CHILDREN

WEEK OF JANUARY 3-7, 2005

- Alice Hisanoto, Alaska Youth and Parent Division, discussed facilities and services to youth at risk and presented a year round list of needs not covered in the general operating budget.

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 21-25, 2005

- Paula Burgan, Public Relations Director for Anchorage Youth Court appeared two consecutive days to explain the function of the Youth Court participants who are students from grades 7-12.

WEEK OF MARCH 28- APRIL 1, 2005

- Sharon Larson RN urged parents who have children with allergies to start them on antihistamine now before the pollen actually appears on trees.

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EDUCATION

WEEK OF JANUARY 10-14, 2005

- Dr. A Wolf, psychiatrist, addressed the problem afflicting people during the dark winter months, such as mild depression, lethargy, and general funk. He made several suggestions to alleviate the mood swings.

WEEK OF JANUARY 24-28, 2005

- Dr. A Wolf, explained the contents of a bill before the Legislature giving patient information access and the ramification of this very personal record.

WEEK OF JANUARY 31- FEBRUARY 4, 2005

- Dr. A Wolf, psychiatrist, addressed the attempted suicide in California derailing trains, killing and injuring many people. He looked at warning signals and suggested how to obtain help.

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 21-25, 2005

- Paula Burgan, Public Relations Director for Anchorage Youth Court appeared two consecutive days to explain the function of the youth court participants who are students from grades 7-12.
- Community schools lost their funding from the School District and Municipality. They have been taken over by a nonprofit called Anchorage Community Education Association and are operating in six locations and serving three thousand people.

WEEK OF MARCH 7-11, 2005

- Sheryl Stanlk, home economist with University of Anchorage explained the expanded Food Nutrition Education Program.

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ENVIRONMENT

WEEK OF JANUARY 3-7, 2005

- Wayne Vandre, horticulturist, addressed the caring of Christmas plants and wreaths for the maximum beauty.

WEEK OF JANUARY 10-14, 2005

- Wayne Vandre, horticulturist, pointed out the danger to grass and shrubs from using salt melt on the sidewalks and car ports. When thawing in the spring, salt leaks into the yards burning the roots of grass and shrubs.
- Wayne Vandre, horticulturist, addressed the issues of stress on house plants in dry and hot indoors winter conditions. He offered solutions for plants not thriving.

WEEK OF JANUARY 17-21, 2005

- Wayne Vandre, horticulturist, warned home owners of the dangers of using ice melt on sidewalks, because in the spring the run off will kill the plants and shrubs boarding the walkways.

WEEK OF JANUARY 24-28, 2005

- Wayne Vandre, horticulturist, showed new seeds catalogs. He cautioned ordering only seeds which would flourish in northern climes.

03/05/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Secrets Of The Well"**- reports on two separate unsolved murders with strange similarities, both solved by Georgia criminal investigator Clay Bryant:
1) a report on the murder case of Gwendolyn Moore, a 30-year-old mother whose body was pulled from a well in August 1970. Gwendolyn's husband, Marshall, immediately came under suspicion. Moore, who passed a lie detector test, was not thoroughly investigated at the time because of connections to the local police department. After 30 years Bryant found enough evidence to charge Marshall Moore with the murder of his wife. He will go on trial on March 28, 2005.
2) In 1987, Fred Wilkerson, a small town fire chief and 49-year-old father, seemingly vanished. Bryant determined that the prime suspect was Wilkerson's ex-lover, Connie Quedans. At the time of the disappearance the estranged couple was involved in a property dispute. Bryant unearthed evidence and Wilkerson's body was found in Quedan's well. 03/12/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Prime Suspect"** followup to "Prime Suspect" (OAD: 04/07/04), a report on Marty Tankleff who, as a 17-year-old, was convicted of murdering his adoptive parents Seymour and Arlene Tankleff in their Belle Terre, Long Island home. Tankleff's relatives believe that Marty, now 33, is innocent and hope that a new trial will set him free. Includes interview with several key witnesses and with Tankleff's investigator, New York City detective Jay Salpeter, who took the case on a pro bono basis; Assistant District Attorney Leonard Lato who is fighting to uphold Tankleff's conviction; and Richard Ofshe, an expert in interrogation tactics who feels that innocent people, including Marty Tankleff, can be persuaded to confess to crimes they did not commit. 03/19/05 **PACIFIC NET ONLY - 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Driven To Extremes"** - On Aug. 7, 2000, Mary Hill was driving three neighborhood teenagers, including her daughter, Amy, home from school. Less than two miles from their home in an Orlando, Florida suburb, the car crashed into a tree, claiming the lives of Amy and her best friend, Carrie Brown. The third teen, Zak Rockwell, suffered brain injuries. Hill claims she lost control of her BMW because it sped up on its own, but investigators say that Hill was driving recklessly. After an eight-month investigation by the Florida Highway Patrol, Hill was charged with vehicular homicide and manslaughter. Three and a half years after the accident she was tried and found guilty of two counts of vehicular homicide. Mary will remain in jail until her sentencing on May 10, 2004. The judge in the case has the option of proposing a treatment program instead of prison. 03/26/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Question Of Murder"**- John Maloney, a Green Bay, Wisconsin police officer, was convicted of murdering his estranged wife, Sandy, in 1999. He has always maintained his innocence. After Maloney's conviction, the prosecutor in the case, Joe Paulus, pled guilty to accepting bribes to fix more than 20 cases. The question arises as to whether Maloney got a fair trial and whether he is entitled to be re-tried. Sheila Berry, part-time novelist, part-time investigator and part-time head of Truth In Justice, a non-profit group that tries to help people it considers wrongly imprisoned, has taken up Maloney's cause. Berry is convinced not only that Maloney is innocent, but that Sandy Maloney was not murdered but died of alcohol poisoning. John Maloney is appealing for a new trial and the state of Wisconsin is investigating whether prosecutorial misconduct could have influenced the outcome of his trial for murder.
