Reports and interviews usually two to three minutes in length, which expand upon current problems and issues facing the community.

PROBLEM/NEED – 12/5/08 – With the Big Three Automakers asking for help from Congress to stay afloat in this bad economy, the threat of layoffs is trickling down all over the country with local dealers laying off local salespeople and repair people, as well as closing locations. Seventy six thousand Floridians work at new car dealerships. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/5/08 – Local military recruiters say the downturn in the economy is good for their business. Local recruiting numbers are up and Military officials say it is because young people are weighing their options in a bad economy and with fewer jobs available, the military is now a better option. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/6/08 – The latest statistics from the Mortgage Bankers reveals that one in ten mortgage owners fell behind in mortgage payments or were in foreclosure in the third quarter. This as the U.S. economy shed 1.91 million jobs in the first 11 months of 2008. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 –12/7/08 – In the wake of more people finding themselves unemployed, the local 211 call center has been working overtime to handle calls and direct people to resources. Many callers have never been in this situation and are not aware of what to do first. They need to apply for unemployment assistance because without that they will not qualify for any other kind of assistance like, mortgage assistance, utility bill assistance and emergency food and shelter assistance. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/8/08 – President-elect Barack Obama, weeks before his inauguration has announced that his first priority will be to create an economic stimulus package in particular to help the U.S. Automotive industry. President-elect Obama said he will be working with the best economic minds in the country to create a recovery plan that will turn the flailing economy around. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/8/08 – The change in the economy has created a new interest in coupons and saving money through the use of coupons. The latest incarnation is coupons on-line. Luck Brand jeans is now offering discount coupons through their website and many other retail outlets are following suite. Anything that drives store traffic and helps encourage sales is seen as a positive and worth trying. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/9/08 – There are jobs to be had in the bad economy and the increasing unemployment. The U.S. Census Bureau will be hiring at least 3,000 workers to help with the 2010 Census. Even the City of West Palm Beach has over \$127 million dollars earmarked for construction and capital projects and instead of breaking ground later they will start the project sooner to start stimulating the economy and get people working. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/12/08 – A monthly pass on the Tri-Rail commuter train system was costing the comparable amount to a tank of gas and now the price is pushing towards two tanks of gas. But Tri-Rail riders are still saving money rather than driving and more riders are paying for monthly passes every month. (1-2 minutes in length -5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/13/08 – The 50 billion dollar Ponzi scheme fraud committed by investment broker Bernie Madoff is having large repercussions all through the local community. So many of the very wealthy residents of our community were investors with Madoff, and so many local foundations had vast percentages of their endowments invested in the fund. Now many local charities are panicking or even threatening to shut their doors because of a total lack of funds. So many local charities are recipients and are dependent upon foundation donations. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/28/08 – Shoppers waited in lines overnight to take advantage of the Black Friday specials. In this year's economy, many people are trying to get the most for their money and to make sure that they get to the stores while the discount items are still available. Many people have plans of buying higher priced electronics as the price for these items is dropping dramatically in a bad economy. (1-2 minutes in length – 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/24/08 – The holiday rush is on, as millions of Americans are heading out of town this week for Thanksgiving. In this report, the number of people traveling is down about 1.5% from a year ago, as families struggle through a very rough economy and holiday season. Last year the number of travelers was affected by the cost of airline tickets and increasing gas prices, so it has been two difficult years for the airlines and for travelers. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/24/08 – Today the City of West Palm Beach will announce a new campaign to help the local economy. The new measure is designed to get shoppers to support local merchants, in order to try to save jobs around the area. The City will distribute more than 2,000 stickers for residents to wear in support of the campaign. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/20/08 – The economic slowdown is steering people away from restaurants and into the kitchen. Take a stroll down any grocery aisle and you'll find that stores are catering to the cost-conscious customers. A recent survey showed 50 percent of Americans are eating at restaurants less, and stocking up on groceries to cook at home. Many customers who are looking for bargains are choosing the store brands over name brands. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 10/1/08 – Two out of every five Florida adults can't name the three branches of government and more than half can't name one of their U.S. Senators. The state cabinet approved an initiative this week to improve civics education. The Florida League of Cities is heading the charge. The League will help bring online public resources to the classroom and create civics clubs in schools. The initiative doesn't just focus on teaching students. Citizens Academies will also be set up statewide to help educate adults about city government. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 10/13/08 – Open enrollment for parents to lock in college tuition rates for their children begins one week from today. The Florida Pre-Paid College Plans help families save thousands of dollars on higher education. All money paid into the plan is backed by the state and can be taken out at any time. Enrollment runs through January. Viewers were directed to the state's website to enroll their children. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 10/14/08 – For a lot of people it's not just about saving money it's about earning it. Many people are out of work, and others are in fear of being downsized by their companies. But in these tough economic times, some careers are proving more stable than others. If you search "recession-proof jobs" online, a number of careers come up. Some that are most popular are health care, security and law enforcement, international business and education. Those teaching jobs, once known for being low on the salary scale, are now some of the most secure jobs to have during an economic slump. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 11/3/08 – Nearly one quarter of high school freshman, sophomores and juniors have driven without a license. That's according to researchers at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Their data also found unlicensed teenage drivers were less likely to wear seatbelts, and more likely to drive after drinking alcohol and be involved in fatal car crashes. Nearly thirty percent had taken drivers education classes, and half said their parents helped them learn to drive. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 11/9/08 – State education leaders have raised the price of the GED test fifty to seventy dollars. Department of Education officials say the \$20 dollar increase is needed to cover the costs of administering the "General Education Development Test". It's the first such increase in a decade. The military, community colleges and many minimum wage jobs require a passing grade on the test. (1-2 minutes - 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2– 11/14/08 –High school students will have one less chance to take the 10th grade F-Cat. The Department of Education is eliminating the summer re-takes of the test to save money. Students must pass the reading and math sections to graduate high school. This change comes about because of the economy and the cutbacks the state and local education boards are facing. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 11/18/08 – More and more students on the Treasure Coast are graduating from high school. State education administrators say Treasure Coast high schools awarded three hundred more diplomas during the last school year compared to the 2006-2007 school year. Those schools also had 125 fewer students drop out. According to the local paper, local educators say they have been working hard to keep children in school and it's paying off. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/3/08 – Florida, along with forty eight other states in the country received a failing grade for higher education affordability. Only California received a passing grade. The affordability grade is based on how much of the average family's income it costs to go to college. Nationally, families in the top fifth of income pay just nine percent of their earnings, while those in the bottom fifth pay fifty five percent. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/10/08 – Some school superintendents across the state say the Department of Education has asked them to prepare for across-the-board cuts of twelve percent or higher. Florida's education commissioner denier exact percentages but says school districts need to tighten their belts. Governor Crist says cuts to education could be in the billions. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/14/08 – The Florida Department of Education is working on overhauling the system used to grade school performance. Starting with the 2009-2010 school year, the F-CAT will only account for about half of a high school's performance grade. The other half will be based on a variety of other factors, like graduation rates, college placement tests and final exams. Elementary and middle schools will still be graded entirely on the F-CAT. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/9/08 – There's a new report that finds the number of minorities in college has dramatically increased in recent years. But the results also say it has not been fast enough to keep up with demographic changes. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/12/08 – A shooting occurred in West Palm Beach early in the morning. A Hispanic male was shot in an attempted robbery, and he was taken to St. Mary's Medical Center. Police are still searching for two suspects armed with a handgun. Hispanic residents are very vulnerable to crime as many of them do not put their money in banks and carry it on their person. Since many are undocumented workers they are hesitant to report crimes for fear of being returned to their country. (1-2 minutes in length - 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/19/08 – It's called the largest celebration of all things Hispanic in our area and today more than five thousand people packed Hispanic Fest in Lake Worth. Salsa Singer Charlie Cruz was the headliner at the third annual event in Bryant Park. Fans also watched Bachata singers "Monchy and Alexander" perform their last concert as a duo. With great acts, food and crowds, organizers said this was the most successful Hispanic Fest yet. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/20/08 – Hillary Rodham Clinton hosted a rally in West Palm Beach before heading to Orlando for a joint rally with Barack Obama. Today was the first time they have appeared together since she endorsed him back in June. Experts say Florida and specifically Orlando is important to Obama's campaign because the I-4 corridor is home to one third of all statewide voters, many of them are independents and undecided. Central Florida is also home to a fast-growing Puerto Rican and Hispanic population and political commentators say Obama needs those votes to win the election. Clinton told voters there's still a lot of work to do before the election. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/24/08 – A local representative says "No Harm Done" as election officials in one community try to help educate Spanish speaking voters. The Village of North Palm Beach printed voting information in English and in Spanish, but when the English information was placed into the computer for the Spanish translation it was a bit too literal. For Instance Representative Carl Domino was changed to "Domino de Carl." A representative from the Village apologized for the printing and has corrected the website. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/1/08 – While we're eating our way through Halloween candy from yesterday, Mexicans are waking up to "The Day of the Dead." The annual festival celebrates and honors deceased friends and relatives; it's a tradition that dates back to the country's pre-Hispanic roots. This weekend in areas of our community where there are high concentrations of Mexicans, families will spend time placing items on the tombs of loved ones. The first day of November is meant to honor children who have died and the second of November is dedicated to honoring adults. (1-2 minutes in length - 7:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/7/08 – At a restaurant in Palm Beach call "264 The Grill", employees claim their boss and restaurant co-owner, Patricia Gatti went too far. On Election night, workers say Gatti posted messages of hate reading "KKK" and "White Power" on their time cards. And before Election Day, Gatti had threatened workers – many of them minorities, that if they didn't vote for John McCain it could cost them their jobs. Avery Watson is Gatti's business partner and the restaurant's head chef. He says his workers are back on the job and that some even feel guilty for bringing photos of Gatti's memos to the attention of Palm Beach Police. Watson is African American. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/18/08 – Home Depot just launched a website in Spanish that's identical to its English language version. The site offers 40,000 products to online customers. America's Hispanic population is now our largest minority, but relatively few large retailers offer Spanish options online. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 12/3/08 – Barack Obama announced today that he had chosen the Governor of New Mexico, Bill Richardson as his Secretary of State. Richardson is the first Hispanic that Obama has named to his rapidly-forming cabinet, which also includes two women. Richardson was among the challengers to Obama for the Democratic Party Presidential nomination earlier this year. He has been Secretary of Energy and U.N. Ambassador in the Clinton Administration. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 12/17/08 – A State panel will meet today to discuss potential nominees to Florida's Supreme Court. The Governor wants more diversity. Governor Crist recently eliminated the only Hispanic finalist by appointing him to an appellate court instead. Right now, the seven-member high court has no Hispanic justices. The commission can send the Governor up to six names. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 12/18/08 – President elect Barack Obama nominated California Representative Hilda Solis as Labor Secretary. The Democratic Congresswoman was just elected to her fifth term representing heavily Hispanic portions of Eastern Los Angeles County and East L.A. The 51 year old is the only congressional lawmaker of Central American descent. Solis has focused on Immigration and environmental issues while in the house. (1-2 minutes in length – 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 10/13/08 – Experts are warning people to watch out for out-of-pocket costs during this open enrollment season. Consulting firm Hewitt Associates says employees' charges are expected to jump 10.1 percent next year. At the same time premiums will rise 7.8 percent. Experts say employees need to pay attention to fees that may go up when they renew their healthcare plans during open enrollment. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –10/13 /08 – As more and more young people across the state try to find jobs that are “recession-proof”, one of the major fields that continues to grow is health care. Every year there is no shortage of sick people who are trying to get well, and between nursing and doctors and ancillary medial personnel, the area hospitals are always looking for trained help. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 11/2/08 – CVS the drug store giant has kicked off a ten dollar a year membership program that allows customers to buy 90 days of generic prescription drugs (more than 400 types) for just \$9.99 per medicine. Anyone can join but it's aimed at America's 45 million people with no health insurance. The prescription price war was started by Wal-Mart with CVS now beating Wal-Mart's price by a penny. Rare deals for customers at a time of skyrocketing health care costs. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –11/3 /08 –Beginning next year, most workers will see “skimpier and less comprehensive” employer-based health insurance coverage. The Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation's annual survey of employer health benefits shows that many working people will have higher out-of-pocket costs. Researchers say a large percentage of workers in smaller companies are being enrolled in high deductible plans. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 11/12/08 – The economy isn't only hitting our wallets, it could be impacting our health. Doctors are reporting more cancellations and new requests for generic medication. They're also seeing more patients skipping visits because of cost. Here in South Florida, where plastic surgery has been somewhat immune to the drop-off, cosmetic surgeons say business is down, in some cases by 30% from last year. And experts say business is booming in clinics where patients can get free or low cost health care. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 11/21/08 - Seventeen agencies in our area will be helping the less fortunate this morning. “Project Connect” will assist the homeless with food, medical care, hair cuts and identification cards. It begins in the morning at the West Palm Beach Health Center on 45th Street. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/7/08 – Debbie Allison-Cook and Susan Bonham started a horse rescue two years ago. Their animals come from across the state and from very different backgrounds. They care for retired racehorses, victims of abuse, and in more and more cases – owners who simply cannot afford to care for them anymore. The group has already found home for more than 100 horses, but they are getting new calls everyday. The horses are products of their environment and were bred to be dependent on people for their food and medical care. Now that the economy has taken a turn downwards many owners cannot afford the feed or the boarding costs of horses. The group is seeking donations. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/9/08 – Some senior retirement communities are going green. Developers that are designing new communities are using solar panels, solar heat and wind power to supplement the communities' energy use, and mirroring the retirees' feelings about the environment. A new poll shows 81 percent of retirees are concerned about the world they will leave for their grandchildren, 94% have taken steps to go green, and 79 percent want to reduce their carbon footprint. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/29/08 – Two big milestones for the Tri-rail passenger trains system today. Tri-rail trains are expected to carry the 50 millionth passenger while running on bio-diesel fuel for the first time. The trains started using the vegetable oil mix today. The fuel mix will cost slightly less per gallon than conventional diesel fuel. But the real savings will go to the environment. Bio-diesel burns cleaner in the engines, is non-toxic and safer to store and is less likely to start a fire in the event of an accident. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/30/08 – Plans to expand the Port of Palm Beach and create thousands of new jobs will be on the agenda for Port Commissioners tonight. The Port is expected to present its plan to widen and deepen the Palm Beach inlet. Commissioners also want to create an island distribution center in suburban Palm Beach County. Opponents say bringing more and larger vessels will have a negative impact on the environment and recreational boating in the area. The public meeting will be held in the evening for the general public to attend. (1-2 minute in length – 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 11/19/08 – The slow economy has some boat owners jumping ship on their watercraft. Marina and harbor owners have seen an increase in abandoned pleasure and working boats. Wooden and fiberglass boats have little or no scrap value, so owners ditch them instead of paying to haul them to the dump. But the old boats present a hazard to the environment. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/1/08 – A number of new laws go into effect today including one that gives stiffer penalties for thieves who steal metal parts. From now on it'll be tougher for thieves to sell stolen metal and for businesses to buy it. Just yesterday five people were arrested for stealing copper from Riviera Beach. The men are facing a list of charges. Investigators say they were posing as utility workers, when they were really stealing copper wiring from AT&T. The crime happened last week, but police busted the ring yesterday and now they are facing stronger charges. Law enforcement will also create a database to track who is selling metals, and there will be more requirements for businesses to verify who they're buying from. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/1/08 – The Broward County Sheriff's office has put a serial rapist behind bars. Authorities say 38 year old Stephen Lamont Feagin has been raping people for over a span of 15 years. Feagin is a former star running back for the University of Illinois. Authorities say one of the attacks happened in Pompano Beach, They say Feagin's DNA matched DNA found at the South Florida crime scene. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/1/08 – Two parents who lost their son from a shooting in Belle Glade are adamant that their son was not shot because of a rivalry between two schools. Their son played for Pahokee High School and was wearing those colors when he attended a dance in Belle Glade their football rival. No arrests have been made and authorities say eight murders have happened this year and the Sheriff's office has only arrested two suspects. Many residents are outraged, saying crime has skyrocketed since the Sheriff's office took over law enforcement for the City. But the Sheriff's office says there's a lack of cooperation from the residents. No witnesses have come forward. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/2/08 – New security measures at the Town Center Mall in Boca Raton kick in today as the Mall and city police introduce two important new additions to help protect shoppers. The Boca Raton Police Department will open its new Town Center Sub station and the Mall will unveil its new 900 camera television security system. These are just some of the added security measures taken since the murders of Nancy and Joey Bochicchio and Randi Gorenberg. All three were last seen on security cameras leaving the mall. Although there is no evidence that they were murdered at the mall, as the holiday shopping season approaches the Town Center Mall wants to ensure that patrons feel safe and secure and nothing keeps them away from shopping. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/4/08 – Boca Raton Police are looking for a bank robber who was seen on a surveillance camera entering a Washington Mutual Bank and handing the teller a handwritten note. The demand was for twenties and fifty and no dye pack. The teller complied and the suspect took off. This type of crime is becoming more and more prevalent in a bad economy. Even more commonplace is the stealing of ATM machines in the middle of the night, with large, stolen construction equipment such as fork lifts and back hoes. (1-2 minutes in length – 7:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 12/1/08 – Violence over the Thanksgiving holiday has law enforcement in two counties on alert. On Wednesday, four gunmen barged into this Delray Dunkin Donuts, robbed the register and forced customers to the floor. One suspect fired a shotgun, hitting three. Just over an hour later, a 7-eleven off of Sample Road was also robbed, and then on Thanksgiving night, a Dunkin Donuts in Tamarac. One customer was shot there as well. Investigators from Palm Beach and Broward Counties are trying to determine if all three robberies are connected. Dunkin Donuts and 7-eleven stores in both counties are closing early, but police are warning all businesses who conduct late hours to be concerned and alert for their safety and their patrons'. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 12/4/08 – The 2007 crime statistics are out and Port St. Lucie has been ranked the third safest city in Florida. Only Coral Springs and Pembroke Pines had a lower crime ranking. Nationally, Port St. Lucie ranked in the top 20 percent of cities with the lowest crime rates. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 12/29/08 - The installment of the Dr. Phil program featured children from a family begging Dr. Phil to help get their mother help for her drug addiction. What started as a prescription for postpartum depression has become a 30 to 50 pills a day habit. The children have been left home alone while their mother drives around trying to get her next fix. And she said she had an affair three weeks ago while high on Oxycontin. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 12/19/08 – This Dr. Phil show interviewed military men and women who served their country and were wounded in battle. They are now fighting a second war of medical bureaucracy that doesn't hear them. Especially those that are suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. Directors of Veterans Affairs and congressmen were part of the program to help get answers and action for these vets and their families. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 12/8/08 – On this Dr. Phil show a couple who is drowning in debt and on the verge of divorce over it ask Dr. Phil and financial experts how to turn this around before it's too late. After ten years of marriage they racked up over \$600,000 in bills. The program gave tips on how to avoid bankruptcy and how to get yourself and your family out of debt. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/5/08 – Dr. Phil looked at incidences where school discipline was simply out of control. Cases where teachers were violent and extreme in their reactions and where the punishment far exceeded the infraction. What are parents to do when they believe their children are in a loving and nurturing environment and instead the children are being bullied by their teachers? Phil had some suggestion for recourse. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 & 4 – 11/18/08 – This Dr. Phil program was all about children who cannot stop eating and are facing extreme obesity and early death and health issues. Ten year olds who weigh 190 pounds and who demand food from their parents and refuse to be put on diets are throwing temper tantrums to get food. Fitness and diet experts weigh in on how to turn the family eating around and get small children's weigh back to normal. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM /NEED 6 – 10/28/08 – This installment of Dr. Phil was about cyber bullying and how common it may be among teens. Dr. Phil's son Jay recently interviewed a number of young teens to see exactly what kind of pressure and cruelty is brought on when the internet and "My Space" pages are used to torment young people. A police officer who specializes in Internet child safety was interviewed. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 & 6 – 10/14/08 – This Dr. Phil program was called campus crisis and looked at all the thing young college students should know before they head off to college campuses on their own. From sexual assaults, to drinking deaths to hazing - life on campus has gotten more dangerous than ever. Parents need to have a serious discussion with their children about safety tips and who to avoid on campus. Parents should also know the warning signs that your young son or daughter is caught up in a crisis and may not want to tell you, for fear of being brought out of school or punished. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)
