girl "Castro Valley's Jane Doe." The community rallied to raise money to bury her. Then, two years after "Jane" was found, as a last-ditch effort to identify the girl, Detective Dudek of the Alameda County Sheriff's office made the decision to exhume the body to search for clues that might have been missed. Forensic artist Gloria Nusse created a forensic reconstruction of Jane's face based on nothing but the skull in the hope that someone might recognize her. Detectives have tracked down over 800 leads to identify "Jane", and more than 350 missing girls have been ruled out.
- 2) an interview with forensic sculptor Frank Bender of Philadelphia whose facial reconstruction helped solve another murder. Gregory May disappeared in January 2001 from Bellevue, Iowa -- his children suspected foul play. When May's antique collection turned up for auction, police found the seller to be May's former friend and house-mate Doug DeBruin. Subsequently police found a skull at a truck stop hundreds of miles from Iowa. Bender was brought the skull to reconstruct the face -- and authorities later identified it as May. Other portions of May's body were located providing sufficient evidence to bring DeBruin to trial for murder. Includes an interview with Ellen Leach of the Doe Network, a group of amateur detectives dedicated to helping law enforcement solve cold cases by scouring the Internet searching for missing persons and unidentified persons and matching them up. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Phone Call"- when Shannon Melendi, a 19-year-old sophomore at Emory University in Atlanta disappeared in March 1994, authorities believed she had either run away or had taken part in a college prank. Melendi's roommate, Athena Perez, became worried when her friend didn't return to the dorm room the evening of March 26. The next day, Perez and her friends found Melendi's abandoned car with the keys in it and called police. Following an extensive police search of the area that turned up no signs of the missing girl, the Melendi family and friends began their own aggressive search, offering a \$10,000 reward for information and tapping into celebrities Andy Garcia and Bo Jackson who appeared on national television programs in an effort to help find Shannon. Nearly two weeks after Melendi vanished, an anonymous male phoned the Emory University counseling center claiming he had Shannon. The FBI traced the call to a pay phone where police found evidence that was intentionally left behind by the caller, a package containing a ring that belonged to Melendi. Only then did authorities treat the case as a kidnapping. Investigators managed to trace pieces of the package to Colvin "Butch" Hinton III, an umpire at the softball field where Melendi worked the day she went missing. Authorities searched Hinton's home and property but found no human remains and nothing that could be linked to Shannon. They did uncover the fact that Hinton had a violent criminal past covering decades. In late 2003, a new prosecutor took up the case, and more than ten years after Shannon Melendi disappeared, police and FBI agents arrested "Butch" Hinton and charged him with her murder. Hinton was tried, found guilty of kidnapping and murder, and sentenced to life in prison. Yvonne and Luis Melendi, Shannon's parents, have set their sights on a new mission, seeking longer prison sentences for sexual predators, especially repeat offenders like Hinton. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Rage On The Run" - bodybuilder David Bieber of Ft. Myers, Florida started using steroids in high school and as an adult began selling them to support his expensive career. Bieber went into business with fellow bodybuilder Markus Mueller, a German who was able to smuggle the drugs into the U.S. from Europe. Bieber had an affair with Mueller's girlfriend, Danielle LaBelle, and subsequently married her. In February 1995, Bieber drove LaBelle to Mueller's home to retrieve her purse while he waited in the car. When LaBelle found Mueller dead in the doorway she suspected that Bieber had killed him. Two men admitted to police that Bieber had hired them to kill Mueller, but before he could be arrested, Bieber disappeared. He bought the birth certificate of a deceased child, Nathan Wayne Coleman, and took on his identity and, in 1996, fled to Leeds, England where he was undiscovered for almost eight years. On Dec. 26, 2003, Leeds police approached a car that was parked strangely on the side of the road. The vehicle turned out to be stolen and the driver, Coleman, in the process of being handcuffed, opened fire on the three unarmed arresting officers and escaped. One officer died of his wounds and a nationwide manhunt was launched. Bieber was finally apprehended, tried for the murder of the police officer, and sentenced to life in prison. Danielle LaBelle divorced Bieber in 2003. There are no plans to try him for the murder of Markus Mueller. 03/04/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Highest Stakes"**- In October, 2005, Christie Wilson, a 27-year-old Sacramento, California woman went alone to Thunder Valley Casino to gamble -- and vanished. Four days after she was declared missing, police found that the casino's security system showed that she had left with Mario Garcia, a 53-year-old married father of two. It was discovered that Garcia had a prior criminal record including charges of rape, assault with a deadly weapon and spousal abuse. After lengthy investigation, police felt they had a case based on the following evidence: hairs found in Garcia's car; the casino video; and Garcia's appearance -- a black eye and facial scratches. Despite the absence of a murder weapon, eyewitnesses and physical evidence to prove that Christie Wilson is dead, Mario Garcia was arrested, charged with murder and will go to trial in April. - 03/11/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Texas Confidential"** - followup to "The Bookie's wife" (OAD: 01/11/02), a report on the 1997 murder of Doris Angleton, the wife of a successful Houston, Texas bookie. Doris' husband Bob, who claimed that his brother Roger was Doris' killer, was tried for the crime in state court and acquitted. More than three years later, federal prosecutors once more charged him with murder, planning to introduce new evidence -- an audio tape made by Vanessa Leggett, a true-crime writer who had interviewed Roger Angleton in jail. Four days before Bob's federal murder trial was to begin, he fled to Amsterdam where he was arrested by Dutch officials and charged with entering the country with forged documents. Angleton's lawyers cited an international treaty prohibiting the Dutch government from extraditing him to Texas to face murder charges a second time. In September 2004, Bob Angleton was brought back to the U.S. He pled guilty to passport and tax fraud and was sentenced to 12 years in federal prison. Once out of prison, the only way he can avoid another murder trial is to leave the U.S. permanently. (C: Richard Schlesinger - Sr. P: Al Briganti - P: Loen Kelley)
- 03/18/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Dark Side Of The Mesa"** - in November 2001 Michael Blagg, returned to his Grand Junction, Colorado home to find a bloody bed and an empty jewel box -- but no sign of his wife Jennifer or their six-year-old daughter Abby. When investigators learned that Blagg and his wife had argued over his addiction to hard-core pornography, Blagg became the prime suspect. When a search of the county landfill produced Jennifer's remains, the District Attorney charged Blagg with first degree murder. Michael Blagg was tried for murder in March of 2004, convicted and sentenced to life in prison. Abby has never been found. Includes interviews with: Steve King, Mesa County Sheriff's investigator; the Reverend Art Blankenship, pastor of the Blaggs' Evangelical Church, and his wife Rhonda; Marilyn Conway, Jennifer's mother; David Loman, her brother; David Eisner, Blagg's attorney; and District Attorney Frank Daniels. - 03/25/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Natalee Holloway: New Clues In Paradise"** - a report on new details into the search for Natalee Holloway, a U.S. teenager who disappeared on May 30, 2005 during a post-graduation trip in the Caribbean island of Aruba. Includes an exclusive interview with Gerald Dompig, the deputy chief of police in Aruba who is leading the investigation. Also includes interviews with Beth Holloway Twitty, Natalee's mother, and Dr. Ruben Cruz, head of Aruba's search and rescue team. (C: Troy Roberts - P: Doug Longhini, Josh Gelman, Miguel Sancho). Also included in this episode: **"Nightmare In Honduras"** - a report on the 2002 gunshot death of Randall Latona at his villa in Honduras. Honduran officials classified the death as a suicide. The family was awarded a \$2.5 million judgment and, though they do not expect to get any of the money, they hope to use the court judgment as leverage with Honduran officials to reopen the investigation into his death and prosecute Spiering for murder.
