ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

OVERVIEW

The following is the quarterly “Issues and Programs” Report placed in the public file of WNEM at the open of business day April 12, 2010. 530PM Jobs are coming back from Mexico to the United States through Ford Motor Company. They are making a \$450 million investment in their assembly plant in Michigan. The products are batteries and electric vehicles.	LOC/NEWS	1/12/10 1:13

5PM Governor Granholm announced thousands of new jobs coming to Michigan, with 500 of them earmarked for Midland. An Indian consulting company teams up with Dow Chemical to build a business protection services center in Midland. 4PM President Obama traveled to Baltimore to give details of his proposal to give small business a \$5,000 tax credit for every new employee they hire in 2010. The Treasury Department says the program could help one million businesses, and cost \$33 million.	NAT/NEWS	1/29/10 1:35

NOON LOC/NEWS 2/23/10 :24

Flint's mayor just announced specifics on a million dollar grant from the Mott Foundation. It will re-establish one foot patrol officer assigned to each ward, along with a sergeant to oversee the project. The grant will also allow for mini-stations in each ward.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/3/10 :41

There are 60 layoff notices coming from Flint City offices as part of the latest round of budget cuts. Public safety workers are not impacted but the cuts will affect a variety of jobs, from customer services to parks.

530PM NAT/NEWS 3/5/10 1:38

There are 14.9 million unemployed Americans in the United States with 36,000 more added in February. Fewer jobs were lost than expected, and the unemployment rate is holding steady at 9.7 percent.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/16/10 :17

More than 1,800 new jobs are headed to Flint, thanks to some big tax credits from the State. The renewable energy and information technology company, or RASCO, plans to invest \$18.5 million to bring its headquarters to the area.

6PM LOC/NEWS 3/25/10 1:23

Local residents are starting to question how safe they'll feel going to Flint businesses or events now that fewer police will be securing the city. Residents have safety concerns now that the city is cutting 46 police officers. Concerned citizens picketed in front of the mini police station on Flint's south side.

2. Economy/Business Cuts

6PM LOC/NEWS 1/4/10 1:15

The CEO of Midland Tomorrow focused on bringing money and businesses to the community. He said the economy is changing on a worldwide basis, with alternative energy driving some of the changes. As General Motors re-invents itself, the year 2010 will show cars produced differently across the state.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/22/10 1:20

Local General Motors retirees say the company's bankruptcy has hit him in the wallet. Retirees recently found out their worker's compensation is getting cut. In talking with the UAW Local 668 president, he says the worker comp cuts stem from the Chapter 11 bailout process.

6PM NAT/NEWS 3/24/10 :25
The U.S. Postal Service takes its first formal step toward cutting back mail delivery. They've asked the Independent Postal Regulatory Commission for an opinion on dropping Saturday service. Under the proposal, standard mail delivery and pick-up would be limited to Monday through Friday.

3. Crime

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/6/10 1:42
A 23-year-old man is charged with trying to blow up a plane flying into Detroit on Christmas Day. The man was on a "no-fly" list, had known extremist links, paid cash for his ticket and had no luggage. He was still able to board an Amsterdam flight to Detroit. President Obama is expected to apprise the American public of what security breaches caused this to happen.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/15/10 :33
Lapeer law officials are searching for a man involved in a domestic abuse incident. The suspect fled the area and was spotted driving his truck across a frozen lake, where he crashed his vehicle. He has a shotgun and rifle, and police continue to search for his whereabouts.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/17/10 1:30
A man is shot to death in his home, and neighbors are now uneasy. They say the victim had not lived in their neighborhood very long, and they did not know him well.

4PM LOC/NEWS 1/25/10 :18
State Police search for a person who shot and killed an 18-year-old Bridgeport woman. The victim was driving through the township early Saturday morning when she was killed. Police have no suspects in this case.

4PM LOC/NEWS 2/9/10 :26
Two Bay City teens are accused of vandalizing a local high school. The 12-year-old boys broke into a concession stand at the football field, snacked on hot dos and pop, and then set a box on fire. Police say both will be charged with larceny and arson.

6PM LOC/NEWS 2/19/10 1:00
Two local car dealers face charges tonight for stealing cars from a dealer. They then sold them off to other car lots using phony titles. Authorities say they are part of a statewide auto theft ring.

5PM LOC/NEWS 2/23/10 :20
More than a dozen guns stolen from a St. Charles gun dealer have been recovered. Police say an employee from the sporting goods store took them. The suspect was arrested after investigators found the weapons and thousands of pounds of ammunition in his home

5PM LOC/NEWS 2/26/10 1:24
A jury has been seated for the man accused of killing a Shiawassee County pro-life supporter, and a businessman. The family of the suspect says Harlan Drake suffers from depression and was having trouble with his medication. Family members of the victims could not comment as they are subpoenaed for the trial.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/9/10 1:54
Harlan Drake testified for 6 hours, saying he shot a man four times because he didn't like the sign he was holding. He says he shot another man because he had quarreled with his mother. Drake, who pleads insanity was calm, cool collected and cold his testimony about killing the 2 Owosso residents.

5PM LOC/NEWS 3/16/10 1:17
An Essexville woman was shot to death after hitting a man in the head with a hammer. After the suspect shot the woman, he came out of the house, sat his revolver down, called 911, and waited for the police to arrive. The woman's 9 month old baby was inside, but wasn't harmed.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/17/10 1:20
He's a con man, felon, repeat parolee violator named Richard Short who dashed the dreams of hundreds of unemployed workers when he got busted for not paying restitution. A few days ago Richard Short shared the stage with Governor Granholm, set to take \$9 million worth of tax breaks to create jobs in mid-Michigan.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/20/10 1:43
The con man Richard Short, who even fooled the Governor's office has 24 new charges added to his file. Investigators say he stole an ATM card and money from a woman who was 86 and suffered from dementia.

4. Politics

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/6/10 :21
The Mayor of Flint lists his priorities, which include reducing crime by 10 percent and decreasing the number of unemployed people. His city has 26.8 percent unemployment, with murders up by almost 6 percent from the previous year.

4PM NAT/NEWS 1/14/10 1:32
For the first time since taking office, President Obama's approval rating has slipped below the halfway point. The latest CBS poll indicates 36 percent of Americans approve of his health care reform tactics, and 41 percent think he's doing a good job regarding the economy. The president gets high marks for handling terrorist threats.

6PM LOC/NEWS 1/18/10 1:43
Flint's mayor celebrates Martin Luther King Day at a local library, giving area residents opportunity to sound off on local and national issues. Conversation centered around President Obama's slip in the public approval rating and what caused it.

11PM NAT/NEWS 1/27/10 1:18
In his first State of the Union address, President Obama focused on the economy. He announced a task force to tackle the deficit, didn't back down from his health care reform plan and proposed taking money paid back by Wall Street to assist small businesses.

11PM LOC/NEWS 2/3/10 :45
In her final State of the State address, Governor Granholm laid out plans to build a new economy and outlined a number of success stories. She said, despite their struggles, the auto industry remains a big part of Michigan's economy, as they turn to more fuel efficient vehicles.

6PM LOC/NEWS 2/4/10 :46
Saginaw County Commission's State of the County address today summarized the county is losing money from all key revenue sources. Falling property values are also costing the county with the general fund expected to take a 10 percent revenue loss. The county faces a \$2.3 million deficit.

5PM LOC/NEWS 2/11/10 1:47
The state budget faces a \$1.5 billion budget deficit next year. The governor says lawmakers don't have the votes for a cuts-only budget, while legislators say the governor's tax on services is unlikely to pass.

530PM LOC/NEWS 2/25/10 :44
During his State of the City address, Flint's mayor discussed cuts to the police and fire departments and called on city employees to help trim a projected budget deficit.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/2/10 1:13
Many say Michigan Travel's mismanagement is just one example of the state's outlandish spending habits, while state workers make up for it. A state-employed M-DOT mechanic says when he hired in, there were 20 operators and 3 mechanics. He says now there are 2 mechanics and 7 operators, doing the same amount of work and using the same amount of equipment.

6PM LOC/NEWS 3/16/10 1:39
Governor Granholm announces over 7,000 new jobs will be created in Michigan this month. One of the biggest contributors is Spyker Cars who now own SAAB. RASCO is another company coming to Flint to who uses renewable energy to provide developing nations with essential utilities.

NOON LOC/NEWS 3/19/10 :33
A special meeting is held to discuss the City Hall roof project. Mayor Brunner vetoed the roof project, but was overrode by a vote of 6 to 2 by the City Commission. The Firefighter's union says the money could be used to put firefighters back to work.

5. Natural Disasters

11PM NAT/NEWS 1/12/10 1:30
One of the poorest country's in the Western Hemisphere, Haiti has suffered a huge earthquake, hitting 10 miles southwest of the capital, which is Port Au Prince. Many aftershocks followed with countless homes destroyed, sides of cliffs have sheared off, crashing below on to streets, with everything in total chaos.

5PM LOC/NEWS 1/13/10 1:07
A local missionary who has devoted her life to the people of Haiti waits to see if the school she helped build there survived the quake which rocked the country several days ago. She had planned to purchase a building next week, in Haiti, to house orphans.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/15/10 :29
A Genesee County deputy heads to Haiti to bring his injured daughter back. His mother and sister are missing, his brother is dead, and his daughter has several back injuries. Co-workers donated their own vacation and personal time and contributed over \$1,000 to assist him in this journey to his homeland.

530PM LOC/NEWS 1/21/10 1:11
Two nuns, who are also surgeons, travel to Haiti tonight to help earthquake victims. They prepare themselves for the many difficulties which await them including primitive living and working conditions and limited supplies.

5PM LOC/NEWS 1/29/10 1:36
Volunteers struggle to provide assistance to Haitians with medical supplies running low at hospitals and clinics. A Hemlock girl who watches their struggles on television decided to fill backpacks with needed items for the children of Haiti. She would like others to follow her example.

6. Health/Health Care Reform

530PM NAT/NEWS 1/12/10 :17
Officials now say they may have ordered too much H1N1 vaccine. Health officials say the H1N1 virus is still out there and encourage those who haven't yet, get vaccinated.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/14/10 :27
Today one Michigan family says they have been fighting for universal health care for the past 65 years. Back in 1943, John Dingell Senior introduced the first Congressional plan for universal health care. When he died, his son took over his seat, and is now the longest serving member of Congress. Congressman Dingell has introduced a universal health care bill at the beginning of every congressional session.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/19/10 1:36
A lot of Michigan people are angry that state lawmakers have healthcare for the rest of their lives, an expense paid for by the taxpayers. A group of house and senate democrats are trying to end the rule in order to trim the state budget.

NOON NAT/NEWS 1/21/10 :18
House Democrats meet today to discuss the future of the health care reform bill. It comes after a Republican won the special Senate election in Massachusetts earlier this week, ending the democratic 60-vote super majority.

NOON LOC/NEWS 2/3/10 :31
Lawmakers in Lansing voted to eliminate lifetime health care coverage for future state lawmakers. Current law allows former lawmakers who served at least 6 years in office to get full paid state health insurance once they turn 55. The new bill would end the practice for anyone newly elected after 2010.

5PM LOC/NEWS 2/5/10 :19
Today, employees at HealthPlus of Michigan and its Flint Township headquarters will be dressed in red. Also the building will be illuminated in red lights throughout the weekend to recognize the American Heart Association's "Go Red for Women" campaign, raising awareness of women's risk for heart disease.

530PM NAT/NEWS 2/18/10 1:32
The annual report from the CDC on the nation's health shows men and women live longer—to 78 years on average, up from 75 in 1990. An aging population means more diseases and chronic conditions, with more tests necessary, more anti-diabetic and cholesterol-lowering drugs needed

5PM NAT/NEWS 2/22/10 1:30
President Obama is taking control of the healthcare debate. Today the White House unveiled its 10-year, one trillion dollar plan on its website. The plan requires most Americans to have health insurance and offers federal help for those who can't afford it. The plan also gives the government new power over insurance companies.

5PM NAT/NEWS 3/3/10 1:23
Today, President Obama made his final offer on health care reform. He is now proposing a mix of the healthcare bill that passed the Senate and a handful of Republican ideas. Republicans say it's not enough. Without Republican support, a "reconciliation" procedure may be brought into the process, which requires only a simple majority of 51 votes in the Senate and prevents a filibuster.

NOON NAT/NEWS 3/18/10 1:19
According to a CBS News tally, 67 Democrats either plan to vote no or are on the fence. Those members are getting many calls from constituents on both sides have House lines overloaded. Republicans remain unified in their opposition and are warning Democrats not to use a parliamentary short cut to pass this legislation.

NOON NAT/NEWS 3/22/10 1:30
A national survey indicates 56 percent of all Americans don't understand the new health care bill. The new bill affects different people in different ways. It does give health care coverage to 32 million Americans who don't have it now.

5PM NAT/NEWS 3/25/10 1:30
President Obama announces "Health insurance reform is the law of the land all across America." The president immediately began touring the country to sell the new healthcare reform law to skeptical Americans. Back in Washington, Congress was putting the finishing touches on the final part of healthcare reform.

7. Weather

6PM LOC/NEWS 1/9/10 1:20
Today is the coldest day of winter in the area, but TV5 found many people out with no protection from the extreme cold or wind chill. Doctors recommend dressing in layers and coming indoors should you suspect the beginnings of frostbite.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/15/10 1:14
Warmer weather has created melting conditions in the area which contributed to the death of a man found lying face down on the ice about 2 miles east of Linwood Road. Another call was received by Central Dispatch for a person on a four wheeler who fell through the ice, but was able to make it out all right.

6PM NAT/NEWS 1/23/10 :19
The Olympic games are just 20 days away with officials there starting to worry about the lack of snow. The slopes of Cyprus Mountain, where the ski and snowboard events will be held, have little snow on them. They have been closed to visitors to preserve what snow is there.

530PM LOC/NEWS 1/27/10 2:22
Flint residents begin cleanup of the most recent snowstorm, even before the final flakes had stopped. A man shoveling his drive pays a good Samaritan, who stopped to assist him in clearing his driveway.

11PM LOC/NEWS 2/6/10 2:10
As the winds pick up on the Saginaw Bay, anglers pack up and head home, saying it's too dangerous. When winds blow hard, ice shifts, falling snow decreases visibility, all making it more difficult for fishermen to figure out if their on ice or open water. DNR officials recommend staying off Lake Huron under these conditions, as anything else is a recipe for disaster.

5PM LOC/NEWS 2/10/10 1:06
The sounds of winter were heard again today, which included snowblowers, tires spinning, and the scraping of snow shovels. Area families were out in full force cleaning away the latest winter storm; the children know once the work is done there's sledding to be had at the nearest hill.

5PM LOC/NEWS 2/11/10 1:46
Parents fume over the Midland Schools' decision to remain open when more than 230 districts in the area closed. They felt the school did so because it was a student count day. The superintendent said he would never put money before student safety and said the Midland area did not experience the same severe road conditions as other mid-Michigan areas.

11PM LOC/NEWS 2/26/10 1:15
Another mid-Michigan winter snowfall results in accidents and a busy night for local towing companies. Accident victims all said the same thing--they didn't see the ice underneath overpasses and bridges.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 3/8/10 :21
Today marks the one year anniversary when strong winds pushed large ice floes from the Saginaw Bay onto the shoreline of Linwood lakefront residents. A year ago, 36 homes were evacuated with some homeowners reporting ice as far as 12 feet inside their homes.

11PM NAT/NEWS 3/20/10 :21
The Red River is expected to crest tomorrow at 19.5 feet above flood state. The city is confident it is prepared to fight back the swelling river. Homeowners are making last minute preparations—piling sandbags and inspecting dikes.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 3/22/10 :14
Blizzard conditions through Oklahoma and the southern plains caused at least five deaths in four states. Some places reported 8 to 12 inches of snow.

5PM NAT/NEWS 3/30/10 1:33
In Rhode Island and Massachusetts, intense rain has officials ordering mandatory evacuations and the National Guard filling 3,000 sandbags in 24 hours. One New Jersey river is already at flood stage, as the dam keeps some homes from being swamped. President Obama has already issued disaster declarations for many areas.

8. Alternative Energy/Green

6PM NAT/NEWS 1/8/10 :20
President Obama wants to reimburse homeowners who invest in energy efficiency. The plan, known as Home Star, would give rebates up to \$3,000 for energy saving purchases like new appliances, furnaces, or insulation.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 1/11/10 :22
The Hemlock Semiconductor company is getting more than \$141 million in tax credits. It's part of billions of dollars in credits, President Obama announced for new clean energy manufacturing. Dow Corning is also receiving more than \$27 million in credits that are intended to create jobs in the green energy industry.

11PM LOC/NEWS 1/15/10 :15
Work continues on the \$115 million expansion project at Mid-Michigan Medical Center in Midland. In addition to the added benefits for patients, the new facility will also be environmentally friendly. The "green design" focuses on safeguarding water and energy efficiency, as well as conserving materials and resources.

5PM LOC/NEWS 1/20/10 1:21
The Union president for Local 900 is excited about the new growth in battery technology coming to Genesee County. Factories will need to be remodeled in order to manufacture this new technology, such as the facelift happening at a Michigan truck plant.

6PM LOC/NEWS 2/13/10 1:29
The Saginaw County treasurer says the county may buy homes in an area targeted for a massive revitalization project, encouraging those residents to relocate. The project would

use about \$2.5 million of stimulus money to transform the neighborhood into a green zone that could be used for urban gardens.

6PM LOC/NEWS 2/15/10 1:37
Vice President Joe Biden is coming to Delta College, focusing on the Recovery Act. Mr. Biden will inspect programs at the college and Hemlock Semiconductor to see how they impact mid-Michigan residents.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/17/10 1:36
The wastewater treatment plant in Flint Township houses an alternative energy source. The new technology is expected to cut down dependency of foreign oil and diminish city and state deficits. The biogas technology can be used to power up fleets of buses and public safety vehicles.

6PM LOC/NEWS 3/2/10 1:32
Today President Obama proposed a new round of energy efficiency rebates. Area companies are excited about the business potential. The savings out the door would be big, and the savings continue with lowered operating costs.

6PM LOC/NEWS 3/15/10 :23
Because of a \$538,000 stimulus grant, STAR buses are going green. The funding will be used to buy mini-hybrid thermal conversion kits. The devices make full-sized buses more energy efficient, and mean a quieter ride.

5PM LOC/NEWS 3/16/10 1:39
A new company plans to set up shop in Flint, building a facility near the old Buick site. RASCO uses renewable energy, like wind, to provide essential utilities like electricity and water to developing nations. The Michigan Economic Growth Authority granted that company \$9.1 million in tax credits over the next 7 years.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/25/10 :17
The Great Lakes Wind Council held a special open house at Saginaw Valley State University, to talk about the state's wind energy potential. After the presentation, the Council took questions, and were seeking feedback on several proposed wind projects in the Saginaw Bay region.

9. Sex Offenders/Predators

6PM LOC/NEWS 1/8/10 1:23
A sexual assault happened early in the morning at an apartment complex near Central Michigan University. The male suspect went around, trying to push I doors, until he found one that was unlocked. He is still on the loose.

NOON LOC/NEWS 1/11/10 :29
A man is behind bars on a \$2 million bond, charged with raping a woman near the Central Michigan University campus. Investigators say the suspect specifically looked for an unlocked apartment. The Isabella County Sheriff warns folks to always lock doors and windows at night.

530PM LOC/NEWS 1/22/10 1:17
A former Detroit Lions player is in jail tonight, accused of sexual misconduct with a minor. Tommy Boyd is now a high school track coach for Fraser Public Schools. Prosecutors say an inappropriate relationship went on for two years at that school system.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 1/29/10 :28
A 15th alleged mistress of golf legend, Tiger Woods, has come forth to comment on Tiger Woods now reportedly seeking rehabilitation for his sexual addiction. She tells the New York Times Tiger Woods would engage in sex from “9 p.m. until the sun rose.”

4PM LOC/NEWS 2/4/10 1:26
A Detroit mother is accused of letting a convicted sex offender take suggestive photographs of her young daughter, where they were then sold on-line. She is out of jail tonight, on bond, while her case moved through Federal court in Detroit.

11PM LOC/NEWS 2/17/10 :16
Gladwin police continue searching for a missing sex offender. During a recent sweep in Gladwin County, investigators found that the offender apparently moved without notifying the state.

6PM LOC/NEWS 2/22/10 3:23
A Genesee County man is found guilty of sexually abusing children who were friends of his own son, and during cub scout and boy scout camping trips. The suspect originally gave police a confession, which he later retracted. Parents say their children are trying to live as normally as possible and that counseling is underway.

11PM LOC/NEWS 2/24/10 :54
According to the State’s sex offender registration act, homeless people do not have an address, so they don’t have to register it with the State. This is how a local man avoided prosecution. He was homeless and didn’t register an address, shocking neighbors who now have him living near them. The State’s legislator will have to address the loophole.

11PM LOC/NEWS 3/9/10 :18
Nearly 180 people have been arrested, after a statewide round-up of sex offenders. Another 250 warrants have been requested by police. In Mt. Pleasant, police discovered ten offenders were not at their registered addresses.

4PM LOC/NEWS 3/19/10 1:33
Pope Benedict has finally agreed to punish priests for past abuse to children in Ireland. An investigation revealed decades of sexual abuse and cover-ups involving 15,000 children. An Irish cardinal continues to face calls to resign for remaining silent for 35 years over cases of abuse. The scandal has shaken the Catholic Church across Europe, as more people step forward with allegations of abuse.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 3/24/10 :25
A Saginaw Township woman is accused of trading sex with her 10-year-old granddaughter for cocaine. The woman habitually allowed a 67-year-old man to sexually assault her granddaughter for drugs. Investigators learned of the trade, after the man allegedly touched another young woman in an inappropriate way, and she went to the police. The man is still on the loose.

11PM LOC/NWS 3/27/10 1:23

The 10-year-old's grandmother is also in jail for allowing the man to sexually assault her granddaughter, in return for drugs. Police give credit to the local and national media, along with citizens on the street, which led to the suspect's apprehension.

As the kidnapers drove them onto a dirt road in the mountains outside Tijuana, they began asking about a race car. While in Mexico, Chris and Tyler worked as part of a pit crew at the Baja 1000. When Chris explained that there was no race car, the men ransacked the family's trailer and then took them farther into the mountains. The gunmen put the family in a ditch and threw sleeping bags over them. As the Hall family lay hugging in the ditch, the men drove away. Ultimately the Halls crawled through the brush in the night to a house where a woman took them in and called police for help. Despite her assurances that they could trust these officers, the family could not help but fear they were in danger all over again. The authorities rushed them to the border. For the moment they were safe, but with the gunmen in possession of their drivers' licenses and their address, they will carry the memory of that traumatic night with them. Mexican authorities never investigated the kidnapping, and the Halls still don't know who their assailants were. Drug gangs in Mexico are known to wear police uniforms as a way to trap their victims. The charges against Welborn and Pierce were dropped. Scott and Springsteen each stood trial for murder. Both were convicted, with Springsteen sentenced to death and Scott sentenced to life in prison. On appeal, the convictions were overturned when DNA evidence did not match any of the suspects. It was from an unknown male. The Travis County District Attorney, Rosemary Lehmberg, says there is no statute of limitations for murder, and they will continue the investigation until the person(s) responsible for these murders are brought to justice. For now Scott and Springsteen are free; and the girls' families are still dealing with the deaths of their daughters. The son of legendary gambling impresario Benny Binion, Ted was a brilliant casino operator himself. Paranoid about his wealth, he stashed millions of dollars worth of silver in a hidden vault in Pahrump, Nevada. Ted was also addicted to smoking heroin. Prior to his death, he became involved with Sandy Murphy, and it was she who told police in September 1998 that she had found him dead of an apparent drug overdose. However Binion's sister, Becky Binion Behnen, insisted to police that this was no drug overdose and demanded an investigation. Police discovered that Sandy was having an affair with Rick Tabish, and theorized that they were trying to steal Ted's buried treasure. Both were charged with his murder and both were found guilty of murder in the first degree. While imprisoned, Sandy contacted Alan Dershowitz, who agreed to take on her appeal. The Nevada Supreme Court agreed with Dershowitz's arguments and overturned both convictions. After the second trial, both Murphy and Tabish were found not guilty of murder, but were found guilty of stealing Binion's buried silver from the Pahrump vault. Many believe that much of Binion's money is still missing. 48 HOURS retained ground sonar experts to search the Binion estate, which had remained empty since his death; nothing was found. Tabish remains in prison because of a prior record; Murphy returned to California where she married an art dealer. Tabish's latest bid for parole is under consideration. Murphy is suing the state of Nevada, alleging false imprisonment and malicious prosecution. Theresa had recently separated from police officer husband Sam Parker, whom she had married in 1993. One night, after visiting her sister Christina Hall, Theresa vanished. Police found her car at Theresa and Sam's house, but there was no sign of her and no obvious signs of foul play. Police investigation revealed that Sam was an abusive husband with a drinking problem. When investigators found vacuum marks, Theresa's blood and Sam Parker's DNA in the back of Theresa's SUV, he was arrested and charged with his wife's murder. Prosecutors believed that Sam had murdered Theresa, drove off and disposed of her body. Parker insisted he had not killed his wife and suspected that she had run off to Mexico. The jurors said the task of deciding Sam Parker's fate was particularly daunting because they had an overwhelming amount of circumstantial evidence, but not much else. After three days of deliberation, the jurors seemed hopelessly deadlocked. The judge urged them to give it one more try. After a closer look at cell phone records, the jury found him guilty of first-degree murder. He was immediately sentenced to life in prison. Theresa's family believes that Parker may be the only one who holds the key to finding Theresa's body, but he still insists that he did not kill her and does not know where she is. "Thou Shalt Not Kill" - a report on the November 1994 murder of Farah Fratta, whose body was discovered in the garage of her Humble, Texas home. She had been shot twice in the head. At the time of her death, Farah was in the midst of a divorce. To the outside world, her husband Bob Fratta was an upstanding citizen, who worked in public safety as both a police officer and a fireman. But divorce documents were about to make his dark side public, revealing his strange sexual requests that not only embarrassed Farah, but also sickened her. Bob Fratta seemed the likeliest suspect in his wife's murder, but he had a seemingly airtight alibi: he was at church with their three children as his wife was being murdered. Investigators worked to build their case against Fratta, and four months later they got an unexpected break. Tracing his phone records from the night of his wife's murder led them to a mysterious woman, Mary Gipp, who claimed that she could have prevented Farah's murder. She knew that her boyfriend had been hired by Fratta to kill his wife. Informed by police that she would be charged with murder, she made a deal and was given immunity for her testimony. Her boyfriend, Joe Prystash, had been hired by Fratta to arrange the murder and Prystash had hired Howard Guidry to be the trigger man. Guidry and Prystash were arrested and confessed. Fratta was arrested and charged with murdering his wife. After the trial, it took less than one hour to convict him. He was sentenced to death, along with Prystash and Guidry. Thirteen years after the murder, a federal judge threw out Fratta's conviction and ordered a new trial because the judge said there was testimony linking Fratta to the murder that should never have been admitted. At the new trial, after two days of jury deliberation, Fratta was found guilty of capital murder. The jury decided to send Fratta back to death row. He now plans to appeal his conviction. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Time To Kill" - A report on the September 12, 2001 disappearance of Michele Harris, a resident of Tioga County, New York. Michele, a mother of four, was involved in a bitter divorce with her husband, Cal Harris. He claimed she did not return home on the evening of September 11, 2001; her empty van was discovered at the end of their driveway the next morning. Cal denied any involvement and when no evidence was found during a search of the Harris home, he suggested to investigators that they take a closer look at Michele's personal life. Investigators uncovered that Michele was involved with two different men, both of whom had seen Michele the night she disappeared. Two days after the initial search, a forensic specialist was sent to the Harris home and found tiny specks of blood on a kitchen doorway, something that had been overlooked during the initial investigation. With the discovery of a possible crime scene, as well as Cal's refusal to take a polygraph, focus was placed on Cal, who began a relationship with a former girlfriend just eighteen days after Michele's disappearance. On September 30, 2005, Cal Harris was arrested and charged with murder. The trial began on May 21, 2007 and ultimately, he was found guilty of second degree murder. Just days before Cal Harris was to be sentenced, a new witness came forward and claimed to have driven past the Harris driveway around dawn on September 12, 2001 and had seen a man and a woman, who appeared to be arguing. According to this new eyewitness, the woman resembled Michele, but the man did not look like Cal. With this new information, the judge threw out Cal's conviction for the murder of his wife and ordered a new trial. It will be at least a year before Cal Harris is tried again. **Update for this second rebroadcast:** In July of 2009, Cal Harris once again went on trial. After a three-week trial, the jury found him guilty again. Harris was sentenced to twenty-five years to life in prison. He plans to appeal for a third trial. The search for Michele's body continues. A resident of Katy, Texas, Belinda was married to David Temple, once the celebrated defensive linebacker at his high school and now a successful and respected football coach, and mother to their one son, Evan. After an afternoon of errands with Evan, David returned home to what appeared to be forced entry and found Belinda in the couple's bedroom closet, shot in the head. Homicide detectives believed that the crime scene had been staged -- nothing was stolen from the home and the way the pieces of glass fell from the broken back door of the Temple's home seemed unusual, as if the glass was broken with the door already opened. Detectives were also troubled when they learned that David was having an affair with a fellow teacher, Heather Scott, who eventually became his second wife. Three months after the crime, a grand jury was convened, but nobody was indicted. With no DNA evidence, no eyewitnesses, no murder weapon, and no incriminating fingerprints linking David Temple to the crime, years passed until 2004, when Scott Peterson was convicted of killing his pregnant wife in a trial that captured the nation's attention. The similarities in both murders gave authorities a renewed confidence in their circumstantial case against David. Prosecutor Kelly Siegler finally got some forensic evidence, when after years of laboratory snafus and delays, a critical FBI report came back and indicated traces of gunshot residue on David's jacket. On November 29th, 2004, David was arrested for the murder of his wife, Belinda. After a contentious trial with David's attorney, Dick DeGuerin, David was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. He will be eligible for parole in 2037, when he will be 69 years old. David Temple has appealed his conviction. He is waiting for the decision. After a month of testimony, Moore is found not guilty of the crime. Moore has moved away from Alabama after receiving death threats and plans to sue the city of Decatur and police for violating his right to a fair trial. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Cry for Innocence" - A report on Damien Echols, who has been on death row in Arkansas for the past 16 years, convicted of murdering three eight-year-old boys: Stevie Branch, Chris Byers and Michael Moore. At the time, amidst a country-wide media-fueled hysteria about Satanic cults, Damien, because of his affinity for long hair and dressing in black became a prime suspect, along with friends Jason Baldwin and Jesse Misskelley. The trio, known as the West Memphis Three, were convicted of triple-murder: Misskelley and Baldwin sentenced to life in prison, while Damien Echols received the death penalty. The police had no evidence linking Echols to the crime until Misskelley, whose lawyer says he has the mental capabilities of a five-year-old and barely knew Echols, confessed to helping him and Jason Baldwin commit the murders -- although many of the facts he recounted about the crime were incorrect. Misskelley was tried first, convicted and sentenced. Echols and Baldwin went on trial together: Misskelley refused to testify against them, and by law his confession could not be used against them. Still, they were convicted. As word of this case spread, so did the outrage over what many believed was a grave injustice. Members of the entertainment community, including actor Johnny Depp and musicians Natalie Maines and Eddie Vedder, came to their support. An HBO documentary, "Paradise Lost", and a book by Mara Leveritt entitled "Devil's Knot", detailed flaws in the case and now, forensic scientists have challenged the causes of the wounds inflicted on the victims, and sworn affidavits have revealed possible jury misconduct and new DNA evidence points away from the three convicted men and towards someone unexpected -- Terry Hobbs, Steve Branch's step-father at the time of the murders. As Echols prepares to take his case to federal court, he has some unexpected support from the parents of two of the victims: Mark Byers and Pam Branch, who now agree that justice has not been served. Born in Lebanon, she came to the U.S. at age nineteen and arranged a sham marriage as a shortcut to citizenship. In 2005, FBI agents questioned her about her connections with her brother-in-law, a Lebanese restaurant owner named Talal Chahine, who was associated with Hezbollah, which was backed by Iran and on the U.S. terrorism list. She was accused of viewing classified information in the FBI ACS computer system without authorization. The CIA, however, did its own investigation and completely exonerated her of any wrongdoing. At the conclusion of her trial, Federal Judge Avern Cohn blasted the U.S. Attorney's Office for its overly zealous pursuit, but, because of the law regarding Prouty's sham marriage, he was forced to revoke her citizenship. She was fined nine hundred and seventy-five dollars, and released. The judge also blocked her deportation to Lebanon. Also interviewed is Bob Grenier, former CIA station chief in Pakistan. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Lady In The Pool" - on July 22, 2008, Michael Roseboro, a funeral director in Denver, Pennsylvania, called 911 to report that he had just found the body of his wife, Jan, at the bottom of their swimming pool. Less than an hour later, she was pronounced dead at the hospital. An autopsy revealed that she had been strangled, beaten and then drowned: her death was ruled a homicide. As police conducted their investigation, an unexpected tip revealed that Michael was having an affair with Angela Funk, a married mother of two who lived near the Roseboro funeral home. Ten days after Jan's death, Angela informed Michael that she was pregnant with his child. On the following day, Michael Roseboro was arrested and charged with the first-degree murder of his wife. His trial began on July 13, 2009. The District Attorney stated that Roseboro's obsession with Angela Funk was his motive for killing his wife. He was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Girl Who Knew Too Much" - a report on the 1992 murder of 19-year-old Mischelle Lawless, whose bloodied body was found in an abandoned car on a desolate strip of highway in Benton, Missouri. As Deputy Sheriff Rick Walter was working on the crime scene, a local man, Mark Abbott, reported that he had seen the young woman in her car, and also told investigators that he saw a white car driving near the crime scene. Police questioned Lawless' boyfriend, Leon Lamb, but could find nothing to tie him to the crime, and he passed a polygraph. Four months into the investigation, investigators got a break: 17-year-old Joshua Kezer had been held briefly in the county jail on assault charges, where, according to several inmates, he confessed to killing Lawless. Then Mark Abbott identified Kezer from a photo lineup as the driver of the white car he had seen near the crime scene. Police then charged Kezer with first-degree murder. During the trial, a young woman, Chantelle Crider, identified Kezer as having been at a party where he had words with Mischelle. However, no DNA, fingerprints or murder weapon linked Kezer to the scene. Nevertheless, Kezer was convicted and sentenced to 60 years in prison. The case haunted Rick Walter and in 2005, now sheriff, he re-opened the case. Soon the foundation on which Kezer's conviction was built began to crumble, as witnesses admitted to lying and evidence was questioned. Judge Richard Callahan agreed to review the case and was so disturbed by what he saw that instead of ordering a new trial, he declared Josh Kezer an innocent man. But someone killed Mischelle and high on the list of suspects is that local man, Mark Abbott, who was once a star witness for the prosecution. In fact, there are two Abbotts, Mark and his identical twin Matt. To this day, Walters is not sure which Abbott brother came in to report finding Mischelle, and two people in the office say that it was his brother Matt. Leon Lamb also remains a suspect. With the help of forensics experts at a "crime farm" in the Netherlands, who have examined DNA evidence, Walters hopes further investigation will allow him to bring the case to a grand jury. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "In Too Deep" - a followup to "In Too Deep" (OAD: 01/22/08), presenting a further examination of the story of Laura Hall, who was convicted and sent to prison for the crime of dismembering the body of Jennifer Cave in 2005. As previously detailed, she admitted to going to the apartment of her boyfriend Colton Pitonyak, at his request, and was confronted with the dead body of Cave in the bathtub. She then -- out of fear for her own life, she says -- drove Pitonyak, at his insistence, to Mexico. After their arrest, Hall was interrogated and charged with hindering the apprehension of Pitonyak. At his own trial, Pitonyak implied that Hall took part in the dismemberment of Jennifer Cave's body after her death. Put on trial for this crime, and for helping Pitonyak escape, she was found guilty and sentenced to five years in prison. However, after 17 months in jail, Laura Hall was released because a court ruled that her sentencing hearing wasn't fair. Her conviction was upheld and she is out on bond while prosecutors fight to put her back in jail. She could be sentenced to more time or released. And Pitonyak's new lawyer, says that they have new evidence and that Hall is also responsible for the murder. At Hall's new hearing, the judge rules against her: she's going back to jail. Her sentencing is set for May 2010, where she faces up to ten years in prison. Unless he wins a new trial, Pitonyak will be eligible for parole in 2033. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Secret Life Of Paige Birgfeld" - A report on the June 28, 2007 disappearance of Paige Birgfeld, twice-divorced mother of three and a resident of Grand Junction, Colorado and the subsequent double-life uncovered by investigators following her disappearance. Following her 2006 divorce, Paige became the primary caregiver to her children and was described as such a devoted mother that the Mesa County Sheriff's Department was convinced she would never have left on her own accord. As friends and family searched for her; her car was found abandoned and on fire in an empty lot. Her first husband, Ron Beigler became the focus of the investigation, when it was learned that the two had been on a date the day of her disappearance, but Paige's friends and family were far more suspicious of the children's father, Rob Dixon, as she had a troubled history with him. After a thorough inquiry, both men had solid alibis. As the investigation continued, it was discovered that Paige was also known as Carrie, a high-priced escort. Her family suspected she had money issues. Investigators then began to believe Paige was murdered by one of her clients. Using her cell phone records, police began carefully looking at all of her clients and eventually honed in on one man, Lester Ralph Jones, an ex-con who had served time for kidnapping and assault. Authorities searched his home, but will not discuss what evidence they uncovered. Search dogs led investigators from Paige's car to an RV shop where Jones worked as a mechanic. Although authorities have zeroed in on Lester Ralph Jones, no charges have been filed and he denies any involvement. The lack of a body, coupled with Paige's secret life, have made it that much harder to prove anything beyond a reasonable doubt. Her friends and family continue their search.
