Four months later, Phelps committed suicide. In 2003, a county-wide cold case team was formed to take a second look at Vickie's murder. The squad discovered a portion of audiotape from Jim's 911 call which revealed a discrepancy in his testimony. Subsequently, Gary Henson told police that Jim Barton was responsible for his wife's death because he had sent Phelps to the house to scare Vicki in hopes of driving her to live in town where Jim supposedly needed to live to become police chief. A jury found Jim Barton guilty of involuntary manslaughter and he will serve at least 15 years in prison. He plans to appeal the verdict.
