## **ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT**

530PM A local newspaper reports 10 new jobs are coming to Cass City. The Village Council Approved a tax abatement for \$3.4 million in new equipment and facilities for Walbro Engine management. 5PM A small software development and consulting firm in Bay City will invest \$3 million over the next five years, beginning with plans to renovate its Washington Avenue office to house I.T. software writers. 6PM Genesys nurses welcomed a visit from Teamster's General President, Jim Hoffa. Mr. Hoffa showed up at a rally being held by the nurses calling attention to stalled negotiation talks. 6PM Huron Casting, located in Pigeon received a \$2.1 million grant and \$20 million in private investments, to build a new casting facility in that town. The new operation will use a "no bake" molding process, allowing the company to produce much larger castings.	LOC/NEWS	5/19/08 :26

A trucking company in Bay City hopes to bring about 105 new high-tech jobs into the area with an expansion into software development. Tax credits given by the City and State will help make this happen.

5PM LOC/NEWS 6/2/08 :19

Bay City and Saginaw's GM Power Train may lose close to 400 workers, who plan to take buyout offers. Workers will start leaving by July 1, with 175 accepting buyouts in Bay City and 190 leaving from Saginaw Metal Casting Operations.

5PM LOC/NEWS 6/18/08 1:19

Within the next 5 years a Grand Blanc Township company hopes to grow from 13 to 90 employees. Azentek was planning to move their company to China, but after working with state and local leaders, they decided to stay in Michigan. They'll be hiring manufacturing and marketing specialists and engineers, selling high tech items like a computer in your car's dashboard which has enough memory for thousands of movies, plus a GPS unit, internet and music.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 6/24/08 :18

The former Delphi Steering facility in Buena Vista Township has eliminated 150 salaried positions and has been purchased by Platinum Equity out of Los Angeles. They plan to launch a new company some time this summer.

11PM LOC/NEWS 6/24/08 :19

The Genesys Hospital nurses ratified their contract with the hospital today. Voting ended several hours ago with approval of a 4-year deal. The contract had expired in early May.

## 2. Economy/Business

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 4/2/08 1:32

U.S. Federal Chairman Bernanke met privately with House Republicans highlighting the housing crisis as his greatest worry. He says he is not declaring the U.S. is in a recession, but points at the lack of consumer spending which is what is keeping the economy flat.

5PM LOC/NEWS 4/2/08 1:30

Wally Bronner passed away April 1, leaving many friends behind and a business legacy for Frankenmuth that put them on the world's map. Shoppers from all over the world would flock to Bronner's Christmas Wonderland, touted as the largest Christmas store in the world. Bronner billboards could be found as far south as Florida, and as far west as Missouri. More than 2 million people visit the store every year, helping make Frankenmuth one of Michigan's top tourist spots.

5PM LOC/NEWS Q 4/22/08 1:40

Today Governor Granholm made a stop near Pigeon to tour the Harvest Wind Farm. She's hoping Michigan will commit to renewable energy outlets. The Governor says tapping into alternative power outlets creates potential for new jobs. She then met with local business and state leaders, who agree that expanding green energy is one key to boosting the economy.

WEEKEND WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 4/27/08 1:30

Michigan has the worst unemployment rate in the nation, with the two worst counties to try and find a job being Saginaw and Genesee, according to the Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Growth. Graduates from Delta College will either move on to a four-year university or hope Delta's focus on specialized programs will give them an advantage over their peers.

6PM LOC/NEWS 5/1/08 1:30

A local Midland woman had just started a business at home to support her son, after her hours were cut back at work. Her apartment complex went up in smoke today when she and her neighbors lost everything in a fire. Four apartments were consumed in the flames and ten residents displaced.

11PM LOC/NEWS 5/1/08 1:36

Last year's Mountain Country and Rock festivals may have been local favorites in Clare County, but appear to be financial failures. Months ago, the I-team uncovered documents showing the festivals had many unpaid bills. Today an announcement was made that future festivals are on hold "until further notice."

NOON LOC/NEWS 5/13/08 :38

Retail giant Meijer Thrifty Acres, Inc. has been fined more than \$190,000 for a series of unreported expenditures in campaigns to defeat an Acme Township superstore moratorium in 2005 and to recall the Township Board in 2007. Acme Township is located near Traverse City.

11PM LOC/NEWS 5/26/08 1:34

AAA estimates 2 percent less Michiganians will take a road trip this Memorial weekend. That is down 2 percent from last year, with rising gas prices labeled the culprit. Some businesses along the M-13 corridor to the eastern Lake Huron shoreline report business not as brisk as other holidays, but the Northpoint Travel Center reported satisfied with the travel numbers.

530PM NAT/NEWS 6/9/08 1:45

Presidential candidate Barack Obama plan for an ailing economy involves a short-term plan to help working families, and a long-term agenda to make America competitive. Obama is taking a two-week tour of North Carolina to promote his economic plan.

11PM LOC/NEWS 6/10/08 1:15  
Flint City Council says budget cuts forced them to lay off more than 20 percent of their city police force. The cuts will be patrol officers with less than 5 years experience, forcing that department to make some tough choices.

5PM NAT/NEWS 6/26/08 1:30  
The Dow Jones industrial average sank to its lowest level in 2 years, closing today down about 300 points. Oil prices surging and new signs of trouble in the financial and automotive industry caused the drop.

6PM NAT/NEWS 6/30/08 :27  
Ford and GM stocks fell to new lows today, with the drop blamed on rising gas prices, and declining sales figures. Sales for the Big Three have been dropping, since gas prices started to rise in February. Chrysler announced it's closing a Missouri plant and cutting production at a second facility.

A man wearing black clothing and ski mask, with a gun demanded money at the NuVision Credit Union in Mt. Pleasant. He left with an undetermined amount of cash.

5PM LOC/NEWS 4/16/08 :35  
A sheriff's deputy and the Capac Police Chief have been shot. They were going to a home to tow a vehicle when they were shot by someone inside a home. That person is still believed to be inside the dwelling.

6PM LOC/NEWS 4/17/08 1:49  
Today 50-year-old Donald Burke was arrested early this morning, after giving police the slip right after he shot Capac's Police Chief. A vigil is being held for the chief this evening, who was shot twice by Burke. A St. Clair County sheriff's deputy was also grazed.

6PM LOC/NEWS 4/18/08 :25  
Capac's Police Chief has undergone a third surgery, after being shot earlier this week. The St. Clair County sheriff's deputy is in serious, but stable condition. The shooter, Donald Burke, is also complaining of chest pains and may have to undergo a heart procedure. He'll be arraigned, once he's released from the hospital.

WEEKEND WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 4/27/08 :23  
Two women are held at gunpoint for their purses after leaving a party store in Bridgeport Township. The suspect ran off with one of the women's purses and is still on the loose.

NOON LOC/NEWS 5/12/08 1:30  
A 16-year-old youth was sentenced to a mandatory life in prison, without parole for the murder of an 83-year-old Bay City woman which happened in June, 2007. A large group of the dead woman's family and friends were on hand for the sentencing.

6PM LOC/NEWS 5/14/08 1:29  
Today marked the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Saginaw Police Awards ceremony and memorial service, where officers killed in the line of duty are remembered for their service in times past. Every year the memorial provides solace for families of fallen officers.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/21/08 :26  
During a traffic stop by Buena Vista police, a passenger grabbed the wheel of the vehicle and tried to run over a deputy, who opened fire and wounded the man. The suspect was arrested a few hours later at his grandmother's house.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/28/08 1:18  
Saginaw firefighters have spent the last two days putting out suspicious fires in vacant homes, cleaning equipment and then being called right back out to the next fire at the next vacant home.

NOON LOC/NEWS 6/2/08 1:30  
Gunfire in Saginaw leads to two deaths, one of those a 12-year-old boy. In less than a day there have been at least four separate shootings across the city beginning with the 12-year-old being shot and killed at Tausend and Livingston on the city's southeast side.

11PM LOC/NEWS 6/2/08 1:34  
Moments after being appoint Flint City's new interim police chief, David Dicks found out his son had been shot, and killed. Neighbors watched as police tried to control large devastated crowds of family and friends. The victim had a long criminal record with numerous drug, home invasion, and B & E sentences, and serviced time in jail repeatedly.

6PM LOC/NEWS 6/13/08 1:43  
Tonight Saginaw police say two men, posing as police officers beat up a home owner, before taking off with some of his belongings. Police are looking for the suspects and asking for your help.

NOON LOC/NEWS 6/17/08 1:36  
A Bay City man is in police custody awaiting arraignment and charges in the murder of a 37 year-old woman. Officers were called last night to a home where they found the victim, who had apparently been dead for several days. The suspect is being held without bond in the Bay County Jail.

Nearly half of the country's underage drinkers say they got their alcohol from adults. A survey suggests that while girls start drinking before boys, eventually the boys catch up and surpass them as they near the legal drinking age.

## 7. Rising Gas Prices

NOON LOC/NEWS 4/1/08 :19

TV5 has reports of power lines being knocked down due to wind and lightning. Consumers Energy reports customers in Midland, Saginaw and Bay City without power.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 4/9/08 :11

Consumers Energy says it has customers in Flint and Saginaw without power right now with no word as to when it will be returned.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 4/12/08 :24

Residents in Genesee County, Saginaw and Bay Counties encountered one of the first severe storms of the season. Tornado sirens alerted residents to rain, hail and strong winds. No major damage was reported.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 5/8/08 :12

Heavy rain was received in Saginaw early this morning with lots of thunder and lightning.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/26/08 :17

High winds caused nearly 1,100 customers in the Birch Run area to be without power today. The wind knocked down trees and power lines.

530PM NAT/NEWS 5/26/08 1:30

Storms in Hugo, Minnesota left a large path of destruction including monster hail and death of a 2-year-old child. Iowa was another state that suffered tornado damage wiping out entire neighborhoods.

11PM LOC/NEWS 6/6/08 :20

Thousands are still without power as a result of storms early this evening. Saginaw, Flint and Isabella County experienced severe storms with the majority of residents not expecting power returned for another 48 hours.

11PM LOC/NEWS 6/6/08 1:15

Today's storm turned trees into road blocks, and left a few of them on top of houses today. Ojibway Island has branches covering the road and downed trees are everywhere.





NOON LOC/NEWS 6/30/08 1:14

Discounted gas prices at the Seven-Eleven on Gratiot in Saginaw is being offered starting at 11 a.m. today. This will continue until more than 4,000 gallons of gas have been pumped. A local credit union is sponsoring the gas discount.

## 9. Sex Offenders/Predators

5PM LOC/NEWS 4/16/08 1:06

Genesee County police are investigating a possible rape of a 16-year-old Flint girl. The girl says she knows the name of the man she claims kidnapped, beat and raped her.

11PM LOC/NEWS 4/18/08 :18

A sex offender living in Grand Rapids is found with 70 guns in his apartment. Police were called to his house, after he started shooting out of his second story window. He was arrested without incident. Police say he had been drinking.

11PM LOC/NEWS 4/20/08 1:20

A Breckenridge woman has been arraigned on 7 counts of CSC in District Court. She is still listed as a high school gym teacher on the Breckenridge Schools website. The Board of Education president said the teacher had been placed on sick leave, but referred other questions to the Gratiot County prosecutor.

6PM LOC/NEWS 4/24/08 :13

A Bangor Township woman has been charged with sexually assaulting a 7-year-old girl. The prosecutor says the woman assaulted the girl last August, in a shed.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/14/08 1:50

Rumors were circulating around Gladwin about what may have happened between a Gladwin Junior High School administrator and a female student. Authorities are releasing very little information on the case. Gladwin police confirm a male junior high school administrator was being investigated, but would not release his name or the actual accusations against him.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/15/08 :24

Police in East Tawas have busted what may end up being a prostitution ring involving girls as young as 9 years old. A man and his 22-year-old daughter have been arrested with investigators looking for more victims and suspects.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/29/08 1:30

A local teen was attacked while walking home from work on the Zilwaukee multi-use trail Tuesday night. After sexually assaulting the girl, the suspect fled on foot. Detectives say this is an isolated incident; however, they are urging folks to use caution.

11PM NAT/NEWS 6/3/08 1:23  
A Massachusetts registered sex offender was a limousine driver hired to take high school teens to the prom. Parents want to know how this could happen.

6PM LOC/NEWS 6/13/08 :13  
The Saginaw County Sheriff's Department says the suspect accused of sexually assaulting a girl on the Zilwaukee multi-use trail has not been caught. Crime-Stoppers is offering a \$10,000 reward for information leading to his arrest.

#### 10. School/Campus – Budgets/Security

5PM LOC/NEWS 4/9/08 1:20  
One parent from Kempton Elementary was the driving force behind the idea to line Davenport Avenue with rows of yellow signs asking drivers to slow down. Parents say it was necessary and that speeding drivers have become the norm in that area. Speed zone in the Kempton School area is 30 mph; however, parents have clocked drivers at almost twice that speed.

5PM LOC/NEWS 4/16/08 1:35  
A Houghton Elementary teacher has on several occasions been reprimanded and even suspended, for cursing and threatening her students. Some parents say disrespectful children may have triggered some of the outbursts. The Saginaw School District declined comment, but an attorney from the Michigan Education Association says the District wants her out of the school system. A judge will make the final decision on this matter.

6PM LOC/NEWS 4/17/08 1:37  
The Flint School Board has announced 3 schools that will not be opening this Fall. To solve a \$10 to \$15 million budget deficit, the District also plans to lay off up to 240 staff members, most of them teachers. Some of those same teachers though may not actually lose their jobs when school opens in September.

4PM/MY5 LOC/NEWS 4/23/08 1:00  
A Swartz Creek middle school student was found unconscious in the school's pool this morning. The boy was in gym class and two teachers pulled him from the pool and Tried to resuscitate him.

530PM LOC/NEWS 5/7/08 1:42  
A Saginaw Township school millage was approved yesterday after two prior defeats. The millage is going to be 40 mills over 20 years. The kitchen and cafeteria at White Pines Middle School will be expanded and tennis courts and track field updated. All eight schools will see improvements and added technology.

6PM LOC/NEWS 5/8/08 1:35  
Construction of a halfway house across from Arthur Eddy Academy is moving forward. The facility would house 38 former Federal prisoners. Parents of students were glad to hear the school district plans to protest the project built so close to a Saginaw school.

6PM LOC/NEWS 5/15/08 1:19  
Vandals stole a re-built school dump truck and van from the Beaverton school district. Eventually though, both vehicles were abandoned leaving school staff relieved the vehicles were recovered.

5PM LOC/NEWS 5/20/08 1:00  
A van stolen from the Saginaw ISD has been found, wrecked, in the city. The van was taken over the weekend and found when it crashed at an intersection early this morning. The thieves have not been apprehended.

6PM LOC/NEWS 6/4/08 1:10  
Overnight, somebody slashed the tires on the school buses in the Au Gres-Sioms School District. This forced students to find their own way to class on the last day of the school year. Repairs were made in time to transport students home, but the incident is an added burden to their school budget.

6PM LOC/NEWS 6/13/08 :20  
At a meeting next week, the Saginaw School Board will work to try and balance their budget. Right now the District is facing a \$5.3 million deficit. Teachers and support staff could be pink-slipped. There may also be an increase in some student fees and athletic ticket prices.

6PM LOC/NEWS 6/19/08 1:16  
A Saginaw budget deficit is forcing the Saginaw School District to consider shutting down Webber Elementary and North Middle Schools. Driver's education would also be cut, and the cost to attend sports could also increase. The cuts and adjustments would free money to pay back a loan.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 6/24/08 :22  
"The New York Times" today has an article profiling the Flint School's high student turnover. It claims the turnover is due to students' parents' homes being foreclosed and the low income in the area.



04/12/08           **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Long Way From Home" (10:00-11:00p) -** A report on the strange case of Amanda Know, a 20-year-old honors student who had gone to Perugia, Italy, to study abroad...only to be arrested in connection with the November 2007, murder of her roommate Meredith Kercher, a fellow exchange student from England. Initially, Amanda and her boyfriend Raffaele Sollecito aroused suspicion with the police because of their strange behavior. Days after the murder, Amanda, Raffaele and her employer, Patrick Lumumba (who Amanda named as the murderer) were arrested after Amanda signed a statement following intense police interrogation. Italian Police have developed a theory: Kercher was murdered after refusing to join Amanda, Rafael and Patrick in four-way sex. Soon, the Italian and British press corps were all over the story. Italian police eventually released Lumumba because he had an airtight alibi for the night of the murder: he was at his bar. The case took another dramatic turn when police found a fingerprint that didn't match any of the suspects, but did match Rudy Guide, a fixture - and often a nuisance - on the local bar scene. After a two-week European manhunt, Guide was tracked down in Central Germany and returned to Perugia. After months of silence, he now blames Amanda and her boyfriend for the murder. 48 HOURS brought Chicago private investigator Paul Ciolino into the case, and he believes Amanda is being railroaded: he says that everything in the case points to Rudy Guide. The lead investigator, Edgardo Giobb, has told 48 HOURS that the case against all three suspects is solid and that Rudy didn't act alone. - 04/15/08      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Letter"** - On December 3, 1998, police in Pleasant Prairie, Wisconsin were called to the home of Mark and Julie Jensen. Mark said he had found his wife dead in her bed. Initially, police thought suicide was a strong possibility. But a letter written by Julie before her death expressed her suspicion that Mark might kill her. A series of toxicology tests revealed in Julie's stomach a small amount of ethylene glycol, the main ingredient in antifreeze. In March 2002, Mark was arrested and charged with the first degree murder of his wife. Initially, the judge would not allow Julie's letter to be introduced as evidence in the trial. The prosecutor appealed this decision, ultimately to the Wisconsin Supreme Court. Five years passed; the appeal was successful. In January 2008, Mark went on trial Julie's murder. He was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison without possibility of parole. - 04/19/08      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Dream Killer" (9:00-10:00p)** - Kent Heitholt, the popular sports editor of The Daily Tribune in Columbus, Missouri was found bludgeoned and strangled near his car on Halloween night 2001. Two years later, 19-year-old Charles "Chuck" Erickson told a friend that he had a dream about his involvement in the crime. Although his memory of events was hazy, Erickson told police about events leading up to the murder and implicated his high school friend Ryan Ferguson. He explained that he and Ferguson were out drinking the night of the murder and, when they ran out of money, decided to rob someone. When the two young men approached Heitholt, things got out of hand. Both Erickson and Ferguson were taken into custody and charged with murder. Four years after Heitholt's death, Ferguson, who claimed innocence, was tried for murder. The state's star witness was his former friend, Erickson, who admitted his involvement in the crime but claimed that Ferguson was the instigator. Found guilty of second-degree murder and first-degree robbery and Ryan Ferguson was sentenced to 40 years in prison. He will be eligible for parole in 2040. **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Deadline For Justice" (10:00-11:00p)** - A report on the cold cases of two young women, both new to the areas where they lived, who were both raped and murdered. In the first case, in 2002, young television reporter Jennifer Servo was found murdered weeks after moving to Abeline, Texas to begin a new job at KRBC-TV. Co-workers suspected an ex-boyfriend, Ralph Sepulveda, who had moved to Texas with her, but with whom she had recently broken up. Investigators also suspected a fellow reporter, Brian Travers, who had recently begun a romantic relationship with Jennifer. In the five years since the murder, police have not been able to make an arrest but vow not to give up until the case is solved. In the second case, Patty Scoville moved to Vermont in September 1991 to become a children's ski instructor, but just three weeks later, she disappeared and was found raped and murdered on a local scenic hiking trail. The investigation turned up more than 20 suspects: men Patty knew or those who had been in the park that day. The best evidence in solving the murder would be DNA, but Vermont was one of the last states to have a DNA data base. After seven years of lobbying by her parents, the Vermont DNA database was enacted into law. Seven additional years after it was established, and fourteen years after the murder the case was solved: Howard Godfrey, a 59-year-old window installer, was charged and found guilty. **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Last Take"** - an investigation into the unsolved 1977 murder of actress Christa Helm, who was found stabbed and bludgeoned outside her agent's home in West Hollywood, California. Police at first thought her murder might be connected to the sensational killing of actor Sal Mineo, murdered exactly one year before in the same neighborhood. Detectives also found out about her infamous "love diary" -- but it had vanished. The diary was not the only way she had kept track of her lovers; there were tape recordings of her sexcapades with her celebrity boyfriends, but those tapes also disappeared. The hunt for the tapes lead to actor Tony Sirico (now best known as 'Paulie Walnuts' on "The Sopranos"), who had been sent by Helm's friends to remove them from her residence. In 2006, when investigators finally spoke to Sirico, he was less than cooperative, but the missing items turned up in the possession of Lennie Barin, Helm's closest friend. Now 31 years into the case, detectives have discovered a long string of boyfriends and girlfriends of Christa's, and suspect that jealousy may have been the motive in her murder. However, recent information has led back to the Sal Mineo connection, and his murderer, Lionel Williams, who served 12 years for the crime. After sifting through all the drama of Christa's life, could the detectives discover that she was simply the victim of a random street robbery at the hand of a career criminal? 05/03/08      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Caught In The Crossfire" (9:00-11:00p)** - an expanded and updated report (OAD: 02/24/07; updated 06/12/07) about Charla and Darren Mack of Reno, Nevada, a married, childless couple who were swingers who liked to attend group sex parties. After their daughter Erika was born, Charla was no longer interested in swinging and their marriage began to crumble. Charla filed for divorce. Family court Judge Chuck Weller, ordered Darren to pay Charla a lump sum of \$480,000 and, \$10,000 a month in spousal support. On June 12, 2006, a bullet was fired through the window of Judge Weller's chambers, spraying him with shrapnel. Shortly afterwards, police found Charla's dead body at Darren's condo. Darren had fled to Mexico. On June 22, he turned himself in to the police and was brought back to the U.S. He was charged with the murder of his wife and the attempted murder of Judge Weller. More than a year later, the trial began. The defense tried a unique strategy: self-defense in the murder of Charla and insanity for the attempted murder of Judge Weller, citing that Weller was biased towards women and was having an affair with Charla Mack. When it came time for the defense's turn, instead of taking the stand, Darren took a deal, admitting to Charla's murder, and admitting there was enough evidence to find him guilty in the attempted murder of Judge Weller. Then, three weeks later, he withdrew his guilty plea and demanded a new trial, alleging his attorneys were in it just for the money. A new trial began, and by calling his former lawyers to the stand, Darren waived his right to attorney-client privilege; the damning revelations began. Mack took the stand, insisted he acted in self-defense and was coerced and confused when he took the plea bargain. The judge ruled against Darren's motion to withdraw the plea and he was sentenced to at least 36 years for his crimes. He still insists he acted in self-defense. 05/10/08      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Preacher's Wife"** - In April 2006, Matt Baker, a pastor from Waco, Texas, returned home to find his wife Kari unconscious, with an empty bottle of Unisom and a suicide note beside her. Paramedics arrived within minutes, but it was too late. Based on the note, the empty bottle of sleeping pills, and the fact that Kari was described as still struggling with the loss of her daughter Cassidy seven years ago, police ruled it a suicide. In a county with no medical examiner, police described the case over the phone to a justice of the peace, who determined that no autopsy was needed. Kari's parents, Jim and Linda Dulin, had no choice but to believe Matt. However, Linda's sisters, Nancy, Kay, and Jennifer, and niece Lindsey believed otherwise. Dubbed "Charlie's Angels", they began their own investigation. After uncovering a possible motive, Linda hired Bill Johnston, a dogged former federal prosecutor, had her daughter's body exhumed and autopsied, and filed a wrongful death suit against Matt. Five months after Kari's death, the justice of the peace declared that her death was no longer classified as a suicide and police subsequently arrested and charged Matt with murder. Believing Matt would be tried in criminal court, Linda dropped her wrongful death suit. After six months, the district attorney still hadn't taken Matt's case to a grand jury -- a requirement under Texas law. Linda eventually refiled the wrongful death suit, shortly before attorney Guy James Gray filed a successful motion to dismiss Matt's criminal case, as a grand jury indictment had not been returned within 180 days. Matt Baker is no longer charged with any crime, though the district attorney continues to investigate and could refile criminal charges. There is no statute of limitations for murder. **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Point Blank"** - On October 15, 2003, police were called to the Brownsville, Texas, home of Scott and Traci Rhode. Inside, in the couple's bed, lay Scott with a gunshot wound to the head. Traci told police that she rose early, went for a walk, took a shower, and then heard a moaning sound. It was then that she discovered her husband was wounded. Scott was still alive, but later died at the hospital. Traci maintained Scott shot himself, distraught over their troubled marriage and portrayed him to police as a man who was extremely jealous -- so afraid of losing his wife, that he moved the family five times in thirteen years. It wasn't until the move to Brownsville, that Traci met someone -- a co-worker named Sean Michaels. Authorities used that information, bloodstain evidence and the fact that Scott had met with a divorce lawyer and was prepared to take custody of the children, as a motive. She was arrested for murder on August 11th, 2005 - what would have been her 15th wedding anniversary. Four years after Scott's death, Traci went on trial. The prosecution maintained that her relationship with Sean, and Scott's threat of taking the children, left Traci with the notion that she had to be free of her husband. To prove her guilt, the prosecution showed that the holster and gun fit neatly into the bloodstain on the piece of carpet and maintained that Traci dropped the gun when she shot Scott. However, the defense attorney argued that the evidence was tainted in the hours after the shooting, as it was an emergency medical scene before it was a crime scene -- and had pictures he believed cast serious doubts on the prosecution's perfect fit. The jury found Traci guilty. In Texas, the defense has the option of letting the jurors decide the punishment as well as the verdict, and her attorney opted for a jury sentence. For the second phase of testimony and for the first time, Traci took the stand, as did her two oldest sons. The prosecution asked for sixty years, but the jury sentenced her to a fine of \$10,000 and ten years probation. The jury's decision was legal and binding and the state's case against Traci Rhode was over. Traci Rhode continues to maintain her innocence and has decided to take the first steps to file an appeal. **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Puppet Master"** - A report on the marriage of Heather and Ron Samuels, who, even after divorcing, were involved in a bitter custody battle. In October 1997, newlyweds Heather and John Grossman were shot at while driving. John survived the shooting but a bullet severed Heather's spinal cord, leaving her a quadriplegic. Heather was immediately certain that ex-husband Ron was involved in the crime, as he had once threatened to make her pay for leaving him. Investigators were able to track down three men who they believed were involved in the assault: Hugh Estess, the car owner; Eddie Stafford, the driver, and Roger Runyon, the shooter. Also implicated was Geoff Pollock, who was present at meetings when the crime was discussed. Ron Samuels was named as the man behind the crime - the puppet master. In exchange for complete immunity, police got the co-conspirators to acknowledge Samuels' lead role in the crime. Before Samuels could be arrested, he fled to Mexico. He ran afoul of the law there when police found six kilos of cocaine in his car. He was imprisoned and, five years later, still proclaiming his innocence, he was extradited to the U.S. to stand trial for the attempted murders. He was found guilty of all charges and sentenced to life in prison for the attempted murders, plus an additional 120 years for the other charges. The court ordered Samuels to pay Heather restitution, but he claims that he's broke. Investigators are tracking any remaining assets. He is planning to appeal his conviction. **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Betrayal" (9:00-10:00p)** - a report on the September 3, 2006 disappearance of Nina Reiser, a resident of Oakland, California. Nina, a mother of two, was separated from her husband, computer whiz Hans Reiser, whom she met through a dating service in Russia. Embroiled in a nasty custody fight, Nina dropped her two children off at their father's house on Labor Day weekend and mysteriously vanished in the hours that followed. Her body has never been found. Friends tried calling Nina on her cell phone, but when Nina didn't pick her two children up from school, best friend Ellen Doren called police to file a missing person's report. With police standing by, Ellen called Hans and informed him that she had his children and that Nina was missing. When asked if he knew anything about her disappearance, Hans replied that he wanted to speak to his lawyers. With biological trace evidence pointing directly at Hans Reiser, as well as his erratic behavior, Hans is arraigned on murder charges five weeks after Nina's disappearance. But just when all of the evidence is pointing directly at Hans, Sean Sturgeon, Hans' ex-friend and Nina's ex-lover confessed to the district attorney that he had killed several people. Police investigated Sean and looked into his incredible confession, but without credible evidence, he cannot be charged with a crime. A year after Nina's disappearance, Hans Reiser went on trial for the murder of Nina Reiser. Prosecutors used blood evidence, as well as Hans' own words against him. The defense portrayed Nina as a conniving Russian bride who was looking for a free ride to America and that she planned her disappearance. Rory Reiser, just off the plane from Russia, took the stand against his father and testified against him. After three days of deliberation, the jury found Hans Reiser guilty of first degree murder and he's facing 25 years to life. Following her 2006 divorce, Paige became the primary caregiver to her children and was described as such a devoted mother that the Mesa County Sheriff's Department was convinced she would never have left on her own accord. As friends and family searched for her; her car was found abandoned and on fire in an empty lot. Her first husband, Ron Beigler became the focus of the investigation, when it was learned that the two had been on a date the day of her disappearance, but Paige's friends and family were far more suspicious of the children's father, Rob Dixon, as she had a troubled history with him. After a thorough inquiry, both men had solid alibis. As the investigation continued, it was discovered that Paige was also known as Carrie, a high-priced escort. Her family suspected she had money issues. Investigators then began to believe Paige was murdered by one of her clients. Using her cell phone records, police began carefully looking at all of her clients and eventually honed in on one man, Lester Ralph Jones, an ex-con who had served time for kidnapping and assault. Authorities searched his home, but will not discuss what evidence they uncovered. Search dogs led investigators from Paige's car to an RV shop where Jones worked as a mechanic. Although authorities have zeroed in on Lester Ralph Jones, no charges have been filed and he denies any involvement. The lack of a body, coupled with Paige's secret life, have made it that much harder to prove anything beyond a reasonable doubt. Her friends and family continue their search. In that report, Detective Scott Dudek of the Alameda County (CA) Sheriff's Office was attempting to establish the identity of a teenage girl whose body was found on May 1, 2003 in a trash bag left behind a restaurant in Castro Valley, California. Forensic sculptor Gloria Nusse created a reconstruction of the girl's face, based on nothing but her skull. After the initial 2006 report on 48 HOURS MYSTERY, a viewer called to say that the victim looked like a young girl who had been seen around Castro Valley with Miguel Castaneda, who had worked at the restaurant where the body was dumped. He had disappeared, but police received a tip that the girl and the man she had been seen with might have been from the same hometown in Mexico. Dudek and his team then went to Yahualica, Mexico. There they extensively publicized their search and handed out many fliers. A woman whose daughter was missing came forward, and a DNA sample would later confirm that she was the mother of the now-identified victim: Yesenia Nungaray. Pitonyak was tried for the murder, found guilty and sentenced to 55 years. Laura Hall, Pitonyak's girlfriend, admitted that she had gone to his apartment, at his request, right after the murder -- but claims that she did not know that she was going to be confronted there with a dead body in the bathtub. She then -- out of fear for her own life, she says -- drove Pitonyak, at his insistence, to Mexico. After their arrest in Mexico, Hall was interrogated, charged with hindering the apprehension of Pitonyak. In his testimony at his own trial, Pitonyak implied that Hall took part in the dismemberment of Jennifer Cave's body after her death. The prosecution afterwards came up with witnesses who said that Laura told them that she was involved in the dismemberment. Put on trial for that, and for helping Pitonyak escape, she was found guilty and sentenced to five years in prison. She is appealing her conviction. He claimed she did not return home on the evening of September 11, 2001; her empty van was discovered at the end of their driveway the next morning. Cal denied any involvement and when no evidence was found during a search of the Harris home, he suggested to investigators that they take a closer look at Michele's personal life. Investigators uncovered that Michele was involved with two different men, both of whom had seen Michele the night she disappeared. Two days after the initial search, a forensic specialist was sent to the Harris home and found tiny specks of blood on a kitchen doorway, something that had been overlooked during the initial investigation. With the discovery of a possible crime scene, as well as Cal's refusal to take a polygraph, focus was placed on Cal, who began a relationship with a former girlfriend just eighteen days after Michele's disappearance. On September 30, 2005, Cal Harris was arrested and charged with murder. The trial began on May 21, 2007 and ultimately, he was found guilty of second degree murder. Just days before Cal Harris was to be sentenced, a new witness came forward and claimed to have driven past the Harris driveway around dawn on September 12, 2001 and had seen a man and a woman, who appeared to be arguing. According to this new eyewitness, the woman resembled Michele, but the man did not look like Cal. With this new information, the judge threw out Cal's conviction for the murder of his wife and ordered a new trial. It will be at least a year before Cal Harris is tried again. Police investigation revealed that the murders had been planned by Bart Whitaker, who had enlisted friends Steven Champagne and Chris Brashear to carry out the plot and had intended being shot himself as part of the scenario. Among those interviewed are: Kent Whitaker, who says he has forgiven his son; Marshall Slot, detective, Sugar Land Police Department; Jeff Strange and Fred Felcman, Fort Bend County prosecutors; Also includes: interviews with residents of Cerralvo, Mexico, who became acquainted with Bart Whitaker after he fled there and assumed the name 'Rudy Rios'; comments from other friends of Bart Whitaker who had previously been approached by him to help murder his family; and comments from several members of the jury who convicted Whitaker of murder and sentenced him to death. In consultation with his wife, Dr. Jeanette Knutson Enright, they have introduced forgiveness education in the curricula of elementary schools (the first being Belfast, Northern Ireland and then Milwaukee and Madison, Wisconsin), as a way of training children to cope peacefully with stress and challenge. Also included in the broadcast are interviews with a variety of individuals who have succeeded in getting on with their lives after terrifying experiences and include those who have done so through an act of faith, and others who have had therapy. Those interviewed include: Lynn McGuinn and Talat Hamdani, who lost loved ones in the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center; Eric Wurzel, whose mother deserted him as a child, and who became addicted to drugs and alcohol for 30 years -- he was able to forgive himself and his family; Reverend Walt Everett, whose son was murdered in 1987 and over time, befriended the killer -- the two have appeared together to tell their stories and speak about forgiveness; Ada Wolf, whose son was murdered by an off-duty airman in 1965 -- she grew over time to forgive and admire the killer; and Grace Roidt, who suffered for more than 30 years before talking to forgiveness therapists about her dysfunctional family and an older brother who raped her. Grace was able to get past the crimes of her youth with the help of Dr. Suzanne Freedman, an associate professor at the University of Northern Iowa.
