## **ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT**

### **OVERVIEW**

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM January 10, 2008. The report covers the period from October 1 through December 31, 2007. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainment. Below each problem/need is a brief description of some news segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to, or address, the problem or need.

**1. Job Market**

NOON	LOC/NEWS	10/4/07 :22
Several industry analysts speculate Ford needs to close more factories and reduce its work force if it wants to stay competitive. The automaker has about 60,000 hourly workers represented by the UAW.		

5PM	LOC/NEWS	10/10/07 1:30
For the second time in less than a month, UAW members are picketing. This time, Chrysler and the Union couldn't agree on a contract by the strike deadline. The main sticking point is health care, and how much the automaker will pay in a UAW-managed trust fund to cover the cost of retiree health care.		

6PM	LOC/NEWS	10/15/07 :21
Local leaders have voted to recommend a tentative agreement with Chrysler to their members. It contains provision for company-funded union-run trusts and includes lower wage scales for some newly-hired workers.		

WAKEUP	LOC/NEWS	10/26/07 :23
The Federal Government decided Delphi must pay more than \$3 million to its employees. The Labor Department says Delphi didn't do enough to protect the retirement investment of its workers.		

NOON	NAT/NEWS	11/2/07 1:30
The selling continues on Wall Street even though today it was announced the economy added twice as many jobs as expected in October. Concerns come from soaring oil prices, fear of lowered interest rates and the slumping housing market.		

WAKEUP	LOC/NEWS	11/4/07 :28
The UAW union has reached a tentative four-year contract agreement with Ford overnight. It is said to be similar to the deal negotiated with Chrysler. It must now be ratified by about 60,000 UAW members.		

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/7/07 :18

The Bay City Commission has given General Motors a tax break on new equipment brought in to the plant. The break is designed to give Powertrain an edge in attracting new business or products, and keeps them firmly planted on Bay City soil.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 11/30/07 1:26

Lawmakers failed to reach an agreement on how to replace the money from the new state service tax. Now, a six percent tax starts on selected services, such as delivery services like UPS and FedEx, airline tickets, tanning and carpet cleaning. This may be the straw that breaks the backs of many small businesses currently struggling.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/4/07 1:25

A grant of \$400,000 from the Michigan Economic Development corporation has sparked business expansion at Glastender, Inc. in Kochville Township. The Township will also be extending its public water main and making improvements to its sanitary sewer. Glastender will be bringing in 40 new jobs with their expansion.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/4/07 1:25

The Shiawassee Economic Development announced a new business starting up in Owosso. Pyramid Peak Coatings will bring in work painting automotive parts. By the end of the year approximately 45 employees will be working at the small business.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/5/07 1:20

Dow Chemical Company announced 80 layoffs within their Midland facility. The company spokesperson said the business is very cyclical, which caused the layoffs. Dow is adding some 75 jobs in the customer service department and laid off employees will have the opportunity to apply for those jobs.

## **2. Economy/National and Local**

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/5/07 1:28

The Sheriff of Genesee County plans to balance his budget by putting his female officers on the street posing as prostitutes. When a person is apprehended for accosting one of the officers, his car is seized and \$900 has to be paid by the owner to get it back. This idea is being well received by Flint residents.

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/24/07 :25

This year, tuition and fees at private four-year schools rose an average of 6.3 percent. Community college tuitions are up 4.2 percent. Federal student loan increases did not keep pace with this inflation.

530PM NAT/NEWS 10/25/07 1:30

The housing slump is proving frustrating to owners wishing to sell. One couple has already lowered the asking price of their dwelling twice. Home re-sales fell for the seventh straight month in September, to the lowest level in 8 years. This causes lenders to tighten their standards eliminating potential owners who cannot meet the new standards.

6PM NAT/NEWS 11/7/07 :21

Delphi reports a \$1.2 billion third quarter net loss, which is smaller than the \$2 billion loss reported this time last year. Delphi filed for bankruptcy and expects to emerge from it early next year.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/9/07 3:50

Chronic shortstaffing seems to be the number one reason for out-of-control overtime costs, and this includes local government agencies such as central dispatch and county employees. Management claims its cheaper than having an additional employee and paying another health care premium.

NOON LOC/NEWS 11/12/07 :29

The Saginaw Board of Commissioners is trying to cut \$6 million with \$1.6 million taken from county law enforcement. The plan could wipe out 22 county law enforcement jobs and the entire detective bureau. These decisions are in the early stage of negotiation.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/13/07 1:22

Saginaw County Commissioners met this evening to try and decide what part of the budget to cut. One of the options is cutting \$1.6 million from the Sheriff's Department, which equals less security. At tonight's meeting, several options were discussed, but no final decisions made. Some likely options to be considered are early retirement and fees.

NOON LOC/NEWS 11/15/07 :24

Delphi has reached an agreement with General Motors and investors on a revised plan to exit bankruptcy protection. The plan included \$5.2 billion in financing. Delphi's creditors' committee opposed the amended plan, but the company plans to persevere towards consensus with its stockholders.

530PM LOC/NEWS 11/27/07 :42

The websites YouTube, MySpace and FaceBook are being utilized by students at an e-commerce class at Saginaw Valley State University. Students are asked to put together a 10-minute video presentation about why the Saginaw Valley is cool.

6PM LOC/NEWS 12/1/07 1:18  
With budgets tightening across the state, what impact will that have on how often roads are plowed this winter. Money from the state and county is combined to clear local roads. Are residents willing to pay more for this service.

530PM LOC/NEWS 12/13/07 :20  
The Michigan DNR says there is no need to raise the price of hunting and fishing licenses. This is because of an increase in the sale of licenses and over \$10 million in surplus funds.

530PM NAT/NEWS 12/17/07 1:32  
Strapped consumers are holding out for better discounts as the Christmas shopping season nears December 25. Meanwhile desperate times call for desperate measures and many stores have extended shopping hours and select malls are keeping open throughout the night on designated days to lure shoppers to their stores.

6PM LOC/NEWS 12/18/07 1:40  
At the State of the County address for Genesee County, The Commission Chairman said a major accomplishment this past year was a plan to eliminate discrimination and make the emergency system more efficient. He says he'll soon post a job for an EMS coordinator to make it happen, using new technology including computers, radios and GPS units.

### 3. Crime

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/4/07 :42  
The Flint Chief of Police announces crime is down during a press conference today. He said that during the first 9 months of the year homicides were down 53 percent, rapes down 36 percent and auto thefts down 29 percent from this time last year. He gives some credit to the city jail, which was recently re-opened in May.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 10/12/07 :25  
A crime alert has been posted for students on the CMU campus today. Police are searching for two men accused of stalking and sexually assaulting an 18-year-old student.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 10/15/07 :25  
Five Flushing teens are accused of spray painting racial and sexist remarks at a local park. If a judge approves it, they will plead guilty to malicious destruction of property and will have to complete probation and pay restitution.

6PM LOC/NEWS 10/27/07 1:37  
It's now been 48 hours since a shooting near a middle school football game left four people injured. While it might seem hard to believe, in the last 10 months crime in the

City of Saginaw has actually gone down—11 percent for homicides, 14 percent for robberies and 3 percent for assaults.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/2/07 3:10

As has been reported numerous times this year, businesses and homeowners have suffered from thieves taking just about anything metal they can grab—a cell phone tower targeted for copper, and metal ripped from public utilities. The stolen items are taken to scrap yards, with police agencies saying they really need these businesses to enforce their I.D. policy.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/9/07 1:00

People gathered at the Kochville Township Hall tonight to discuss ways to start up a Neighborhood watch group. Over the past several months, the community has seen an increase in crime—everything from break-ins to larcenies. Tonight's meeting was the first of several that are planned resulting in an action plan for residents to follow.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/25/07 1:33

An Otisville man was shot and killed by state police after he ignored repeated warnings. Police responded to a call about an armed man threatening to kill someone. People in Otisville are trying to decide if police went too far, with some expressing faith in the officers' judgement, and others feeling the killing was unnecessary.

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/30/07 :45

In Flint, two would-be robbers are recovering after an apparent home invasion went sour. It happened around 8:30 p.m. last night at a house on Burnswick Avenue. One person inside the home shot the two men, with one of the suspects in critical condition.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/4/07 1:21

Ex-mayor Wilmer Jones Ham-McZee was found guilty of insurance fraud, but not guilty of arson today. The charges were a result of a March, 2006 incident, where the former Mayor's Mercedes Benz was found in her driveway, burned. The insurance fraud conviction carries a possible four-year prison sentence.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 12/5/07 :34

Bay City Police believe two men were involved in an armed robbery of the Old Town Pizzeria last night. The two took off on foot with an undisclosed amount of money and one of them was believed to have a gun. A canine unit was called in to assist, but the two are still on the loose at this time.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/13/07 1:10

Police are looking for a man they say stole a purse, hit the 78-year-old woman several times, pulled her out of her car, and sped away with it. The car jacking comes right after

two recent rapes and abductions at this mall. Hearing of the carjacking, some shoppers feel compelled to change their shopping habits.

#### 4. Politics

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/23/07 1:17

A debate in Orlando between presidential candidates seemed geared toward proving to conservative voters that each candidate best represented their ideals. Candidates included Rudy Giuliani, John McCain, and Mitt Romney. Despite some differences, candidates did agree on some issues, including the need for a strong military and not moving towards a government-driven health care system.

530PM LOC/NEWS 10/25/07 1:34

Thirteen candidates are vying for five seats on Saginaw's City Council in this November's election. They include a retired AT & T workers and council members currently on the council up for re-election. The political group "One Saginaw" is endorsing five candidates.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 10/28/07 2:09

There's plenty of enthusiasm at Florida's Democratic State Party Convention, but without some of the main contenders participating. Florida moved its primary to January 29, earlier than Super Tuesday. The Democratic National Party didn't want that to happen and requested its candidates not campaign here.

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/5/07 1:15

Both incumbent Mayor Williamson and Candidate Dayne Wallings are very busy the days just before election. The mayor will be at a "get out the vote" party fielding last minute questions this evening, with Wallings putting in many miles meeting and greeting in neighborhoods, door to door.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/13/07 1:19

Joyce Seals is voted in as the new mayor of the City of Saginaw. Shortly after Seals took her new seat, the voting continued, with the council choosing Larry Couloris as the new Mayor pro-tem. Both choices were welcomed by the audience with standing ovations.

NOON NAT/NEWS 12/17/07 1:30

After several shaky weeks, Hillary Clinton finally picked up an endorsement from The Des Moines Register. Clinton lobbied hard for that endorsement. Her main rival, Barack Obama, picked up his own endorsement over the weekend from The Boston Globe. John McCain was once seen as the GOP favorite, but his campaign has struggled. However, he also has picked up several key newspaper endorsements.

6PM NAT/NEWS 12/20/07 1:33  
A New Orleans city council meeting was disrupted by protestors upset over the proposed demolition of 4,500 public housing units. Critics say that will shrink the pool of cheap housing and force poor blacks from a city still recovering from Hurricane Katrina. After protestors were removed, the meeting resumed quietly and the council approved the housing demolition. Tensions remain high in a city struggling to re-build.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 12/26/07 1:45  
Possible wildcards in the presidential race are out-of-state college students intent on caucusing for their candidates, just like full time Iowa residents. Other campaigns in other cities have tried to woo the out-of-staters, but historically they've had little impact. The race in Iowa is so close, however, their presence may be felt here.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 12/31/07 1:56  
After vowing to stay positive in his advertising campaign, Mike Huckabee started his day at a hunting supply store, taking direct aim at Mitt Romney. Meanwhile, Huckabee's supporters were out in force at Romney events, negating Romney remarks where he implies Huckabee as being soft on cracking down on illegal immigration. Both camps admit it's a very close race as this Iowa race goes down to the wire.

## 5. Health

NOON NAT/NEWS 10/8/07 :25  
A new class of drugs used to treat cancer, may also be effective at suppressing overly-active immune systems. In one study, the drug helped reverse and prevent inflammatory bowel disease.

5PM NAT/NEWS 10/9/07 :22  
The Food and Drug Administration plans to speed review of cheaper versions of brand-name drugs. Officials said the push includes an expedited review process using an updated format.

6P NAT/NEWS 10/9/07 :27  
A drug created to treat seizures and migraines shows promise in treating alcoholism. Doctors aren't exactly sure how Topiramate cuts down on cravings, but believe the drug works by satisfying certain addiction centers in the brain.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/1/07 1:33  
Another mid-Michigan student comes down with the so-called "superbug" MRSA, canceling classes tomorrow. Owosso High School has been shut down so crews can clean up and keep your kids safe.



6PM NAT/NEWS 12/21/07 :14  
The cost of providing health care for workers rose again by more than 6 percent in 2007, to nearly \$8,000 per employee. Analysts warn rising costs will lead more employers to drop insurance plans.

## 6. War in Iraq

6PM LOC/NEWS 10/7/07 :22  
First Class Rick Zimmerman of St. Louis suffered a head injury, fractures and was hit with shrapnel in Baghdad. The 22-year-old was riding in a Humvee when a bomb exploded, injuring him and three others last week. He was due to come home in December.

530PM NAT/NEWS 10/9/07 1:30  
Facing mounting anti-war sentiment among the British public, the Prime Minister of Britain announced that nearly half of Great Britain's troops will be coming home from Iraq next spring. He also says that over the next several months, Iraqi security will take over the Basra Region ending Britain's combat role.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 10/11/07 1:36  
Staff Sgt. Jason Fetty became the first Army Reserve soldier in Afghanistan to receive the silver star, the military's fourth highest medal for valor. A suicide bomber disguised as a doctor made his way into a ribbon cutting ceremony at a new emergency room. But before he was able to strike, Sgt. Fetty lured him away from a crowd of civilians.

6PM LOC/NEWS 10/18/07 1:15  
Davison's Roberta Sparks has send hundreds of care packages to soldiers overseas. She has now gotten people like Al Gore and Ray Ramano to donate items for auction, and help raise funds for the troops.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/11/07 1:27  
Nathan Bundy has been away for the past eight months, seven of which were spent in Iraq. So the first thing he did when getting off the plane is enjoy the comforts of home, especially mom's home cooking. Nathan comes from a family that's made service for the country their life's calling—his sister is in the Navy and her husband is a Marine; Dad is also a Marine.

530PM LOC/NEWS 11/13/07 :24  
Two Northern Michigan soldiers have lost their lives in service to their country. They are 21-year-old Joey Lancour, killed in Afghanistan and from Ludington, and From Manistee, 26-year-old Specialist Nicholas Suriano.

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/14/07 1:18  
There's new information on a Michigan soldier killed in Afghanistan. Joe Lancour, a 21-year-old army specialist, actually lived in Swartz Cree for a time, before heading overseas. Lancour died after he and 4 other soldiers were killed during an ambush. Brian Wood talked with his grandfather today.

11PM NAT/NEWS 11/22/07 1:43  
U.S. Troops around the world are lined up for turkey and all the trimmings, thousands of miles away, but with their minds on home. U.S. military commanders are working hard, providing a little holiday comfort for their troops at bases worldwide, from Kosovo to Afghanistan.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 12/9/07 :28  
A local high school teacher is being deployed to serve in Iraq. John Wolf is a Beaverton High School Special Education teacher and U.S. Army National Guard sergeant. He is being deployed in a few weeks with his Flint-based unit. Wolf expects to be in Iraq for about a year. His wife and two children will remain home in Clare, Michigan.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/23/07 2:00  
To the Marines, Lex was a weapon—a bomb-sniffing dog. But to his handler, Corporal Dustin Lee, Lex was his combat buddy, his partner, and his friend. This past March two insurgent rockets exploded near the pair, killing Corporal Lee. Nine months later, the Marines retired Lex early and gave him to the family of his late combat buddy. The family feels their son is spiritually with him through the dog and welcome him home.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/24/07 1:30  
Banners, flags and excitement fill the halls of Flint's Bishop Airport as family and friends welcome home Tina Sweet. The 21-year-old spent the last 14 months in Iraq, and with two days left before Christmas, Tina got home just in time to enjoy Christmas with her family.

6PM NAT/NEWS 12/25/07 1:31  
Santa Claus found his way to Baghdad. U.S. soldiers there each received a gift to open on Christmas morning, all donated by people back home. The gifts and the traditional dinner with all the trimmings are just a brief break from the front lines, as there is no holiday from the patrols.

## 7. Toy Recalls/Safety

6PM NAT/NEWS 10/5/07 :17  
Three toys sold at discount stores are testing high for lead levels. The Frankenstein cup was the highest. These toys were manufactured before the major recall of Chinese-made toys.

11PM NAT/NEWS 10/5/07 1:37  
The recall list continues to as the Consumer Product Safety Commission announced products deemed unsafe, warning there will likely be more recalls in the near future. They include coin-shaped Pirates of the Caribbean, flashlights, soft textured Baby Einstein blocks and a variety of wooden toys imported and sold by KB Toys. They are all said to have surface paint containing dangerous levels of lead which can be toxic if ingested by young children.

530PM NAT/NEWS 10/12/07 :17  
Comic book and toy maker, Marvel, is taking some preventative measures by halting shipments of all Curious George toys, after a California-based consumer group said one of the dolls was tainted with lead.

11PM NAT/NEWS 10/26/07 :20  
Mattel's Fisher Price Division is recalling 38,000 "Go Diego Go" toys. The orange and yellow "Go Diego Go" animal rescue boats contain excessive levels of lead.

5PM NAT/NEWS 11/7/07 :19  
Fisher Price is pulling thousands of kitchen toys off the shelves tonight. The company has received 48 reports of small parts separating from "Laugh and Learn— Learning Kitchen" toys. The Mexican-made toys were sold between May and October of this year.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/26/07 1:39  
The Christmas season is now in full swing, but with recent toy recalls, many people are turning away from the big chain stores and opting to buy their toys from smaller shops, like River Place Toys here in Frankenmuth. It seems everyone we talked to today is shopping more in the smaller toy stores and paying more attention to labels, to see what the toys are made of and the country in which they're manufactured.

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/29/07 1:31  
For the last 60 years, Toys for Tots has helped thousands of children, all across the country, including here in mid-Michigan. But the massive number of toy recalls over the last several months has given volunteers one more thing to worry about. As the toys come in, lists are studied to make sure toys recalled are not sent out to children.



11PM NAT/NEWS 11/6/07 :21  
A new study shows young people who mix energy drinks with alcohol are twice as likely to end up harmed than those who just drink alcohol. They found people who drank energy drink cocktails were more likely to suffer injuries and require medical help.

530PM LOC/NEWS 11/7/07 :23  
Voters in Hudsonville are deciding for the third time in seven years whether to lift a ban on alcohol sales that has been in effect for nearly two decades. The Ottawa County community near Grand Rapids is the last dry city in the state.

530PM LOC/NEWS 11/21/07 1:20  
Aside from travel, the night before Thanksgiving is traditionally the biggest night of the year for partying. That also means stepped-up police patrols looking for drunk drivers. TV5 has their reporter checking in at the Bridgeport State Police Post.

530PM NAT/NEWS 12/07/07 1:05  
Barry Bonds walked into a San Francisco courtroom and entered a “not guilty” plea. Bonds maintains he did not lie to a grand jury when he denied knowingly using performance-enhancing drugs. Back in 2003 Bonds and several other athletes testified before that grand jury under a grant of immunity.

NOON NAT/NEWS 12/12/07 1:20  
Accused steroid-user Barry Bonds is about to get a lot of company. A report is being released that’s expected to link as many as 80 major league baseball players to performance-enhancing drugs. Just last month, Bonds, a baseball all-time home run leader, was indicted on charges of lying to a grand jury about steroid use.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 12/20/07 1:30  
It took Federal, State and local investigators a year to bring the Pierson Hood Gang of Flint down. So far, a dozen of the alleged gang members are in custody on a variety of charges, including murder and drug trafficking.

## **9. Sex Offenders/Predators**

NOON LOC/NEWS 10/03/0 :16  
Over the next two weeks, sex offenders have to report, in person, to police, to verify their addresses. Registered sex offenders are required to do this four times a year.

6PM LOC/NEWS 10/4/07 :17  
In Thomas Township, the Board of Trustees unanimously voted to tighten restrictions on porn shops. Under the amended zoning ordinance, an adult business is defined as one with 25 percent of their business dedicated to adult entertainment.

5PM LOC/NEWS 10/19/07 1:25  
Michigan State Police have arrested three people for failing to verify their address, on the State's sex offender registry. They are from Saginaw, Mt. Pleasant, and Farwell. All were expected to verify their addresses by the start of the month.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/10/07 :20  
A Burton man has been charged with five different sex crimes against children to whom he's related. The 33-year-old allegedly committed those crimes in Flint and Vienna Township back in 2006. He could spend 20 years behind bars.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/14/07 :41  
According to a spokesperson from Child & Family Services in Saginaw, children who have been sexually abused themselves or who have been exposed to violent or sexualized behavior begin to act out sexually themselves. It is unclear if Kevin Odette was abused

as a child; however, police suspect he began sexually assaulting his victims when he was just 10 years old. In the last 20 years, police say Odette preyed on strangers and even relatives in his own home.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/17/07 1:17  
It took several months for police to gather enough evidence to arrest 32-year-old Chad Gorzela. He is accused of attempting to arrange sex with a 7-year-old girl over the internet. Gorzela is charged with five counts of child sex-related felonies and is being held on a \$500,000 bond.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 11/30/07 1:36  
The YMCA in Muskegon says it has never had a problem with sexual predators. Their insurance company suggested the Y check to see if any of their members were on the state's sex offender registry. They were surprised to discover at least 20 people within their membership were on that list. The organization has passed a new policy stating if you're on the list do not apply at the Y, and if you are a current member, you need to quit the organization.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/30/07 :17  
A West Michigan man is accused of trying to use the internet to meet underage girls for sex. Police say the man planned to meet two underage girls in Wayne and Macomb Counties. He was caught by deputies posing as underage girls on the internet.

530PM NAT/NEWS 12/4/07 1:25  
Eight months after he was fired by CBS Radio and MSNBC for making racial and sexist remarks about the Rutgers Women's basketball team, Don Imus says he still regrets the incident, and has apologized numerous times.



6PM LOC/NEWS 11/6/07 1:19  
Police responded to a home invasion call in Flint Township. Police say a man confronted his former girlfriend, grabbed her car keys and took off. With the discovery of a possible crime scene, as well as Cal's refusal to take a polygraph, focus was placed on Cal, who began a relationship with a former girlfriend just eighteen days after Michele's disappearance. On September 30, 2005, Cal Harris was arrested and charged with murder. The trial began on May 21, 2007 and ultimately, he was found guilty of second degree murder. Just days before Cal Harris was to be sentenced, a new witness came forward and claimed to have driven past the Harris driveway around dawn on September 12, 2001 and had seen a man and a woman, who appeared to be arguing. According to this new eyewitness, the woman resembled Michele, but the man did not look like Cal. With this new information, the judge threw out Cal's conviction for the murder of his wife and ordered a new trial. It will be at least a year before Cal Harris is tried again. Esther had disappeared from the Seattle, Washington area after pleading guilty to theft and forgery in 1999. Since her disappearance, Esther has been making her way across the country, claiming to be a chess champion. Using phoney Social Security numbers, fake identities, first as Natalie Fisher, then Natalie Bowman, and finally, as Brook Henson, she has managed to elude authorities. In addition, she financed her Manhattan lifestyle through fraudulent student loans taken in Brooke Henson's name. This September, a federal grand jury in South Carolina handed down an indictment, charging Esther Reed with felony identity theft and student loan fraud. Federal Authorities are currently searching for Esther Reed, who remains at large. 12/08/07      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: “An Invisible Enemy”** - United States Marine Todd Sommer, married and a father to four children, was only twenty-three years old when he collapsed on February 18th, 2002 and died in San Diego, California. The Navy Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) opened a routine investigation into Todd’s death and found nothing unusual. Though he had been exhibiting symptoms similar to food poisoning in the days leading up to his death, the official cause of death was cardiac arrhythmia. A year later, his wife Cynthia relocated to Florida with a new boyfriend and her four children, but NCIS Special Agent Mark Ridley believed that the autopsy had overlooked important clues – the symptoms Todd had been experiencing days before his collapse. He believed that those symptoms and Todd’s sudden death were related, and ordered a rare heavy metals test on Todd’s tissue sample. Almost two and a half years after Todd’s death, results indicated that Todd was poisoned with a lethal dose of arsenic. The NCIS became convinced that Todd’s death was a homicide and that the lure of Todd’s military life insurance policy gave Cynthia the motive for murder. In November 2005, Cynthia Sommer was arrested and charged with first-degree murder. Based on the time Todd’s symptoms first appeared and the fact that the symptoms of an acute arsenic poisoning mimic the severe stomach problems Todd experienced, the prosecutor concluded that Cynthia was the only person who could have poisoned her husband. That, along with what prosecutors called immoral behavior, including breast implant surgery, resulted in Cynthia being found guilty of murder. Ten months later, at Cynthia’s sentencing hearing, her new attorney, Allen Bloom, asked the judge to grant her a new trial, based on the number of errors committed by her trial attorney, Bob Udell. The judge agreed and granted a new trial motion. Cynthia Sommer maintains her innocence and is asking to be released on bail. No new trial date has been set. 12/15/07      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: “The Girl Next Door” (2)** - a follow-up to one of the two stories included in “The Girl Next Door” (OAD: 01/07/06). In that report, Detective Scott Dudek of the Alameda County (CA) Sheriff’s Office was attempting to establish the identity of a teenage girl whose body was found on May 1, 2003 in a trash bag left behind a restaurant in Castro Valley, California. Forensic sculptor Gloria Nusse created a reconstruction of the girl’s face, based on nothing but her skull. After the initial 2006 report on 48 HOURS MYSTERY, a viewer called to say that the victim looked like a young girl who had been seen around Castro Valley with Miguel Castaneda, who had worked at the restaurant where the body was dumped. He had disappeared, but police received a tip that the girl and the man she had been seen with might have been from the same hometown in Mexico. Dudek and his team then went to Yahualica, Mexico. There they extensively publicized their search and handed out many fliers. A woman whose daughter was missing came forward, and a DNA sample would later confirm that she was the mother of the now-identified victim: Yesenia Nungaray. Yesenia was given a funeral in her hometown. The search for Miguel Castaneda continues. (C: Harold Dow - P: Clare Friedland)

- 12/22/07      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Biggest Gamble"** - a follow-up to "The Highest Stakes" (OAD: 03/04/06), a report on the investigation into the October 2005 disappearance of Christie Wilson, a 27-year-old from Sacramento, California. Christie was last seen at the Thunder Valley Casino in the company of Mario Garcia, a 53-year-old married father of two. A lengthy investigation revealed that Mario had a prior criminal record including charges of rape and assault with a deadly weapon and spousal abuse. That information, as well as DNA evidence linking him to Christie, resulted in his arrest. His trial lasted two months and the jury deliberated for just three days. Despite the absence of a murder weapon and physical evidence to prove that Christie Wilson is dead, Mario Garcia was sentenced to a term of twenty-five years to life. Based on a serious prior conviction, his sentence was doubled to fifty years. Mario Garcia still maintains his innocence. Volunteers continue to search for Christie Wilson's body. - 12/25/07      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Mystery of Christmas"** - Correspondent Maureen Maher journeys to the Holy Land to investigate the story of the birth of Jesus. 48 HOURS searches for archeological proof of the Biblical accounts, decodes the messages hidden in the scriptures and examines starkly different versions of Christmas. Maher explores the lands of the Bible with Professor Ben Witherington, a conservative scholar and evangelical minister, in a return to the 'historical bedrock' where history and faith intersect. Witherington takes 48 HOURS to the cave in Bethlehem where he says Jesus was born; the excavations of ancient Nazareth; Carpernaum, where Jesus' ministry was based; and the stone city of Petra, where he claims the Wise Men passed through. The broadcast examines numerous questions. Was Jesus born in Bethlehem of Nazareth? Were there shepherds at Christ's birth, or magi, or both? Was there a guiding star the night of the birth? Is December 25th the true birth date of Christ? How accurate are the different infancy narratives in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke? How much creative license did the Gospel authors take? Witherington makes the case for the Virgin Birth. The veracity of the belief is questioned by Professor John Dominic Crossan, a former Roman Catholic monk, and Princeton University Professor Elaine Pagels. - 12/29/07      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Defending Your Life" (WEST COAST ONLY)** - for nearly 17 years, sisters Kim and Beth Jones of Snohomish, Washington, have been trying to prove that their father, Jerry Jones, Jr. is innocent of the Dec. 3, 1988 stabbing murder of their mother, Lee. Jones was tried and found guilty of his wife's murder, but in 1999, an appeals court ordered him released due to an ineffective lawyer. In 2001, Jones was re-tried and re-convicted. His conviction was reversed again, because the jury didn't hear crucial evidence. In 2005, Jones, who chose to represent himself, was tried for the third time. Despite Jones' attempts to prove that Danny Busby, a teenage neighbor, was the real killer, a jury found him guilty of murder. He was sentenced to 25 years in prison, but as a result of time served and good behavior, Jerry Jones will be eligible for release in three years.
