ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

OVERVIEW

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM October 10, 2006. The report covers the period from July 1 through September 30, 2006. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainments. Below each problem/need is a brief description of some news segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to, or address, the problem or need.

6PM Hundreds showed up at the Comfort Inn in Birch Run to apply for the 400 employees needed to stock shelves and take care of customers at the new Wal-Mart in Vienna Township. Others prefer to look closer to their own home towns for jobs, because of rising gas prices.	LOC/NEWS	7/17/06 1:21
11PM The Ford Motor Company is reporting major losses in its second quarter. The auto company blames its loss on costs related to reducing its work force. Ford is trying to close 14 plants and trim nearly 30,000 jobs by 2012.	LOC/NEWS	7/21/06 :21
5:30PM Michigan Sugar won't be issuing beet farmers an August paycheck for their 2005 crop. Michigan Sugar pays in four installments, with the August one an optional choice by the company. This means local farmers may be visiting their bank to borrow money for bills.	LOC/NEWS	7/26/06 1:36
5PM Thousands of A.O.L. workers will be out of a job by early next year. The company is firing up to 5,000 people. This news comes a day after A.O.L. said it expects to lose half its 17 million subscribers when it offers most of its main features for free.	LOC/NEWS	8/4/06 :14
NOON Five workers convicted of felonies will stay employed by the Saginaw School District. Their crimes apparently don't fall under the 11 specified felonies or misdemeanors that would have required them to be fired.	LOC/NEWS	8/10/06 :26
11PM Part of Gerett Reppenhausen's new job is to help other veterans find jobs. The Department of Veteran's Affairs has a Transition Assistance Program which sends teams all over the world to acclimate soldiers and businesses merge into jobs when their military careers are finished. 6PM LOC/NEWS 9/13/06 :35
Senate candidate Mike Bouchard will unveil an aggressive economic plan to bring jobs back to Michigan. He also hopes to reduce the cost of energy, and make healthcare more affordable.

10PM LOC/NEWS 9/16/06 :17
Michigan's Governor Granholm was in Flint today, for the dedication of the new automotive plant at Flint Engine South. The governor also talked about job cuts across the nation.

11PM LOC/NEWS 9/24/06 :17
A Genesee County jobs leader will head overseas to attempt to bring more jobs to the area. County officials are worried about the expenses the previous person incurred who traveled to Europe multiple times without bringing back jobs.

2. Drugs

NOON NAT/NEWS 7/12/06 :21
Authorities have arrested a man in Thailand, they say posed as a doctor, and dispensed fake cancer drugs to patients. Police say several people have died at the hands of this fraud. He has already served time in the U.S. for administering what he calls "ozone treatments."

11PM NAT/NEWS 7/30/06 2:00
A urine test showed unusually high levels of testosterone in Floyd Landis, raising questions on whether he won the Tour de France on his own strength, or using steroids. He says he just naturally has high levels of testosterone and will proceed to undergo tests to back his statements.

NOON NAT/NEWS 8/7/06 :22
HIV/AIDS drugs are still effective, ten years after being introduced in Europe and North America. Research indicates resistance to the drug treatments, which had been predicted, has not occurred.

11PM NAT/NEWS 8/28/06 2:11
An Iraq veteran suffers from post traumatic stress disorder. This disorder has haunted Vietnam veterans for decades. Getting shot at during each mission, lead to drinking and then drugs to this veteran. Congress is asking for additional funds to help troubled Iraq veterans avoid or decrease the mental health issues combat brought to veterans from previous wars and disturbances.

11PM LOC/NEWS 8/31/06 1:10
A 21-year-old mom and her 4-month-old baby have been missing for more than two weeks. Nicole Kabat was facing eight felony counts of drug and gun charges when she disappeared, and getting ready to go on trial in Saginaw County. There is additional concern for the baby who was undergoing treatment for breathing problems.

11PM NAT/NEWS 9/8/06 :27
A new government study finds, for the third straight year, more people in the 50 to 59 age group are using drugs. Among young teens, illicit drug use is down for the third year in a row, with nearly 10 percent in that group using drugs.

11PM NAT/NEWS 9/11/06 1:21
One man has spent more than six months participating in a clinical trial, where he volunteers to help doctors test new drugs and therapies. The National Institute of Health keeps track of nearly 12,000 studies on its website, where you can go to find out what studies are in your area.

11PM LOC/NEWS 9/23/06 1:06
A guns/drugs bust in Saginaw had police jailing a 50-year-old man for possession of two hand guns, containers of heroin, coke, and prescription drugs. He was observed making transactions on Saginaw's west side, which led to his arrest.

11PM NAT/NEWS 9/28/06 1:10
Knowing your child's weight could help prevent a potentially life-threatening drug overdose. Doctors advise parents to read the labels of over-the-counter medicine or consult a dosage chart to make sure a child receives the right amount of medicine. If you suspect too much medicine has been ingested, call poison control or see a doctor immediately.

3. Violence

5PM LOC/NEWS 7/6/06 :14
Saginaw's police found a 28-year-old man dead in the 2700 block of Washington Avenue. Witnesses say the man was arguing with someone inside an after hours club, when it escalated to gunfire outside.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 7/17/06 :36
Flint police are investigating two overnight shootings, which happened only an hour apart. Both men are in critical condition, and no arrests have been made in either incident.

5PM LOC/NEWS 7/18/06 1:20
There have been close to 100 shootings in the City of Saginaw in 2006 to date, with 15 of those being homicides. This makes Saginaw the third most violent city in the State. Not enough police to enforce safety is still the problem, even though a safety millage was recently passed. Those monies allow departments to maintain the officers currently employed, but does not bring back police jobs from past layoffs.

11PM LOC/NEWS 7/22/06 :27
A 41-year-old Flint man was found shot to death in his Flint mobile home. Family members believe he was killed after testifying at an arson trial. A 24-year-old man was arraigned on charges of first degree murder for the death.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 8/17/06 :24
Police say there is a scam in Bay City involving an authentic-looking e-mail sent to credit union members, warning them that somebody's using their account. The message then asks you to click a button to verify your account information. If you do that, others could then access your account.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 8/19/06 :32
Just after 6 a.m. today, two people were shot at a residence on South Averill Avenue. Police have a possible suspect in custody. This follows a shooting several days ago which happened in Mt. Morris Township, which involved a grandfather and his grandson.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 8/24/06 :28
The murder trial is underway for a suspect Bay City police say killed a man inside an apartment complex. The suspect is facing 11 felony counts, including open murder and attempted murder of a witness to a killing.

530PM LOC/NEWS 9/1/06 1:20
Flint's police chief admits violent crime is growing in the city, but he has taken his fight to Washington, where he was invited to a Violent Crimes Summit. It was a venue to talk about the growing problem and to hear what other chiefs are doing to combat crime.

5PM LOC/NEWS 9/19/06 1:15
Today's statistics from the FBI cite a rise in Saginaw crime, which doesn't surprise residents. These figures were one of the topics of discussion at today's countywide crime commission meeting. Saginaw's police chief says things may actually be worse than they appear, since resources aren't available, which may keep people from calling as much as they could be.

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5PM LOC/NEWS 9/18/06 1:00
More than a year after her 7-year-old adopted son, Ricky, went missing, Lisa Holland is finally going on trial for his murder. In a surprise move earlier this month, Tim Holland pleaded guilty to second degree murder and agreed to testify against his wife.

11PM LOC/NEWS 9/18/06 1:20
A 7-year-old boy, Ricky Holland, disappeared in July, 2006, with his adoptive parents claiming he ran away. Eventually the boy was discovered dead, and both parents were taken into custody. The prosecutor's office indicates the boy suffered from malnutrition and humiliation, and appeared to have died from two hammer blows to his head.

530PM LOC/NEWS 9/19/06 1:42
The inhumane and horrible circumstances of 7-year-old Ricky Holland's death are playing out in court in this trial of Lisa Holland, accused of first degree murder and child abuse. It is providing the perfect learning tool for law students at Cooley Law School. They say it is a case of human emotion and it is important for the defense and prosecution to recreate feelings and circumstances.

11PM LOC/NEWS 9/22/06 1:20
A Bay City Little League baseball coach is behind bars for sharing naked pictures of teen boys on line. The man exchanged nude photographs with an undercover police officer from New Hampshire and now is facing four counts of child porn related charges.

11PM LOC/NEWS 9/29/06 :20
Witnesses take the stand in the child abuse trial of Ryan and Stardust Welshan. The couple allegedly threw and dropped their month old baby back in February, causing life-threatening injuries. The boy and his older brother are now in foster care.

5. Underage Drinking

NOON NAT/NEWS 7/6/06 :14
Studies show the developing teenage brain is much more susceptible than the adult brain to the effects of alcohol. Research indicates the damage affects important cognitive skills, like attention, learning and memory.

5PM NAT/NEWS 7/6/06 :19
A person's risk of becoming dependent on alcohol may depend on when he or she starts drinking. A new study found 47 percent of people who began drinking before the age of 14 suffered alcohol dependence at some point in their lives.

5PM NAT/NEWS 8/17/06 :16
About one-third of teens admit to attending parties where drugs or alcohol were present, even if their parents were there; but 80 percent of parents deny their teens attend those parties.

11PM LOC/NEWS 8/29/06 :22
There were many alcohol-related arrests at Central Michigan University during the campus's big welcome back weekend. Thirty citations for minor in possession, thirty more for open intoxication, and ten for disorderly conduct were written. Campus security plans to increase patrols.

6PM NAT/NEWS 9/5/06 :19
Researchers believe differences in brain chemistry may explain why some people with a strong family history of alcoholism become alcoholics, and others do not. Elevated levels of certain chemical receptors may protest some people against alcoholism.

6PM LOC/NEWS 9/9/06 :18
The 5th Annual Eric Blair Scholarship Fund BBQ is Sunday in Bay City's Carroll Park. The event funds Delta scholarships and SADD Alcohol Awareness programs following Eric's death after a day of binge drinking on the Michigan State University campus.

6. Sex Crimes/Underage

11PM LOC/NEWS 7/7/06 1:10
Bay County authorities accuse a former Buena Vista Township patrolman of having sex with a 15-year-old girl. The officer's attorney claims the charges against him are bogus. The officer recent left the Buena Vista Police Department.

6PM LOC/NEWS 7/22/06 :23
Police say a 24-year-old Linden man was arrested for trying to solicit sex from who he thought was a young girl. She really was a detective at the Livingston County Sheriff's Department. If the man is found guilty, he could get up to 20 years in prison.

530PM LOC/NEWS 7/24/06 :15
A teacher and coach from the Upper Peninsula pleads guilty to having sex with a 16-year-old student athlete. The 32-year-old man was a substitute teacher and an assistant girls' varsity basketball coach at Engadine Consolidated Schools, who will spend a year behind bars for the crime.

8. Animal Abuse

11PM NAT/NEWS 7/10/06 2:30
A facility in Albuquerque, New Mexico uses homeless dogs to work with teens who get in trouble. Dogs from an animal shelter are matched with young adults. Research indicates both animals and juveniles profit from the pairing, as both have been abused and neglected. They learn to trust and care for each other, teaching them appropriate behavior and adjustment for their re-entry back into society.

5PM NAT/NEWS 7/28/06 :35
A Chihuahua was found left on a doorstep in a severe state of malnutrition with a zip tie tied around its neck. The dog was taken to the Missouri Humane Society, who are offering a \$2500 reward for information leading to the arrest of the person responsible.

11PM LOC/NEWS 8/5/06 :17
Dozens of animals, from snakes to monkeys, have been seized from two homes in Battle Creek. Law enforcement officers originally went to one of the homes on a federal firearms search warrant, and found animals everywhere. Police are investigating whether or not it's a case of animal cruelty.

6PM LOC/NEWS 8/9/06 1:30
The Gladwin County Animal Shelter is selling dogs for research, prompting protesters to object. Gladwin County has an agreement with a Livingston County business that buys dogs from Gladwin County's pound to sell to scientists at universities or hospitals. The shelter also euthanizes 750 to 1200 dogs and cats each year.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 8/23/06 :19
Later today, the Gladwin County Commission will decide on a proposal suggesting ways a rescue group can help the county's animal shelter, hoping to eliminate its pound seizure program.

5PM LOC/NEWS 9/7/06 1:35
At least two dozen animals were found living in what officials called deplorable conditions in a home in Corunna. At least 14 cats had to be put down, as they were just too sick. Authorities say the woman called for animal control officers to get the animals. She had been evicted, and authorities say it is unlikely the woman will not face any criminal charges.

9. Sex Offenders/Predators

11PM LOC/NEWS 7/12/06 1:25
Late Sunday night, a 20-year-old Alma college student was approached by two men, who put a knife to her back. They then dragged her to a weedy area along the Pine River and raped her. Police ask anyone who has information or recognizes these sketches to contact them.

11PM NAT/NEWS 7/17/06 :28
A 42-year-old registered sex offender was obsessed with Brittany Carleo and had been harassing the teen. He was arrested after he started making phone calls to Carleo, but was released. After shooting the girl, the man killed himself.

11PM NAT/NEWS 7/26/06 :17
President Bush is expected to sign new legislation for a national internet database that will track where convicted sex offenders live and work. Any offender who doesn't register would face felony charges and a ten year prison term.

530PM NAT/NEWS 8/7/06 :36
A U.S. Capitol police officer has been linked to a case involving a high school junior varsity football coach, who allegedly hired a 15-year-old girl to work as a prostitute. The incident was video taped. The officer has now been charged with first degree child sex abuse while armed and the coach is charged with first degree child sexual abuse.

NOON LOC/NEWS 8/10/06 :18
A 41-year-old Coleman man is charged with one count of distributing or promoting child pornography and 8 counts of possession. Isabella County deputies say they found DVD's and a computer full of the material in the man's Wise Township home.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 8/31/06 :16
A 48-year-old man was arrested in Sebawaing for allegedly sexually abusing two girls. He is facing first and second degree criminal sexual conduct charges. The incidents reportedly occurred in Thomas and Richland Townships in 2001.

11PM LOC/NEWS 9/22/06 1:20
A Bay City Little League baseball coach is behind bars for sharing naked pictures of teen boys on line. He allegedly e-mailed the pictures of young boys committing sex acts to a detective, and is now facing four counts of child porn-related charges.

6PM LOC/NEWS 9/27/06 1:05
A 60-year-old man is back in Bay City courts after he skipped bond and left town nine months ago. The man was out on a \$75,000 bond for criminal sexual conduct last January when prosecutors say he fled to Mississippi. He was caught by police when he was stopped for a seat belt violation.

6PM LOC/NEWS 9/30/06 :24
Mt. Pleasant police checking on a registered sex offender's home, found another man sneaking out the back door. That man also had outstanding warrants against him. The sex offender was later arrested for living too close to a school zone. Sex offenders must begin re-registering with the state tomorrow. They have 15 days to comply.

10. Schools Need Improvements/Security

11PM LOC/NEWS 7/11/06 :50
The Saginaw School District faced a \$1.5 million budget shortfall when a May millage did not pass. If voters don't pass the millage in August, students will lose busing in the district, and may also have to pay to play sports. The 18 mill levy is a tax on commercial properties and secondary homes.

6PM LOC/NEWS 7/27/06 :19
Mershon School in Carrollton has long been considered an eyesore. The township has agreed to buy the dilapidated building from the bank for \$1. In return, the township will proceed with demolition of the school.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 7/31/06 :20
Tight budgets at some Michigan schools force districts to turn to private contractors. A report says a growing number of schools are hiring contractors to serve meals, mop floors and drive buses.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 8/1/06 :19
In Detroit, the school district will spend \$500,000 on a publicity campaign designed to fight its enrollment decline. Its slogan will be "Come home to Detroit Public Schools."

11PM LOC/NEWS 8/10/06 1:15
Four major financial groups in the Flint area are coming together with the universities and school districts to see if a program similar to the one launched in Kalamazoo would work. Students who meet certain requirements and graduate from public school, get four years of college free. It raises the question: Would people move to Flint, if it meant a free ride to college.

Shortly after finding the seventh victim, police arrested John Collins, an Eastern Michigan University student who was subsequently convicted of only one of the murders. Maggie Nelson, the daughter of Janet's sister Barbara, determined to write a book about her aunt and to unravel the mystery of her murder. Some detectives also believed the case merited another look. DNA tests of evidence at the scene of the crime led police to Gary Leiterman, a 62-year-old retired nurse and to John Ruelas, who was four-years-old at the time of the crime. Despite concerns over the possible contamination of DNA evidence and the absence of fingerprints, Gary Leiterman was tried, convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to life in prison. Facing a sentence of life in prison, she offered the prosecutor information about what happened the night of the murder in exchange for a lighter sentence. When the two young men approached Heitholt, things got out of hand. Both Erickson and Ferguson were taken into custody and charged with murder. Four years after Heitholt's death, Ferguson, who claimed innocence, was tried for murder. The state's star witness was his former friend, Erickson, who admitted his involvement in the crime but claimed that Ferguson was the instigator. Found guilty of second-degree murder and first-degree robbery, Ryan Ferguson was sentenced to 40 years in prison. He will be eligible for parole in 2040. The next day, Perez and her friends found Melendi's abandoned car with the keys in it and called police. Following an extensive police search of the area that turned up no signs of the missing girl, the Melendi family and friends began their own aggressive search, offering a \$10,000 reward for information and tapping into celebrities Andy Garcia and Bo Jackson who appeared on national television programs in an effort to help find Shannon. Nearly two weeks after Melendi vanished, an anonymous male phoned the Emory University counseling center claiming he had Shannon. The FBI traced the call to a pay phone where police found evidence that was intentionally left behind by the caller, a package containing a ring that belonged to Melendi. Only then did authorities treat the case as a kidnapping. Investigators managed to trace pieces of the package to Colvin "Butch" Hinton III, an umpire at the softball field where Melendi worked the day she went missing. Authorities searched Hinton's home and property but found no human remains and nothing that could be linked to Shannon. They did uncover the fact that Hinton had a violent criminal past covering decades. In late 2003, a new prosecutor took up the case, and more than ten years after Shannon Melendi disappeared, police and FBI agents arrested "Butch" Hinton and charged him with her murder. Hinton was tried, found guilty of kidnapping and murder, and sentenced to life in prison. Yvonne and Luis Melendi, Shannon's parents, have set their sights on a new mission, seeking longer prison sentences for sexual predators, especially repeat offenders like Hinton. On finding Freya in a fetal position groaning, Ashley called 911, and an ambulance rushed the child to a hospital where, two hours later, she was pronounced dead. Doctors told police that it appeared that the toddler had been violently shaken: she had major head injuries, including a blood clot in her brain. Ashley, having been interrogated by police for hours without the presence of a parent or an attorney, was tried for the child's murder. Because of the lack of evidence the case was dismissed and Ashley can never be retried for the murder of Freya Garden. Her parents are considering a civil law suit against the state of Washington. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Informer" - a report on the moral dilemma faced by Jim Morel, a Norton, Massachusetts musician, who was told by another musician friend, Jason Weir, that the 2001 death of Marina Calabro, the elderly aunt of their bandmate Anthony Calabro, though initially ruled an accident, was actually a case of murder. In 2002, Weir, while discussing the reckless spending habits of Anthony Calabro, heir to the bulk of his aunt's estate, confessed to Morel that Calabro "didn't exactly die on her own." With that information, Morel went to authorities, who re-opened the case. Eventually his friends and bandmates Jason Weir, Thomas Lally and Anthony Calabro were charged with the first-degree murder of Marina Calabro. The passage of time had complicated the case; but Lally was convicted of first-degree murder, Weir plea-bargained to the charge of manslaughter and Calabro, who had never given a statement to police, eventually confessed his complicity. Also includes comments by Marina Calabro's niece Donna, regarding Anthony Calabro's troubled past; Rick Weir, regarding his son's case; and Tom Lally's uncle, also named Tom, regarding the case.
