In the interests of a balanced budget, investigators who make sense of fire scenes are finding their jobs being cut. What impact will this have on viewers?

WAKEUP LOC/NAT/NEWS 7/20/05 :25
Michigan Police say huge amounts of marijuana and money were recovered during a "Take Down" operation in Novi. The operation involved 20 search warrants after police seized \$4.8 million during two major drug busts earlier this year.

NOON LOC/NEWS 7/28/05 :20
A former Detroit police officer will spend 18 years behind bars for helping to steal cocaine from the police department's evidence room. He altered computer records to make it look like 220 pounds of cocaine had been destroyed.

5PM LOC/NEWS 8/30/05 :24
A major nationwide Federal meth bust included raids in Kalamazoo, Jackson and Ingham County. More than 400 people have been arrested and over 200 pounds of meth have been seized.

Bayonet and Thomas Township police arrested a woman and her boyfriend after a raid on their home and served with five counts of possession with intent to deliver marijuana and cocaine, and four felony fire arm counts.

This week a student at Whittemore-Prescott Junior High School was passing prescription drugs to classmates at school. School officials alerted police and parents of the situation. It is under investigation with a possible expulsion for the student.

Saginaw Police say a man who shot and killed a teen during an attempted carjacking won't face charges. He acted in self-defense.

5. Underage Drinking

SUNDAY MIDDAY NAT/NEWS 7/24/05 :22

Research indicates children of alcoholics are four times more likely to develop alcoholism. Another factor is sensitivity to alcohol.

11PM NAT/NEWS 9/14/05 :19

Research shows men who drink more than a case of beer a week have 45 percent greater risk for developing an irregular heartbeat, known as atrial fibrillation.

NOON NAT/NEWS 9/21/05 :18

Research shows a link between alcoholism in heart surgery patients and their rates of infection, who are four times more likely to develop an infection after their operation.

NOON NAT/NEWS 9/27/05 :35

The principal's office at a Long Island high school has had a breathalyzer machine in it. It seems to have all but wiped out student drinking there. There is no random testing, and the device is also used during school activities like dances and sporting events as well.

5PM LOC/NEWS 9/28/05 1:16

Some students at Swan Valley Middle School are a member of STAND (Students Taking A New Direction). It's a group that works hard to keep kids from drinking. These youths feel many of their peers don't follow their lead, and a 2003 school survey indicates alcohol is an issue.



09/24/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Back From The Dead"** - a report from Rockhampton, Queensland, Australia where a community lived in fear of a serial killer following the disappearance of nine-year-old Keyra Steinhart; 14-year-old Natasha Ryan; 19-year-old Sylvia Benedetti; 37-year-old Beverly Leggo and 39-year-old Julie Turner. Police picked up Leonard "Lenny" Fraser, a meat cutter at a local slaughterhouse, who had previously served prison time for assault.

Fraser claimed innocence, but a search of his car revealed traces of Keyra Steinhart's blood as well as other human blood. Fraser led police to the nine-year-old's body but refused to admit to the other murders. Subsequently, police received an offer of help from Allan Quinn, a con man and a fellow prison inmate of Fraser's who not only got Fraser to confess to the killings, but to lead police to the bodies of three of his other victims. Despite the fact that Natasha Ryan's grave was not located, Fraser was brought to trial for all the murders. On the 12th day of the trial it was revealed that Natasha Ryan was not a murder victim but had run away from home with a boyfriend and had been living in hiding nearby.
