Reports and interviews usually two to three minutes in length, which expand upon current problems and issues facing the community.

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/2/08 – A proposal to require most schools to teach kids a little more about sex, while still pushing abstinence narrowly made it through a state senate committee. The bill would require schools that get state money to teach comprehensive sex education beginning in the 6th grade. It is being pushed by Planned Parenthood and is part of a national movement toward what’s known as “Abstinence-Plus” education. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/3/08 – A new census report confirms Florida’s reputation as a state that’s cheap on education funding. Out of fifty states and the District of Columbia, Florida ranked second to last in spending compared to relative wealth. For every thousand dollars of residents’ personal income, Florida spends just over \$33 dollars compared with the U.S. average of \$43 dollars. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/1/08 – The Charter School of Boynton Beach is looking to move back home. School authorities will try and urge Boynton Beach City Commissioners to allow them to move into an office building at the Quantum Park Industrial Development. Parents and staff opted for an emergency relocation plan after the Christmas Eve shooting at the Boynton Beach Mall in 2006. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/1/08 – The Education Secretary announced plans to hold a summit in every state to help get students better prepared to attend college and perform in the work force. A new report by the nonprofit “America’s Promise Alliance” finds only about half the students in some urban areas actually get a diploma. Former Secretary of State Colin Powell is the founding chairman of the alliance. He calls it a catastrophe when more than one million students a year drop out of high school. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/3/08 – It is another tight year financially for the Palm Beach County School District. The District will have to cut between \$25 and \$30 million from the budget next year under proposals released by the Florida House and Senate. If passed, the budget would mark the first time in a decade the district is getting less money from the state than the year before. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/6/08 – School leaders in Jupiter will be holding an important meeting this morning with parents who are angry that a potentially dangerous adult talked his way onto a school bus carrying their kids to the Jupiter Middle School. And it's not the first time that a suspect tried to get on board. The suspect looks young for his age and told the driver he was a student looking to register, so she let him on board. He talked to all the kids on board, showing them a paper ball and telling them it was an acid bomb he made, and that he had a switchblade. The driver then called school administrators who removed the man when he arrived at school. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/7/08 – Just last week a local charter school held a ribbon cutting ceremony on its new computer lab with eight new Macs donated by good Samaritans. But the computer lab is now empty. \$20 thousand dollars of equipment and software was stolen last evening. The Palm Beach County School District runs the building's security system and it was activated before the burglary. The loss of the computers is a huge setback. More than 90% of the school's 165 students are poor, new to the U.S. with little of no skills and no access to a computer at home. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/8/08 – A new elementary school is coming to Palm Beach County, and some aren't happy about the new addition. The new school will be located in a fourteen acre section of "Marginal Road." The School District says its primary purpose would be to ease crowding at other schools. However, residents say it's a bad location with traffic and it's not a financially responsible decision at a time of District budget restraints. The school is set to open in August of next year. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/9/08 – The Palm Beach County School District is asking for help from the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office as it faces a budget crunch. The School District has asked the Sheriff's Office to take over the School Police Department. The Sheriff said he could not commit to the idea until his agency looks at the Department's budget and other data. The School Police Department has about 170 officers. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/10/08 – One charter school in Delray Beach is getting ready to move this summer for the sixth time in seven years. The lease for the Toussaint L'Ouverture High School for Arts and Social Justice will run out in June. The school had just moved to the site of the old Atlantic High School in January of this year. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/14/08 – This week in Tallahassee, House and Senate lawmakers will get to work on trying to reach a compromise on the new state budget that will have a big impact on schools across the state. School programs could lose as much as \$298 million dollars once the legislators are finished. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/15/08 – The St. Lucie County School District has moved a step closer to building a new K-8 school. It would be located near Southbend Boulevard, over objections of some neighboring residents. The City Council voted yesterday to change the zoning of the site, allowing the District to eventually build the school in time for the 2010-2011 school year. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/16/08 – A house panel has approved a bill that would require school districts to give charter schools an “equitable amount” of local tax dollars. The money would go to building new schools and other construction projects. Although charter schools are considered public, they can be operated by private organizations or companies. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/29/08 – A new study out says you're paying more and more for health insurance. The study from 2001 through 2005 finds that adults who get health insurance through their jobs have seen their premiums increase ten times faster than their income. Fewer Americans actually have private health insurance coverage as well. The number fell six percent during the study period. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/26/08 – An event today in Riviera Beach is bringing medically under-served families vital health care. It's the eight annual health fair hosted by the T. Leroy Jefferson Medical Society. It's a free, one day event for families in Riviera Beach. The fair will provide free childhood immunizations and physical exams. There will also be free screenings to check eyes, cholesterol, blood pressure, diabetes, HIV and Hepatitis C. The health fair is being held at a local elementary school and goes until 2:00PM. (1-2 minutes in length -10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 5/12/08 – Smoke from muck-fires burning on the west side of Lake Okeechobee has been filtering into our area all day, riding on a strong wind from the West. Viewers can see it and smell it -irritating smoke from fires that are burning a good 80 miles away from here. Viewers, who live in the western communities, were advised to remain indoors and avoid spending too much time breathing in the smoke. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 5/28/08 – If you're not happy with your child's health care, consider moving, not to another doctor but to another state. Today the Commonwealth Fund reports some states are doing much better than others caring for kids and Florida ranks near the bottom. The report measures access, quality, costs and whether poor and minority kids get the care they need. Oklahoma and Florida ranked last with Texas not far behind. States can improve by making children's health a priority. This report claims if every state met its own goals 4 ½ million more kids would have health insurance. Another 12 million would see a doctor at least once a year, and 1 ½ million fewer kids would be at risk for developmental problems. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 & 1 – 6/2/08 – A brand new report is giving South Florida failing grades in tackling some very important issues, including health care, transportation and funding for education. The new report called Preserving Paradise: South Florida's Call to Action shows that South Florida is doing poorly. The findings come from Florida Atlantic University's Center for Urban Environmental Solutions. The 62 page report found that we haven't made enough progress in areas like AIDS prevention and treatment, transportation and poverty. (1-2 minutes - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2– 6/10/08 –A new study looks at the number of Americans who are under-insured when it comes to health insurance. The number is going up. Americans who are under-insured rose by 60% from 2003 to 2007 which means from 16 million people to more than 25 million people. Experts say many people are buying less health protection because of rising premiums and deductibles. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 6/16/08 – The Federal Reserve Chairman says improving health care is a critical challenge. Ben Bernanke made the remark while speaking to a summit on health care reform organized by a Senate panel. Bernanke says the challenges fall into three major categories: improving access to millions who lack health insurance, bolstering the quality of care, and controlling the rapidly rising costs. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 6/22/08 – Five Florida doctors and a health clinic owner face fraud charges this morning. Florida's Attorney General says the doctors at the clinic cheated Medicare and Medicaid out of more than \$15 million dollars. A spokesman for the Attorney General says the doctors were charging the program for HIV drugs, pocketing the money and injecting patients with vitamins. Some of the patients even got money from the doctor to play along. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/14/08 – A nationwide survey finds hospital patients rated their stays good overall. In South Florida, Good Samaritan Medical Center rated tops in seven categories. And 79% of patients who were asked said they would definitely recommend Jupiter Medical Center. Twenty three of the twenty nine hospitals in Broward and Palm Beach counties participated in the voluntary survey. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 5/20/08 – New hospitals opening up in Florida will now have more protection against legal challenges. The Governor has signed a bill to streamline the certificate of need process. Since the 1970's companies wanting to open a hospital in the state have had to meet certain criteria to obtain that certificate. The new law will penalize companies challenging a new hospital from trying to set up shop on the state. The Florida Hospital Association says the law could allow more health care options. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/5/08 – The rate of serious crime in Florida edged up slightly last year fro the first time in decades. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement released its annual crime statistics for 2007 yesterday. In Palm Beach County the overall crime rate climbed two percent. The crime rate in Broward County climbed five percent with record numbers of homicides in both counties. (1-2 minutes in length - 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/22/08 – An upbeat report about two local youth centers will be released today. The evaluation of the West Palm Beach Youth Empowerment Center and Palm Beach County's Youth Violence Prevention Project will be issued this afternoon at a Palm Beach County Commission workshop. Administrators say they expect the report to announce that both youth centers have helped to cut crime and have provided a turning point for at-risk teens. The report was written by Florida State University. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/20/08 – It would seem a downturn in the economy has turned into an upswing in crime tips. Several crime tip lines across the country are reporting double digit increases in the number of calls they receive. Many of the tipsters say they are reporting the crimes to collect the money to help pay bills. Tipsters receive from fifty to thousands of dollars if a suspect is arrested. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 6/9/08 – There's positive news to report on crime. The FBI says the 2007 crime rate declined, reversing a two year trend. The bureau says the number of violent crimes reported to police in 2007 fell 1.4 percent from the previous year. And property crime fell more than 2 percent. The biggest drops came in vehicle thefts and rape. Both were down substantially. Murders also showed a significant decline. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/16/08 – A family is marking the year anniversary of their loved one's unsolved murder. Authorities, friends and family gathered today hoping to bring new attention to the case of a man found shot to death in his car, outside his workplace in Belle Glade. The man was a possible robbery victim. Today everyone gathered at the location where he was killed. Authorities reiterated that they are looking for two male suspects who had their faces covered, and who left the scene in a dark box-style Chevy vehicle. This is one of 262 unsolved murders in Belle Glade since the 1960's. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/17/08 – A well-liked local businessman in his fifties was found murdered in his home this afternoon. In a neighborhood where there is very little crime and with a victim who appeared to have no enemies, police are stumped as to who committed the crime. The garage door was partially open and the front door unlocked. Many of his neighbors knew and liked him and were stunned that this could happen to a mild-mannered person. They are hoping it does not become part of a crime spree in their quiet community. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/29/08 – NBC's Dateline program is devoting an entire hour-long show in prime time to three very high profile murders from our community that remain unsolved. All three took place at the Town Center Mall and authorities have a description and what they believe is a victim who survived an abduction attempt by the same man. Two middle aged women (one with her young daughter) were abducted leaving the Mall and forced to either remove money from an ATM or give up valuables on their person. After which they were shot to death. These murders have had great impact on what is normally a very crime-free, wealthy community. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 6/3/08 – A woman was shot and killed in her mobile home in a western part of a quiet community and police scrambled quickly to find the killer. The 35 year-old woman was shot in front of her 7 year old son, when a man dressed all in black entered the home a little after 10PM. Police do not know what connection there may be to the woman and her killer, but neighbors were shaken and shocked. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 6/25/08 – Florida authorities are investigating a possible serial husband killer. All five of Betty Neumar's husbands have died. The 76 year-old was recently charged with one count of solicitation of murder in the death of her fourth husband. Now investigators are re-examining the death of her third husband. He was shot in their Florida home back in 1965. At the time, police said he died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/3/08 – Business is booming at Treasure Coast Recycling in Stuart. Every day tons of scrap metal come pouring in, but these recyclers want no part of the latest trend among scrap metal scavengers – selling aluminum guardrails like these stolen from roadsides. This week alone the Sheriff’s office received a report of three railings stolen from a palm city community under construction. Authorities worry that a stolen/missing guardrail will pose a dangerous and possibly deadly situation on the roads, and are working hard to catch people that are stealing them. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/22/08 – A local teenaged girl who stole money from a Girl Scout selling cookies outside a local grocery store and who then went on to “dine and dash” at a local Denny’s restaurant and was caught, went before a judge today to cut a plea deal. Stefanie Woods was to go to trial as an adult for her alleged “dine and dash”, last week she was charged with petty theft for the Girl Scout cookie money incident. She was tried as a juvenile but the story received national attention because of the teenager’s remorselessness. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 6/05/08 – There’s another side effect to the troubling housing market. Latino workers lost nearly 250,000 construction jobs over the past year. The Pew Hispanic Center says the unemployment rate among Latinos is rising faster than any other segment of the population. At the end of the first quarter of 2008, 6.5 percent of Latinos were out of work compared to 4.7 percent of all other workers in the U.S. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 6/26/08 – A license plate that touts Hispanics Discovered Florida may soon join the 109 specialty license plates drivers buy. The plate features the image of a Spanish Galleon, and celebrates the contributions of Hispanics. It would become a fundraising tool to support job and mentorship programs. The Hispanic tag proposal is being reviewed by Florida Highway officials. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 6/18/08 – Two groups of Cuban immigrants made it to the Florida shore. Both groups arrived at Key Biscayne earlier in the day and were picked up by U.S. Border Patrol. They’ll likely be able to stay because of the U.S. wet foot-dry foot policy regarding Cuban immigrants. Those who reach U.S. soil are generally allowed to stay. Those intercepted at sea are returned to Cuba. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 5/12/08 – A member of the Cuban National Judo Team, who was competing here in South Florida, is still missing. The athlete disappeared yesterday afternoon following the final day of the Pan American Judo Championships in Miami. She was a two-time world champion and 2004 Olympic Bronze medalist and may have defected. However the president of Team USA says she has not contacted Federal Authorities and her intentions are not known. The rest of the Cuban team has left South Florida. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/16/08 – Lawmakers are forging ahead with goals for a greener Florida. The State House and Senate have bills that follow Governor Crist’s mandate to make the state a leader in reducing carbon emissions. A host of measures are being considered from requiring all gas sold in the state to contain 10 percent ethanol to greener building standards. And former Soviet Leader Mikhail Gorbachev will be in South Florida giving as speech as the founder of Green Cross International, a foundation aimed at protecting the environment. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/18/08 – A new report shows the top polluting counties in the United States, and a Florida county is in the top 20. Number one on the list is Harris County in Texas which includes the Houston area, but Hillsborough County in Florida which includes the Tampa area is listed at 18th. The study was funded by NASA and the U.S. Department of Energy. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/19/08 – It’s one stop shopping for anyone looking to “Go Green.” You can find electric cars and all natural cleaning products to canvas bags and a low-polluting lawn mower at the first annual Green for Life Festival. In many cases making an organic choice not only helps the environment, it helps farmers in third world countries. Green for Life is a fun way to teach people how some simple lifestyle changes can improve the planet. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/21/08 – Consumers who have made a commitment to going green are one of the most sought after demographics among manufacturers. Going Green has retailers seeing green as they sell everything from organic foods to recycled paper products. They’re supplies to help get a “green” thumb. Retailers and even restaurants are appealing to consumers with their “saving the world one purchase at a time” approach. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/24/08 – Martin County School Board hosted an all day seminar to explore ways to become more energy efficient. The newly constructed J.D. Parker Elementary has portions of the building that were built with the intention of helping energy costs. Citing examples from Palm Beach County’s Pine Jog School the workshop focused on how school systems and builders can work together to lead the way in creating enviro-friendly designs. St. Lucie County has several schools under construction, each of them incorporating cost cutting, green elements. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 6/16/08- South Florida could soon be the home of the state’s first Earth friendly college campus. Palm Beach Community College administrators are planning to present their proposal for its newest campus in Wellington later this month. The school is looking to earn U.S. Green Building Certification for the project. Buildings would be designed to minimize sun intrusion, using low energy lighting and increase access for bicycle traffic and public transportation. (1 -2 minute in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 –6/24/08 – Many viewers were one of the nearly 39,000 Florida Power and Light customers who gave the company more than \$11 million dollars to develop green energy. According to a new report, most of the money went towards administrative and marketing costs. Less than a quarter of the funds went toward developing renewable energy. The findings were compiled by the staff of the Florida Public Service Commission. An FPL spokeswoman says the company is evaluating the report. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/14/08 – A White House Task Force that was supposed to devise a federal plan to research the issue of drugs in the country's drinking water has missed its deadline. A Senate subcommittee is preparing for a hearing tomorrow after an investigation by the Associated Press found trace concentrations of drugs in drinking water. The group was given a December deadline to produce a national research strategy. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 –6/12/08 – Prescription medications are a bigger killer in Florida than illegal drugs. That's according to a report from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. Based on autopsies, FDLE says deaths caused by prescriptions were three times as high as illegal drugs. Top killers include methadone, other tranquilizers and strong painkillers. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 5/20/08 – A 10th grade student from Lake Worth High School is dead, and authorities have a toxicology report that says drinking alcohol and mixing it with energy boosting soft drinks such as Red Bull caused her death. The teen attended an event at the High School then continued on to a party at a friend's house. She lost consciousness and never woke up. Attempts to revive her failed. She did not have a history of drinking but this new combination of drinking alcohol and caffeine-laden energy drinks sent her into cardiac arrest and caused her death. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/16/08 – New photos show where smugglers hid 35 pounds of cocaine seized from a cruise ship. The bricks were found hidden behind the ceiling panels inside one of the cabins of the Royal Caribbean ship earlier this week. The ship had just returned to Miami from a tour that included Aruba, Panama, Costa Rica and Grand Cayman. Authorities believe passengers brought the drugs onboard the ship and left them so they could take them off the ship at a later date. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/21/08 – Hearing will begin today for the men responsible for trying to bring hundreds of pounds of drugs into the country. On April 13th the Coast Guard responded to a call of a broken down boat about six miles east of Port Everglades. After the boat was towed in, authorities searched it and found 322 pounds of marijuana. They say the street value is worth nearly one million dollars. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/3/08 – People who operate marijuana grow houses could face stiffer penalties under a bill making its way through the legislature. Grow houses have popped up around the state, especially in Port St. Lucie where police have discovered 115 houses in the past year and a half. Under the new bill, if police discover just 25 plants the grower could face a maximum of fifteen years in jail. In addition, if a child was living in the home, the person operating the grow house could spend up to 30 years in prison. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/3/08 – Officers fighting networks of indoor marijuana factories teamed up with federal authorities today to coordinate statewide busts. In Palm Beach County alone, “Operation D-Day” raided fifty one houses, nearly one thousand pot plants were seized, as well as eighty pounds of ready to sell pot and seven guns. Fifteen people were arrested, and children and pets were also removed from the homes. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

THESE PROGRAMS FEATURE PROMINENT NEWSMAKERS ON A NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL LEVEL, OR AS FICTIONAL DEPICTIONS OF CURRENT TOPICS.

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/15/08 - The installment of the Oprah Winfrey show featured Dr. Oz making an emergency house call to a family in crisis. After trying to get this couple to quit smoking, Dr. Oz had a nagging feeling that there was more to the story that was pushing the couple to the breaking point. He investigated the source for their tension and how it impacted their 6 year old daughter. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 14/17/08 – This Oprah Winfrey show educated viewers about how to make cut-backs in their spending, improve their savings and still be able to live comfortably. Two families took the challenge to make drastic cut-backs for a week and only live with the bare necessities. Viewers watch how these families drastically change their lifestyles. And see the kinds of changes they can make for themselves at home. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/14/08 - This installment of the Oprah Winfrey included an investigative report by Lisa Ling on the prevalence of polygamy, and how young teenaged girls are forced into sexual relationships at early ages with older men and sometimes close relatives without their consent. With the ongoing story of the Texas cult and their families being separated this topic is in the forefront of discussion. How often does this happen? Do authorities know about it and look the other way? How hard is it to get cooperation and prosecute? All questions answered in this program. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 6/3/08 – Dr. Oz introduced us to several “medical miracles” during this Oprah Winfrey program. People who were seriously injured and would have never recovered conventionally. But because of advances in medical science, (and Dr. Oz explains the scientific advances) these lucky people are able to resume a relatively normal life instead of facing paralysis. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 6/19/08 –This Oprah Winfrey show featured a mother of five who went behind bars to confront the man who murdered her father. What this guest had to say to the convicted murder and what his response was. The cameras follow this woman as she does one of the bravest things she’s ever done. And the audience was amazed at the conversation. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM /NEED 3 – 6/26/08 – This installment of Oprah Winfrey show discussed a family and how they dealt with the suicide of the father. The man committed suicide after bringing the family into financial ruin. With no insurance policy, with only \$72 dollars in the bank and more than \$50,000 in credit card debt, the wife and kids were facing a nightmare. Financial advisor, Suze Orman steps in to show the family how to heal and face their financial reality. With so many families now facing financial hardships this program was very relevant. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/1/08 – This Dr. Phil program dealt with the “Super Bug” also known as MRSA. The audience heard many actual accounts of how people have contracted MRSA, even a doctor and what can be done to detect the infection early and what kinds of products are available now to consumers to prevent the spread of this deadly health issue. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)
