PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/8/07 – Smart kids might turn out to be safe adults! A long-term study on more than 11,000 children in Scotland shows those who scored lower on intelligence tests between ages seven through eleven were more likely than other kids to be hospitalized for accidental injuries as adults. Researchers say children with lower intelligence tended to leave school earlier – perhaps affecting their ability to process information or put them in riskier jobs and living conditions. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/12/07 – An area health organization is teaming up with the Palm Beach County School District to help students succeed in both the classroom and at home. Last year at Highland Elementary, a student’s aggressive behavioral problems kept him from learning. After two months of problems, his kindergarten teacher reached out to the Health Care District of Palm Beach County’s behavioral health program. Behavioral health professionals have offices in 46 elementary schools. They provide emotional, developmental and physical health services. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/16/07 – Tennis celebrity and model Anna Kournikova will meet with Palm Beach County school principals to discuss the importance of eating right. Kournikova will make a special presentation on the connection between eating a healthy breakfast and improved classroom achievement. After her presentation, Anna made a special stop at North Palm Beach Elementary to field questions from students on nutrition. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/17/07 –The Palm Beach County School Board is set to decide on a boundary change that would bump more than 200 students out of Jupiter High School and into Dwyer High School. But Jupiter High is an “A” rated school and Dwyer is a “C” rated school. There’s another issue though, so-called boundary “jumpers” or students at Jupiter High who lied about their residency to get into the school. Parents say the School District should investigate how many students should not be at Jupiter High before they start moving students around. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/17/07 – Martin County public schools could soon put a price on naming a building or even a classroom. The Education Foundation of Martin County presented the option to the School Board. It’s not an original idea it’s used all across the country and in colleges very successfully. Those who donate money to the school district could have their names attached to just about anything. The money would go directly back into the School District where budgets are always tight. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/18/07 – A new type of security system is being installed in a Boca Raton Middle School making it a beta test site in Palm Beach County for such a device. The security system requires a swipe of a driver's license and it immediately checks against the state's database of registered sex offenders. The electronic identification system eliminates the staff from having to run the checks and it keeps an electronic log. It also detects when the ID has expired or has been tampered with. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/25/07 – Nearly two dozen students from St. Anastasia's school in Ft. Pierce were taken to local hospitals after becoming sick. The school's principal says this outbreak of sickness happened very quickly and took everyone by surprise. One child passed out and then another. The common complaints were intestinal pains, nausea and fever. After ambulances were called, the rest of the school remained on lock down. School officials were trying to determine what cause the sudden outbreak of sickness at the school. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/26/07 – It was once a Charter School that was stripped of its charter because of failing F-Cat grades. Then it converted to an alternative school. Now the Riviera Beach Academy is scheduled to close. The school announced its closing saying it was due to financial problems and lagging enrollment, but for many of the at-risk teens who were students, the program might be their last hope. Many have no idea where they will end up and what their choices could be. But funding will not be coming from the School District and it is unlikely there are wealthy patrons who will make donations to keep the school going. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/9/07 – This year Congress must decide whether to re-authorize the state's Children's Health Insurance program known as S-Chip. It's led to millions of uninsured children getting coverage but it's also expensive and some states are strapped for cash. States already cover uninsured children through Medicaid, and the state's children's health insurance program "S-Chip". S-Chip uses mostly Federal funds to pay for kids whose families aren't poor enough for Medicaid, but too poor to buy insurance. It would take a 13 to 15 billion dollar increase just to keep current kids insured. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/22/07 – It's considered the biggest medical advance in more than a hundred years – sanitation. More than 11,000 people around the world were polled on the greatest medical breakthrough since 1840. Sanitation beat out antibiotics, the birth control pill and vaccines. It's why doctors say one of the best ways to stay healthy is to simply wash your hands. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/26/07 - Starting this fall, Florida State University will become the first state college to require its students to buy the University's health insurance or prove they have comparable coverage of their own. State lawmakers want to study the costs and benefits of expanding a similar program to the other 10 public universities. The shift comes at a time when colleges are diagnosing depression, diabetes and other serious illnesses. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/27/07 – A new phenomenon in health care treatment is happening. Patients are using websites to post information about their progress, get information about the latest treatments, read blogs, write a daily journal and talk with others going through the same thing. The web has replaced traditional support/self-help groups and has provided healing help especially to those in remote locations. Doctors are also learning to incorporate the use of websites into their patients' treatments. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 2/19/07 – Heart Disease is the leading killer of women and yet most women are unaware of their own risks. They ignore the risk factors such as smoking, being overweight, high cholesterol, and a family history of diabetes. For many women it takes a close call before they realize that a heart attack is not just a man's problem. The American Heart Association is encouraging women to know their risk factors and talk with their doctors about any pain issues or problems that might be early warning signs of heart disease. (1-2 minutes - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2– 3/12/07 – Laughter may really be the best medicine according to a new study. Researchers found people with a good sense of humor about life were more likely to live longer than those who didn't find many things particularly funny. The effect was particularly strong among cancer patients, where having a good sense of humor cut the risk of death by about 70%. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 3/12/07 – Stress appears to be taking a toll on American soldiers. A study of more than a hundred thousand veterans who returned from duty in Iraq or Afghanistan between 2001 and 2005 found nearly 30% have been diagnosed with some sort of mental illness. The most common illness was post traumatic stress disorder. The conditions were more common in younger soldiers ages 18 to 24. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 3/23/07 – Elizabeth Edward's health is once again playing a role in her husband's bid for the White House. The breast cancer first appeared after the 2004 election has returned. A diagnosis the Edwards say they are embracing with a survivor's spirit as they plow ahead on the campaign trail. The treatment plan will likely include hormone therapy and other medicines designed to keep the disease from spreading any more. Meanwhile it has fostered a discussion nationwide about whether the Edwards should continue to campaign or should withdraw and concentrate on her treatment. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 3/25/07 – At the first presidential forum for the 2008 election, health care took center stage. Democratic candidates spoke yesterday about plans for improving the nation's health care system. Their opinions were split over whether the democratic priority of providing health care for all Americans would require a tax increase. Several said not only is universal health care doable but the time is right. The issue comes at a time when millions of Americans are uninsured. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/16/07 – Colombian police have captured one of the country's top suspected drug lords after a gun battle at a farm west of Bogota. Eugenio Montoya is wanted for extradition to the U.S., his brother Don Diego is one the FBI's 10 Most Wanted List. The two are accused of running a Colombian drug cartel involved in money laundering and shipping hundreds of tons of cocaine into the U.S. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/30/07 – Police have revealed one of their game plans to keep visitors safe for the Super Bowl. A tactical narcotics team hit the streets to crack down on illegal drug sales. Officers set up a sting along the streets and neighborhoods that surround Dolphin stadium. For weeks they've put the blitz on drug dealers and buyers, locking them up and confiscating thousands of dollars in marijuana and crack cocaine. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/5/07 – Twenty one people were arrested this weekend in Fort Pierce in a reverse sting operation by the St. Lucie County Sheriff's Office and the Fort Pierce Police Department. Over a 28 hour period, twenty men and one woman were arrested after they tried to buy crack cocaine from an undercover dealer. They ranged in age from 27 to 54 years old. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/22/07 – A crackdown is underway in Florida on illegal internet pharmacies. Fifteen of those pharmacies have been shutdown as law enforcement authorities say they've filled millions of orders of potentially addictive painkillers. Authorities say thousands of websites and hundreds of illegal internet pharmacies have sprung up nationwide, cutting corners on medical exams, and charging six to ten times the normal price for prescription drugs that are widely abused. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/28/07 – Last year there were more than 500 drug-related deaths in Palm Beach County. Now a local organization is addressing the problem in a dramatic way. They are showing students the deadly consequences of drugs. Their presentations are graphic but the goal is clear, they want young people to make a crucial choice, because they may only get one chance to say no to drugs. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/14/07 – The Palm Beach County Sheriff's office says the number of accidental drug overdose deaths has nearly doubled in the past few years. They claim the popularity of prescription drugs is to blame. The Sheriff's Office supports a bill in the state legislature that would create a database of everyone who's prescribed a pharmaceutical. They believe it will keep people from doctor shopping and filling prescriptions at several pharmacies. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/15/07 – A new report is due today on the behavior of America's college students. The report reveals an increased intensity in binge drinking and prescription and illegal drug abuse among college students. Researchers say there needs to be more sobriety programs available at colleges and universities to help students overcome addictions and eating disorders. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/19/07 – Investigators are calling it one of the biggest cocaine busts in Martin County history. Detectives arrested 49 people and seized more than two million dollars in drugs. It's part of Operation Mexican Snow. Some of the suspects face forty years or more behind bars. They range from street level sellers to major smugglers. Martin County investigators say all 49 made up an organized drug ring that supplied cocaine from the Treasure Coast to North Carolina. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/22/07 – A house once riddled with drug dealers and users is now no longer a nuisance. It is now home to West Palm Beach Police Officers. The new police community center is located in the heart of a dangerous section of West Palm Beach. And it is bringing residents a sense of security. Police are encouraging residents to visit the community center freely and establish relationships with the police community. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/13/07 – The Navy and Coast Guard made a big catch at sea, not a fish, but lots of cocaine. They showed off twenty one tons of cocaine at Florida's naval station - Mayport yesterday. The drugs were seized over the past four month from smuggling boats. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/5/07 – A man convicted in one of the biggest cocaine seizures in St. Lucie County history was sentenced to life in prison. Investigators seized more than 16 million dollars worth of cocaine last year – when they boarded a fishing boat off the Ft. Pierce inlet. John Bolen the owner of the boat was given a life sentence in the federal courthouse in Ft. Pierce. (1-2 minutes in length -5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/10/07 – An eighth grader in Pasco County has been arrested and accused of using cocaine on a school bus. New Port Richey police say the 14 year-old got cocaine and began using it on a school bus in front of other students. Administrators believe the teen received the drugs from a supplier who provided drugs to another teen a month ago. The teen now faces expulsion and time in juvenile detention. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4– 1/4/07 – One stranded traveler is getting a lot of attention on the Texas coast. A manatee found its way into the Corpus Christi shipping channel. Manatees are mammals that usually live in the warm waters off central and southern Florida, and coastal Texas is too cold for them in winter. Marine biologists believe the manatee may be dehydrated, and moved it to the Texas Aquarium before it could succumb to the weather. Manatees are an endangered species so U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services must approve every step of the rescue. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/10/07 – 2006 was a record year for manatee deaths. At the same time Florida wildlife experts say the state's manatee population is stable or growing everywhere in the state except the southwest. Last year saw a record 416 manatee deaths the news of which comes the day before comments were due on a plan to change the manatee's status from endangered to threatened. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/13/07 – This is the time of year when manatees are migrating close to the shore. To protect them more than 40 law enforcement agencies are taking part in Operation Mermaid. With the 3 day MLK weekend, law enforcement expects more boaters than usual to be out cruising and posing a threat to those migrating manatees. Boaters can wear polarized sunglasses to improve their vision, stay within marked channels, obey the posted speed zones and use a paddle or trolling motor to move you boat if you are near manatees – all of which will help keep manatees alive. (1-2 minutes in length - 7:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 2/7/07 – The latest count shows more than 2,800 manatees in Florida. A team of 16 observers surveyed the state manatee population by air and ground between January 30<sup>th</sup> and February 1<sup>st</sup>. A biologist with the Florida Wildlife Commission says the manatee population appears to have shifted to the north. In 1991 more than 1,200 sea cows were counted statewide. The count is mandated under state law and simply offers a minimum number. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –2/6/07 – A bull shark turned into a bully off the coast of Southwest Florida. Captain Roger Schmall said the school of sharks had been slamming into the hull of his shrimp boat for four days. A 14 foot shark broke the boat's tail shaft, and left the boat and his crew of two adrift about a hundred miles off the coast of Fort Myers Beach. When the boat started to sink the captain radioed for help. The crew was excited to see the rescuers and agreed they will be taking some time off before returning to the sea. The crew was unsure about what was driving the sharks to attack the boats so vigorously. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 2/8/07 – Shark Season is moving in. Double red flags will be out this morning along Palm Beach after hundreds of sharks were spotted off the beach yesterday. The sharks were mostly small bull sharks and lemon sharks. Just last week spinner sharks were spotted off Singer Island. It is not uncommon for sharks to come close to shore to feed on smaller fish. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 3/19/07 – It was an ugly scene along Fort Meyers beach, when vacationers and spring breakers tried to avoid dozen of dead sea animals. Experts are trying to figure out what's causing dead sharks and sting rays to wash up on the sand. The reports say there's as many as 15 to 20 at a time washing up. So far they haven't pin-pointed what's killing the animals. The dead animals pose no threat to humans. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/9/07 – Wildlife officials arrested six people yesterday on suspicion of poaching turtles. Police said they found the men with more than 1,600 living turtles. Authorities released the turtles back into their natural habitat. Police arrested six poaching suspects, two others managed to get away. Turtles are a protected species making it illegal for people to touch turtles or their eggs. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/31/07 – Guests at the Breakers Hotel got quite a surprise this morning when baby sea turtles hatched from a nest on the beach. Sixty hawksbill sea turtles swarmed the beach, making their way into the ocean. About a dozen died on the way, five others kept washing ashore and were taken to Juno Beach's Marine Life Center. They will be cared for and soon released back into the ocean. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 2/14/07 – Larry Wood heads up a unique research project based out of Juno Beach's Marine Life Center. It's called the Sea Turtle Grants program and since mid 2004 he and fellow associates have taken a closer look at the Hawksbill which to date hasn't ever been done in such a systematic way. The project focuses on learning about the species specifically in Florida waters since according to Wood; the Hawksbill generally does not nest in the Sunshine State. (2-3 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 3/3/07 – This is the first weekend of the sea turtle nesting season. Each year, hundreds of reptiles somehow find their way back to our shores to lay their eggs. And now scientists think they have a pretty good idea what's behind the turtles' incredible sense of direction. Researchers believe the turtles may have an internal compass that works with the Earth's magnetic field and allows them to navigate their way across hundreds of miles back to the same beach where they were born in order to lay their own eggs. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 1/15/07 – A Lake Worth man says he's being targeted with what he calls crime acts. He just moved to the Lakes at Sherbrook neighborhood community. He awoke one morning to find his cousin's Ford Explorer damaged with slashed tires, broken back window and eggs thrown on the vehicle and the house. The man says he's being targeted because of his race. He was surprised since he has lived in the area for 13 years but has only recently moved to the development over the last few weeks. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 1/22/07 – The Palm Beach County Sheriff's office has beefed up its presence at the South Florida Fair this year. With a record number of attendees expected because of great weather, the Sheriff's department doesn't want to risk the idea that weapons will be brought in to the site. Security is strong at the gates and the also patrolling the property. Fairgoers are cautioned to keep a close eye on your children and your belongings and don't bring more money than you planned on spending to the event. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 2/6/07 – St. Lucie County Sheriff's deputies are looking for two men who have robbed a Publix supermarket, a Texaco station, carjacked a man and stole his wallet and cell phone - armed with handguns and rifles. Prior to carjacking a new car, the thieves were using an older car that had been carjacked last month from an elderly Boynton Beach couple. The Sheriff's department is concerned that the violent tendencies of these two criminals makes them very dangerous and a real threat to everyone. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 3/10/07- A woman who was attacked at the Wellington Green Mall says crime is creeping into her once safe community. The woman was pushed to the ground in the mall parking lot before thieves snatched her purse. She claims more security is needed at the mall, but a mall spokesperson says this is an isolated incident and that the mall is safe. Two men were arrested and charges with battery and robbery in this case. The western communities of Wellington and Royal Palm Beach have been considered fairly safe and crime free areas. But as the population grows, so does the potential for crime. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 3/27/07 – Seniors now have a new tool to help them take on crime. The Palm Beach County Sheriff and the State Attorney General helped open the new Seniors Versus Crime storefront in West Palm Beach. The Senior Sleuths program provides information and resources to help keep seniors from being taken in consumer scams. The new office is located at Pine Trail Plaza and there are more than 3,000 volunteers statewide working with such programs. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 3/28/07 – The Palm Beach County Sheriff's office will address a growing problem in the Hispanic community. Deputies are concerned over the growing number of laborers being robbed who are not reporting the crime to local police. They held a news conference at a large Hispanic supermarket to introduce a Hispanic version of the Senior Sleuths program so that the Hispanic community may also learn how to protect itself against crime. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/17/07 – Four Hispanic students at Forest Hill High School have been awarded scholarships from the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. One of the recipients, Vanezza Valencia moved to the United States from Columbia when she was 11 years-old. She had to learn English and how to adapt to American culture. She has excelled at school with a 3.0 GPA and as a Junior ROTC battalion Operations Officer. She hopes other Hispanic students will be inspired by what she has overcome and make their own success stories. Valencia will be attending Norwich University in the fall. (1-2 minutes in length - 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/21/07 – A Palm Beach County organization is recognizing Hispanic teachers for their efforts in the classroom. The Hispanic Human Resources Council is now accepting nominations for the Palm Beach County Hispanic Teacher of the Year competition. Candidates must be of Hispanic decent and have at least three years of experience teaching Pre-K through 12<sup>th</sup> grade in Palm Beach County schools. The Resources Council is doing this to give positive reinforcement to Hispanic achievement and encourage education. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 3/13/07 – African American children may be more susceptible to toxins associated with second-hand smoke than white children. Researchers followed 220 children with asthma who were exposed to at least five cigarettes a day at home. They found that while African American children spent less time around environmental tobacco smoke than white children, their toxin levels were 32% higher. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/27/07 – Residents in Belle Glade are voicing concern over leadership in their local government. Small business owners and residents protested the job performance of local leaders in front of City Hall. The group says the current commission is divided, open communication is non-existent and there is a lack of respect for citizens. The Belle Glade City Manager and the Mayor did not comment on the protest but the racial tensions that exist in the city will continue if the issues are not addressed. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 1/4/07 – The state audit of the City of Riviera Beach is scathing. Riviera Beach is predominantly African American, and has mostly African American representation. The audit revealed that the city has misspent, mismanaged and misappropriated millions of tax payer dollars. Thousands and thousands of dollars of personal expenses have been charged to city issued credit cards. The city also went half a million dollars over budget on two jazz festivals. This calls into question the caliber of city council members, the mayor and other city officials. Riviera Beach is plagued with Black on Black crime and gang violence and has yet to build a strong infrastructure to fight it. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 3/14/07 – A local African American Bishop has won election in Riviera Beach as the local mayor. The prominent Bishop Thomas Masters has spent years being vocal and in the forefront of trying to address gang violence and Black on Black crime. While the incumbent mayor denied that he lost the election and wanted to recount the absentee ballots, Rev. Masters appears to be a clear winner. Now he has his work cut out for him to handle the city budgeting and paperwork that comes with mayoral responsibilities. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 2/8/07 - The installment of the Dr. Phil show focused on a man who has an overwhelming compulsion to expose himself to women. The man has been convicted of felonies and has served a total of 15 years behind bars. He is now out and sharing his story, which has caused him to sever ties with friends and family, with the woman he loves and intends to marry. Dr. Phil has some words of caution for the fiancé. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 2/16/07 – This Dr. Phil show looked at the isolation caused by extreme weight gain. People who are literally eating themselves to upwards of 500 pounds where venturing anywhere beyond a room or two in a home is beyond comprehension. Dr. Phil looked at this phenomenon and reunited family members who have not seen their loved ones (who have been isolating themselves due to weight gain) in years. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/23/07 – This Dr. Phil show tackles the subject of homework and parents' pressure on their children to push for early advancement. Children are frustrated with the amount of homework they are being asked to do and parents are frustrated at their children's lack of enthusiasm for doing hours of homework. Parents are feeling that their children will not have all the advantages of a great education if they don't work hard to advance in the early years of school. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/2/07 – The Oprah show went inside a daring experiment as 64 high school teenagers are transformed through confrontation, heartache, confession and even forgiveness. This amazing experiment is designed to breakdown stereotypes and barriers that young people hold against each other and foster better understanding and tolerance. Oprah wants as many parents to see this and to be as involved in their children's schools and encourage them to hold such programs at their schools. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/15/07 – This Oprah show featured fitness coach Bob Green and his new book "The Best Life Diet" This book is designed to make dieting sensible with the ability to stay with the program and continue to make smart eating choices that lead to a healthier life and a more fit body. The book designed an on-going lifestyle program for the reader that should be able to keep the reader at a sensible goal weight. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM /NEED 2 – 2/13/07 – Dr. Mehmet Oz was the guest on this Oprah show and he answered the audience's question about good health, acupuncture and how it works, how often should teeth bleaching and Botox be done without harm, and what kind of dieting and exercise have the best results. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)
