KCNC broadcasts both locally produced and network programming. Although we include only local programs herein, KCNC also broadcasts several network programs including Face The Nation, 60 Minutes and 48 Hours, which we believe also serve community needs and interests.

CBS4 MORNING - Regularly scheduled news broadcast dealing with timely news and other subjects of general interest to viewers in the metropolitan area.

Duration: Two hours Monday - Friday 5:00 am - 7:00am. One hour Saturday 7:00am - 8:00am. Two hours Sunday 6:00am – 8:00am.

CBS4 AT NOON - Regularly scheduled news broadcast dealing with timely news and other subjects of general interest to viewers in the metropolitan area.

ISSUES

WELFARE – Aid for the disabled and the aging.

CBS4 MORNING – 07/03/06 An audit has found that Colorado mishandled \$90 million dollars in welfare payments last year. 007/21/06 Members of several organizations are planning a massive clean-up of the clear creek canal in Adams County, where several homeless people have set up camp. 08/13/06 A 47-year-old disabled man left a nursing care center, and hasn't been seen since. 08/21/06 A man with no arms and just one leg has earned his driver's license. CBS4 AT 5 – 07/08/06 Since the death of Paul Childs, a non-profit organization called "Face It" has been working to shed light on mental illnesses in the African-American community. 07/27/06 – K-Mart has agreed to a multi-million dollar settlement to make its stores more accessible to wheelchairs. 08/05/06 "Rebuilding Together" volunteers repaired the home of a disabled man with donated materials for free. 08/19/06 – This is the 28th year for Paint-A-Thon, where volunteers and Brothers Redevelopment do home repairs for low income seniors throughout the metro area. 08/27/06 A 20-year-old developmentally disabled young man, with many other health problems, received assistance from the community to make his dream come true to go to Disney World. 09/21/06 Wal-Mart is slashing prices on hundreds of prescription drugs, offering new hope to the uninsured and seniors on fixed incomes. CBS4 AT 6 – 07/20/06 Investigators believe that Ivan Guerrero, who worked at Denver Human Services for 13 years, set up a six-year scam diverting welfare benefits intended for the needy, to himself. CBS4 AT 10 – 07/30/06 – The Little League has a "Challenger Division" for disabled children. The disabled children play using wheelchairs, walkers and buddies to assist them. 09/19/06 The Denver District Attorney's office sends fraud alert letters every month to seniors throughout the state.

ANIMALS – Educate the public on the importance of spaying or neutering pets.

CBS4 MORNING – 09/26/06 People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals is unhappy with a Halloween promotion at several Six Flags Amusement Parks. CBS4 AT NOON – 09/08/06 The Dog Flu began several years ago in Florida, and has quickly made its way to Colorado. CBS4 AT 5 – 07/18/06 A group of teenagers in Summit County are spending their summer trying to save the bears. CBS4 AT 6 – 09/12/06 The Colorado Veterinary Wellness Center, in Loveland, is one of a growing number of physical therapy clinics for pets. CBS4 AT 10 – 08/10/96 The MaxFund Animal Shelter is overcrowded, so they are offering two kittens for the price of one, which includes vaccinations, spaying or neutering and micro-chipping. 09/02/06 The Rocky Mountain Wildlife Sanctuary in Keenesburg, northeast of Denver, is closing after 12 years, due to financial troubles. They are accepting donations, and will feed the animals until they can find them new homes. 09/25/06 The FDA has concluded that 3600 dogs have had adverse reactions, from vomiting to partial blindness, to the drug Deramaxx. 09/30/06 The Fourth Annual Animal Olympics have begun in China.

EDUCATION – Drop out rates, physical education, school lunches and decline in arts education in schools.

CBS4 MORNING - 7/11/06 Mayor Hickenlooper is proposing a raise in sales tax in order to raise \$12 million dollars a year to fund pre-school education for four year olds in the city. 09/01/06 Denver Public Schools and its teachers union have reached a new “tentative” contract agreement for the school year.

CBS4 AT 5 – 08/19/06 The Manual High School Renewal Team held a meeting to discuss the re-opening of Manual in the fall of 2007. 08/20/06 Denver Public Schools start classes tomorrow, and the Denver Police are reminding everyone to obey speed limits in school zones. 09/07/06 The Denver Public School District announced that all schools that serve breakfast will now offer it to students for free. Studies have shown that kids who eat breakfast learn better. 09/10/06 The Denver Center for International Studies celebrated its grand opening. It is a magnet for middle and high school students who want to know what makes the world tick. 09/11/06 Statistics show that an estimated 1400 college students die each year from alcohol related incidents. Samantha Spady’s family is working to educate students. 09/18/06 Oprah Winfrey is building the Leadership Academy for African Girls, for girls who otherwise would not get an education.

CBS4 AT 6 – 07/06/06 Federal law mandates that all school children receive a public education, regardless of their status in this country. 09/18/06 Julissa Torres mentors students who were displaced by the closure of Manual High School. 09/21/06 The Denver Public Schools foundation is launching a major initiative aimed at boosting achievement. Twenty companies will work with twenty schools in the “School Partners” program.

CBS4 AT 10 – 08/01/06 Denver’s School Superintendent Michael Bennet says his District is doing everything it can to hold onto arts and music programs, and believes they even help students learn subjects like math. 09/17/06 At the Peace Jam Conference at the University of Denver, Archbishop Desmond Tutu told thousands of young people that they have the tools and opportunity to make the world a better place. He stressed the importance of modern education.

HEALTH – Growing cost of health care

CBS4 MORNING – 07/19/06 for the first time, the government has approved the use of electronic medical records products. It will encourage doctors to switch from paper systems and to communicate not only in-house, but with other medical systems. Studies show that this will save the health care industry \$81 billion dollars a year. 07/25/06 Seventeen local hospitals and medical clinics may be sold to investors. Industry experts say there could be higher deductibles and diminished health plan benefits. 07/27/06 Medical Tourism is a growing trade. People are traveling to India or Thailand or Mexico for cheaper surgery when they don’t have insurance. 09/01/06 Since the contract has expired, doctors who have patients who use United Healthcare, or any of its subsidiaries, are scrambling to get in at different hospitals. 09/06/06 The health care industry stalemate between United Healthcare and HealthOne continues. United is Colorado’s largest insurer and HealthOne runs seven of metro Denver’s hospitals. 09/14/06 HealthOne and United Healthcare are still in negotiations.

It's been two weeks since the contract expired. The contract negotiations are actually a national negotiation involving ten major markets in nine states. CBS4 AT 6 – 07/06/06 Lawmakers are proposing that illegal immigrants, who are adults, do not have to prove legal status for lifesaving health care or prenatal care.

CBS4 AT 10 – 07/25/06 HealthOne says its hospitals will stop accepting United Healthcare Insurance on September 1st, unless the two companies can agree on a new contract. 08/06/06 – More than 4,500 people visited the Family Health Fair at Kaiser Permanente that featured free diabetes screenings, pediatric exams and child immunizations. 08/31/06 The contract between United Health Care insurance and Health One hospitals will expire September 1st.

CULTURE – Major concerns about immigrants; political and personal issues.

CBS4 MORNING – 07/02/06 Educators at Montbello High School were floored when they learned that Jesus Villanueva, a dedicated student, had limited college options because he is in the US illegally. 08/11/06 The Senate Budget Committee met for two hours in Aurora, but no decisions were made about how to handle the cost of illegal immigration. 08/30/06 Members of the Senate Budget committee hope to learn more about how much illegal immigration costs local and state governments. The hearing will also discuss the fiscal impacts of US border policies. 09/05/06 Colorado passed what some are calling the nation's toughest illegal immigration laws this summer, and now, state agencies have to verify someone's legal status before providing them with state services. 09/18/06 A new CBS4/Rocky mountain News poll shows that "illegal immigration" is one of the top election issues for Coloradans this fall.

CBS4 AT 5 – 07/05/06 Colorado lawmakers hope to resolve immigration issues during the special session. 07/11/06 Governor Owens says he is pleased that lawmakers have passed a bill that punishes businesses for hiring illegal immigrants. 08/01/06 New state laws went into effect today which require Coloradans to show proof of citizenship in order to receive public assistance for non-emergency services.

CBS4 AT 6 – 08/01/06 The toughest of Colorado's immigration laws is now in effect. Anyone who is 18 or older, needing state services such as welfare or food stamps, will have to prove that he or she is a US Citizen.

CBS4 AT 10 – 07/22/06 A recent study in Colorado showed that illegal immigrants only compete for jobs with people working at the lowest levels. 08/31/06 In Colorado, Bob Beauprez says he's for education, but in Washington, he voted to cut student aid, making it more difficult for middle class Coloradans to send their children to college.
