## **ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT**

### **OVERVIEW**

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM January 10, 2007. The report covers the period from October 1 through December 31, 2006. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainment. Below each problem/need is a brief description of some news segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to, or address, the problem or need.

6PM LOC/NEWS 12/22/06 :15  
Clare County gets more than \$400,000 to clean up and then re-develop contaminated property in the City of Harrison. The project is expected to bring more than 100 jobs to the area.

NOON LOC/NEWS 12/22/06 1:15  
After working side by side for more than three decades, Delphi veterans give each other hugs and handshakes to honor their time together. Now they have either retired or taken the company buyout this past year, and are gathering to celebrate their final day of work.

## 2. Drugs

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/13/06 1:00  
A mid-Michigan man brought in thousands of dollars of drugs and dozens of guns, and tonight he is walking free. He lived in the quiet community of Montrose, and some are calling his home an arsenal.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 10/13/06 :24  
One of the country's largest prescription benefit management firms is coming out with a low-cost generic drug plan aimed at companies that don't offer drug coverage. The plan covers more than 800 medications.

PM SHOW LOC/NEWS 10/24/06 :17  
Meijer stores across the state are offering a free prescription drug program which covers leading oral generic antibiotics, with a focus on prescriptions for kids. You don't need a card to participate.

5PM LOC/NEWS 10/26/06 :17  
Wal-mart has announced it is extending \$4 generic prescription drug plan to Michigan, and 11 other states. The store will now charge only \$4 for a one-month supply of 314 different prescriptions.

WEEKEND WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 10/29/06 :40  
Wal-mart is offering free prescription drugs to people suffering from common ailments. Some of the new plan's biggest critics are owners of small drugs stores, who can't afford to give away drugs.

.WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 11/14/06 :22  
Patients on lifesaving drugs are keeping developing countries from receiving necessary medications. But manufacturers argue a bigger problem is a shortage of hospitals and well-trained healthcare workers in those nations.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/10/06 :24  
A police source tells TV5 the Whitefeather Landfill in Bay County's Pinconning Township may hold clues to a crime in Charlevoix County. The source says investigators are looking for a body in one particular part of the landfill.

PM NEWS NAT/NEWS 11/27/06 1:33  
Several youths went on a crime spree in St. Louis, stealing a vehicle and using it to ram through a garage door. These young men then attempted to steal another vehicle, but were scared off by the owner of the vehicle. The chase ended with two teenage boys hospitalized.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/6/06 1:15  
The owner of the Saginaw Market found a hate message on the side of his building, which was put there before someone torched it. The fire forced the market to close, leaving several employees without work.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/14/06 1:25  
Saginaw police confiscated more than 6 pounds of pot, an ounce of crack cocaine, and three hand guns. Police say the street value of the drugs is estimated to be between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/14/06 1:18  
A 36-year-old man is accused of carjacking a woman at knifepoint at a Midland Meijer. He allegedly forced another woman at a Saginaw fruit market to take him to buy drugs later the same day. The judge set his bond at \$4 million.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/18/06 :40  
A 35-year-old female lawyer allegedly bilked clients out of hundreds of thousands of dollars. She told Genesee County Sheriff's investigators that a man was extorting money from her to keep a homemade sex tape private. Cremated remains of a man who died in the 1970s and hundreds of checkbooks from people under her guardianship were also found by investigators.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 12/21/06 1:13  
Four men robbed a husband and wife at gunpoint at a Laundromat, and then went to a local Wal-mart where an alert Saginaw Township officer spotted them. Masks, stolen items and a handgun were recovered.

**4. Child Abuse**

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/24/06 :24

A woman was arrested for allegedly whipping her 11-year-old son with a switch and extension cord, clubbing his head with a pool cue, and then choking him. After the incident, the young man fled to a nearby store in Oakland County, where he contacted police.

NOON LOC/NEWS 10/27/06 1:10

Both of Rose Kelly's parents were in court together today where they were arraigned on involuntary manslaughter for the death of their daughter earlier this year. The couple has also lost rights to their other three children, who are in foster care at this time.

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/8/06 :57

A Fenton Township couple is jailed after dropping their two-year-old off at the hospital, then leaving. The girl reportedly has cigarette burns and other wounds all over her body.

530PM NAT/NEWS 11/13/06 :30

A 16-month-old baby was killed in Orange County after the child's father grabbed her arm, and threw her against a tile wall. The man is charged with second degree murder and aggravated child abuse.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/27/06 :42

Earlier this month, a two-year-old girl from Fenton Township was dropped off an area hospital, suffering from broken bones and cigarette burns. Overwhelming offers of support from the community has enabled the county prosecutor to set up a special fund for the child at Citizen's Bank.

530PM LOC/NEWS 11/30/06 :20

A Mt. Clemens aunt who admitted to injecting her 12-year-old nephew with heroin, has been sentenced to 8 years in prison. She pleaded guilty to drug and child abuse charges and received two years' probation.

530PM NAT/NEWS 12/8/06 :29

A 13-year-old girl recovers after her father allegedly poured boiling hot water on her while she slept. The father was charged with child abuse and endangerment. Another Case of child abuse had a stepdad striking a 12-year-old boy with a belt, burning his neck, and then putting him in a dog cage for punishment. That man was taken into custody.



11PM NAT/NEWS 12/2/06 1:06  
Winter is still officially three weeks away, but you would not know it across the plains and in the Midwest where more than a foot of snow is on the ground in some places. More than 450 flights were cancelled at O'Hare Airport in Chicago, a blizzard warning was posted for parts of Oklahoma, and power knocked out in parts of Missouri and Illinois. In Michigan, sleet and freezing rain are causing big problems for customers in the Flint/Lansing area.

11PM NAT/NEWS 12/21/06 1:30  
A major storm system will dump up to 20 inches of snow on Denver by tomorrow afternoon. Already, major highways are shut down.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 12/22/06 :28  
Roughly 5,000 people have been stranded at Denver's International Airport since Wednesday. Airport officials say some of them may soon be able to leave. The blizzard conditions have caused more than 2,000 flight cancellations.

NOON NAT/NEWS 12/22/06 1:20  
More than 2,000 flights were cancelled in Denver over the past few days, just three days before Christmas, when Mother Nature dumped two feet of snow. The worst is hopefully over, but may be heading east. Right now it is raining at Chicago's O'Hare Airport, with dozens of flights delayed because of the Colorado weather.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 12/28/06 :27  
The National Weather Service says there is another storm expected in Denver that could drop a foot of snow with wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour, causing whiteouts and more problems at Denver's International Airport. Denver's Airport was closed to all flights for 45 hours, stranding thousands of holiday travelers.

11PM NAT/NEWS 12/30/06 :23  
At this point, Denver's International Airport is open, but major roads and expressways are closed. Blizzard conditions have made driving too dangerous. Denver got nine inches of snow yesterday.

11PM NAT/NEWS 12/31/06 1:20  
Denver International Airport is open for business when a second holiday blizzard dropped only seven inches of snow in the area, with airlines cleared to return to their full schedules. Lots of snow is making this December a Christmas to remember in Denver.

## 6. War in Iraq

530PM NAT/NEWS 10/18/06 1:30  
With 10 more Americans dead in Iraq, October is shaping up to be one of the deadliest months since the start of the U.S. led invasion. Iraq has scheduled a national reconciliation conference next month in hopes it will lead to a letup in the bloodshed.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/24/06 :15  
The Pentagon announces two Marine Lance Corporals from southeastern Michigan have been killed while fighting in Iraq. They were both members of the First Battalion Sixth Marine Regiment of the Second Marine Division.

PM NEWS LOC/NEWS 11/3/06 :19  
Michigan loses two more Marines to the war in Iraq. One Marine was from Ypsilanti while the other came from Ann Arbor.

PM NEWS NAT/NEWS 11/6/06 1:20  
Former Iraqi Dictator Saddam Hussein was found guilty of Crimes against Humanity, stemming from the execution of dozens of Shiites in DuJail, after a failed assassination Attempt in 1982. He is sentenced to death by hanging. Hussein's legal team will appeal the verdict.

PM NEWS LOC/NEWS 11/13/06 :31  
Over 160 soldiers left Detroit this Veterans Day weekend to serve in Iraq. Dozens of family members and friends attended the ceremony to wish the troops good luck before their deployment.

WEEKEND WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 12/2/06 1:18  
Airline passengers observed as a flag-draped coffin was unloaded from the baggage area of an airplane. The casket was escorted by a single soldier, who stood at attention. This is normal procedure for bring a body back from the war zone.

11PM NAT/NEWS 12/4/06 1:14  
A November 6 classified memo from former Secretary of Defense admits the U.S. military's role in Iraq is not working well or fast enough. Nearly 2,900 U.S. soldiers have been killed in Iraq, while daily sectarian violence shows no sign of letting.

11PM NAT/NEWS 12/31/06 2:07  
No matter whose funeral it is, the military renders honors with precision, discipline and tradition; the family and the casket are never left unattended. Unfortunately, the military has many opportunities to practice funeral honors.





11PM NAT/NEWS 12/16/06 :17  
An Ohio man accused of shooting his Great Dane in the head has pleaded no contest to an animal cruelty charge.

**9. Sex Offenders/Predators**

NOON LOC/NEWS 10/13/06 1:34  
In 2001, a 25-year-old Wisconsin man was convicted for sexual assault of a child in the first degree. He failed to report to police in 2004 and for the last six weeks has been living in Saginaw. He currently has been apprehended and awaits extradition back to Wisconsin.

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/19/06 :25  
A 14-year-old boy is facing 40 counts of rape involving two young children, both of who are his siblings. Logan County Sheriff detectives say the boy's father turned him. Details are not being released to protect the privacy of the siblings.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 10/24/06 :23  
A man was arrested in Clare County yesterday, after Mt. Pleasant police have spent the last three years looking for the sex offender, who was not registered. He reportedly left the state for a while, but troopers found out he was back in mid-Michigan, and went after him. He is now in the Isabella County jail.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 10/31/06 :37  
Police in Bay City say parents need to pay attention to their neighbors, and figure out where sex offenders live before their children go trick-or-treating. Parents can use online resources, like the Michigan Sex Offender Registry and familywatchdog.us.

NOON NAT/NEWS 11/3/06 2:08  
A Brooklyn man's original charge is rape, then he failed to register as a sex offender, making him at the top of the local U.S. marshal's priority list. People move to get a new start, say they don't realize they need to register. It helps that neighbors cooperate more easily with the police when its about a sex offender, says the marshal.

530PM LOC/NEWS 12/18/06 1:33  
A student safety zone coincides with a 2006 state law that says convicted sex offenders cannot live within 1,000 feet of a school. The Midland County Prosecutor created the method now called safe/secure area for education (SAFE). It is similar to programs like "Family Watchdog", but more efficient on a local level.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/27/06 1:20  
Mt. Pleasant State Police arrested a man convicted of sex crimes involving children, living in a home with a woman and her children. This is a violation of his probation, and it's not the first time this man has located himself where he would have easy access to children.

#### 10. School Improvements/Security

PM NEWS NAT/NEWS 10/13/06 2:51  
A Pennsylvania man with three guns, more than 600 rounds of ammunition and a grudge, barricaded himself inside an Amish school house in Lancaster County. Four children are dead, seven others are wounded, with some of them in critical condition. The man was not Amish, and killed himself afterwards.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/13/06 :40  
Count day for Saginaw schools indicated a decrease of 843 students from last year's county day enrollment. A detailed budget reduction plan will be present to the board next week because of the decrease.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/13/06 :15  
The Red Cross has hired a trio of students and college graduates to help local schools plan for disasters. They are part of the Bay County Disaster Action Team, and will be working with local schools during the next 10 months.

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/30/06 :22  
The Superintendent of Essexville-Hampton Schools admits she lied about a school closure last week. She said school was closed due to boiler problems, when it was really closed because of threats against staff members. Since the incident, a man has been arrested for stalking and malicious use of the telephone.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/31/06 :19  
Midland Police are investigating three separate school break-ins which occurred over the last several days. Estimated damages are about \$2,000.

530PM LOC/NEWS 11/2/06 1:28  
Saginaw Schools are looking into offsetting some of their costs for programs, to ease the cash flow from their other funds. It includes billboards on busses, much like Bay City Schools, and sponsoring to help pay for the programming on the school-run SETV.

12/23/06 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Duty, Death, Dishonor"** - 25-year-old U.S. Army Specialist Richard Davis took part in the March 2003 invasion of Iraq. He returned to the U.S. on July 13, 2003. After celebrating his homecoming with four Army buddies in Columbus, Georgia, he disappeared and was listed by the Army as AWOL. In September 2003, the Army opened an official investigation and on November 7, 2003, a tip led to the discovery of his body. Nearly four months later, four soldiers who were last with him -- Jacob Burgoyne, Alberto Martinez, Mario Navarette and Douglas Woodcoff -- were arrested. Burgoyne, previously diagnosed with PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder), identified Martinez as the sole killer. Woodcoff agreed to cooperate with authorities once murder charges against him were dropped. A jury found Martinez and Navarette guilty of murder with a sentence of life in prison. Burgoyne, who pled guilty to voluntary manslaughter, received a twenty year sentence. Woodcoff pled guilty to concealing a death and was sentenced to five years of probation. Myers, Florida starting using steroids in high school and as an adult began selling them to support his expensive career. He went into business with fellow bodybuilder Markus Mueller, a German who was able to smuggle the drugs into the U.S. from Europe. Bieber had an affair with Mueller's girlfriend, Danielle LaBelle, and subsequently married her. In February 1995, Bieber drove LaBelle to Mueller's home to retrieve her purse while he waited in the car. When LaBelle found Mueller dead in the doorway she suspected that Bieber had killed him. Two men admitted to police that Bieber had hired them to kill Mueller, but before he could be arrested, Bieber disappeared. He bought the birth certificate of a deceased child, Nathan Wayne Coleman, took on his identity and, in 1996, fled to Leeds, England where he was undiscovered for almost eight years. On December 26, 2003, Leeds police apprehended a stolen car; the driver was Bieber. In the process of being handcuffed, he opened fire on the three unarmed arresting officers and escaped. One officer died of his wounds and a nationwide manhunt was launched. Bieber was finally caught, was tried for the murder of the police officer, and sentenced to life in prison. Danielle LaBelle divorced Bieber in 2003. There are no plans to try him for the murder of Markus Mueller.
