Reports and interviews usually two to three minutes in length, which expand upon current problems and issues facing the community.

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/13/05 – A deal has been struck with Florida Atlantic University and Boca Raton Community Hospital to build a new expanded hospital on the campus of the University. The University wants the hospital to help expand its nursing and medical degree programs and the Hospital wants the space to expand its facilities to be able to serve the expanding population of Boca Raton. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/18/05 – A generous donation of \$20 million dollars has been made to build an 87,000 square foot cancer research and treatment facility on the grounds of Florida Atlantic University. The cancer center would be located across from the proposed new location of the Boca Raton Hospital. More money is needed to complete the cancer center, however this initial endowment will allow them to break ground and begin construction. The completion of the center is scheduled for 2007. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/8/05 – Western Palm Beach County will soon get a new hospital. The Health Care District of Palm Beach County has designated \$30 million dollars in reserves for a replacement hospital in the Glades. After taking over the operation of the older facility last year, the Health Care District realized that changes and upgrades needed to be made. They've hired a consulting agency to come up with a plan for the expanded services. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/18/05 – A state agency has reversed its approval for a new hospital west of Boynton Beach. Two years ago Bethesda Memorial Hospital received approval to build a proposed 80-bed hospital west of Florida's turnpike. But now the state agency agrees with a judge who ruled the area doesn't need a medical center. Bethesda officials plan to appeal and submit another application to build the \$73 million dollar hospital in west Boynton Beach. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/10/05 – Actress Cheryl Hines was recognized in the House Chamber of the State Capitol today. Hines was invited to speak by the Legislative Women’s Caucus. She spoke about the need for better education and outreach efforts to help women receive the medical treatment they need. Issues such as pregnancy, childcare, mammograms, and getting tested for AIDS are all facing women across the state and better health care options need to be made available to women of all economic backgrounds. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/30/05 – Health insurance may not be a retirement benefit for many seniors much longer. A new study by the Employee Benefit Research Institute says that fewer employers are providing health care insurance after their workers retire. The study found that only 29% of early retirees and only 25% of post-65 retirees received health insurance from their employers. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 1/7/05 – Within the last year Floridians have gone from boarding a train to Canada to buy their prescription medications at lower prices, in some cases saving hundreds of dollars per month. But now Canada’s Health Minister plans to follow through on a prohibition of Canadian doctors co-signing prescriptions for American patients they have not personally examined. A top official with the Canadian International Pharmacy Association believes pressure from the Bush administration and U.S. drug manufacturers triggered the turnaround. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 2/15/05 – A new study had linked a popular category of drugs known as cox-2 inhibitors with increased cardiovascular risk. Popular drugs known as Vioxx, Celebrex and Bextra have been shown to increase risk of heart attack by 20 to 50 percent. These drugs have now been pulled from the market until their safety can be confirmed. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/15/05 – Health problems and adverse side effects from the use of prescription drugs appears to be on the rise. The Food and Drug Administration says in 2004 it received some 422,000 complaints about adverse reaction to FDA approved drugs. That’s a 14% jump from the prior year. A top FDA official says the rise reflects a surge in prescription drug use not an increase in health risk. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 3/21/05 – A woman whose 5-year-old grandson was diagnosed with Attention Deficit Disorder produced a documentary about the dangers of giving young children daily doses of stimulants such as Ritalin. The roller coaster problems of her grandson and others spoke about the highly addictive drugs that can lead to psychotic episodes and suicide. The documentary talks about the prescribing of drugs as a last resort, only after other measures are exhausted. However parents are pushed to giving medication because they feel pressure and like the convenience. (1-2 minutes in length 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 2/15/05 – A whistle blower will receive half a million dollars for exposing a Weston clinic that overcharged for Medicare claims. The woman's information helped settle federal claims the hospital did not comply with Medicare coverage requirements from 1993 to 2001. The Cleveland Weston Clinic was ordered to pay nearly \$3 million dollars to settle the billing charges. The clinic is located in Broward County. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 3/14/05 – The National Council on Economic Education says that only seven states mandate basic finance classes for high school students. Florida is not one of the seven states. Educators say most students don't understand personal finance and economics that leads them to make bad financial decisions. Each year thousands of young adults default on loans due in part to financial illiteracy. The Council is pushing for all fifty states to require some form of basic finance study for high school students. (1-2 minutes in length 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 & 1 – 1/4/05 – The Health Department is now monitoring health concerns in St. Lucie County. Since the hurricanes hit last September, some school staff members and parents have been complaining that the physical school buildings are making students and staff sick. They say that a majority of the schools have mold issues because of the damage caused by the storms. Beginning in a few weeks the Health Department will track the concerns and make periodic reports to the School Board. (1-2 minutes in length 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 & 1 - 1/14/05 – A concerned group of parents and school staff are now saying that the St. Lucie County School District is not listening to them when it comes to serious health concerns in hurricane damaged buildings. This group claims more and more people are getting sick and not enough is being done. Many schools in St. Lucie County suffered heavy damages during the storms and repair work was delayed because of addition storms that followed. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 3/16/05 – How prepared are the nation's principals and superintendents? A new study says those who run our schools are unprepared for their jobs. The reports say graduate education programs that train school administrators are deeply flawed and have irrelevant curriculums, low standards and weak faculties. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 & 1 – 3/16/05 – High school students will have fewer choices at vending machines under a new plan by the Palm Beach County School District. Administrators want to reduce the number of sodas sold on campuses over the next three to five years. Complaints from parents and a growing concern about childhood obesity and diabetes caused administrators to look at the beverage offering of most school campuses and found kids lined-up at the soda machines between classes. Water and fruit juices will be slowly replacing the sugary beverages. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/18/05 – The Florida Supreme Court is preparing to hear a challenge of a 1999 law that provides tax-funded vouchers to students enrolled in public schools. The case has been involved in litigation for nearly six years. Four of the five ruling issued have concluded the law unconstitutional. The State's first brief is due tomorrow. Supporters say the law gives children access to a private education in a school that offers more programs and attention. Opponents say vouchers undercut funding for public schools. (1-2 minutes 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/18/05 – A high-tech high school in Martin County is changing the way students learn. Gone are the days of blackboards and instead laptops are at every desk. The school, Clark Advanced Learning Center, is expected to become a national model for technology-based learning. Technology is incorporated into every class. School officials say it is a new way of learning for a new generation. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/20/05 –Yesterday, Governor Bush laid out his \$60 billion dollar budget proposal to lawmakers, it included an increase in spending on schools by more than a billion dollars. But the Governor's critics say even with the increases, he's still short changing education. Art and other popular programs are still being cut in order to hand out tax relief. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 2/02/05 –This afternoon crews will break ground on a new St. Lucie high school. This will be a \$50 million dollar state-of-the-art facility that will house up to 2,500 students. It will offer an enhanced hurricane protection area that will house approximately 600 people. Last year many of the Treasure Coast schools were used as shelters when the hurricanes came through. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/09/05- The Palm Beach County School District was forced to pay a family thousands of dollars after a student with special needs was abused on a school bus. The boy's family is hoping that school officials learn from their mistakes. The School District awarded \$6,000 to the family after a security camera showed a student aid grabbing the boy and dragging him down the aisle of a bus and tossing him in a seat. The aid admitted to not having received any special training in dealing with children with special needs. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 & 2 – 3/25/05 – According to published reports this morning, violent crime is down but suspensions are up in Palm Beach County schools. There was an increase in weapons possessions and drug use, but fights; sexual battery and robbery were down. The District handed out 2,400 more suspensions during the 2003/2004 year than in the previous year. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/25/05 – The group called The Advancement Project, a national racial justice organization released its second report examining the over use of the zero tolerance policy, saying schools rely too much on police and juvenile courts to discipline students. And have created a “Schoolhouse to Jailhouse” track that unfairly pushes students, and at that mostly back students into serious criminal charges. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/19/05 – After friends and loved ones laid to rest a man who was gunned down outside the Riviera Beach business where he worked, city leaders are infuriated with the growing homicide rate of the city. The leaders met at Riviera Town Hall to discuss why the problem is increasing and what can be done. The mayor and others expressed concerns over pockets of poverty that have now produced second and third generations of young people who know nothing else. In trying to change the city’s image, city leaders are concerned that there will be nothing they can do to change this pattern. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/14/05 –Tonight a West Palm Beach neighborhood is fighting back against violence. Some neighbors living near Palm Beach Lakes Boulevard have turned into crime fighters. This group has the blessing of the police since the department trained them. Citizens patrol units are not new but this one is invaluable because they lived through the violence of gang shooting up and down Palm Beach Lakes Boulevard. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/04/05 – A follow-up on the “Nanny Murder” in Boca Raton that remains unsolved. A 26-year-old Peruvian woman was returning home after grocery shopping. Detectives found clothing and groceries scattered around her body, but little evidence from the killer. Police believe the victim was pure prey and had no connection to the killer. That fact is making it difficult to find the killer and keeping a quiet suburb of Boca Raton on edge not knowing if it was a local person or a drifter who has moved on. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/02/05 – Palm Beach County Sheriff’s deputies are asking for help in solving a New Year’s Eve murder. A group of suspects attempted to rob a man’s house in Lake Worth. He tried to shot the suspects but missed and the suspects got away. But while investigating the robbery they found a man dead in his car. Detectives say the crimes are related but aren’t sure how. They are asking anyone with information to come forward. (1-2 minutes in length 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/10/05 – The first murder of the year in West Palm Beach happened on January 9th as police found a man shot to death in a yard in the early morning near downtown West Palm Beach. Police are asking anyone with information to help them locate the murderer. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/01/05 – Police have nabbed a murder suspect over the weekend Robin Moore was arrested for killing a 53-year-old man back in December. Police say Moore was working with an accomplice. They were in the victim's car and drove him to a wooded area and stabbed him. They then fled in the car and later sold it for drug money. Police arrested a young teen for buying the stolen car and were able to track down Moore. They are still searching for the second suspect. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/07/05 – Six years ago, a crime occurred that shocked the community. A middle-aged couple was missing from their upper class home. Her body was found in a freezer in garage of the home, his body was never found. Six years later the man accused of their murders faces federal prosecutors. He is the brother-in-law of the woman and has borrowed money from the couple and did not want to pay it back. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/21/05 – After seven years, a man accused of hiring two hit men to kill his ex-wife is back in Palm Beach County and will face charges. Ronald Samuels is charged with hiring two hit men to kill his ex-wife and her husband at the time while driving in traffic. The husband was killed and she was left paralyzed by the incident. (1-2 minutes in length 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3– 3/16/05 – Tonight detectives are searching for two armed men suspected in a deadly heist at a Palm Beach County moving company. What began as a robbery turned into murder at the All My Sons Moving Company warehouse in Riviera Beach. Two masked men confronted an employee then killed him when he couldn't meet their demands for money. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 2/23/05 – Autopsy results prompted authorities to charge a Belle Glade man with murder. Lewis Browning killed his girlfriend. Her body was recovered from a car in a South Bay canal over the weekend. Browning said he struck her with his hand as they were traveling in the car and she lost control and veered into the canal. Autopsy revealed she died from blunt head trauma not drowning. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/03/05 – Police arrested nine people today as part of a protest of the planned Scripps Research Institute Biotech complex being built in Palm Beach County. Protestors now only believe that the area designated for the complex should be considered part of the protected Everglades, but that bring a biotech research facility to the area endangers the citizens because of hazardous waste that is produced. Protestors crossed the line of peaceful demonstration when they hurled sand and rotten oranges in the lobby of the Business Development Board. (1-2 minutes in length 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/18/04 – State Senator Dave Aronberg is sending a letter to Governor Jeb Bush asking that the Scripps Research Institute reconsider two other locations for their proposed Biotech center. Aronberg’s concern is that the current Mecca Farms location will meet with protests and long legal battles with several environmental groups. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 3/11/05 – Spokesmen for the Scripps Research Institute in California said that there will be only one site considered for the new Biotech Center and that will be the Mecca Farms site. While this site has met with all kinds of protests from environmentalists the country tried to suggest alternative locations. But Scripps is holding fast and the county has to make it work or turn Scripps away, after the state worked so hard to lure the Institute to Florida. Other counties are now offering to host the Institute on “temporary” sites until the Mecca Farm site can be built. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 2/03/05 – The mayor of Boynton Beach today is asking surrounding cities for help in funding a proposed widening of the Boynton Beach inlet. The inlet is one of the most dangerous in the state. The narrowness and the approach to the inlet have caused capsizing of boats on a regular basis. Now the mayor is proposing a study to not hurt the environment but expand the opening of the inlet and perhaps put a drawbridge in that would reduce the dangerous nature of the inlet. (1-2 minutes in length 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 3/03/05 – Last summer 37 rough-toothed dolphins stranded themselves on Hutchinson Island. Scientists tried to save the pod with the help of dozens of volunteers. They ended up putting 30 of the animals down and spared only the healthiest seven. Several months and several hundred thousand dollars later only three have survived and they were released today in the waters off of Hutchinson Island. They were tagged with special tracking devices that will allow researchers to follow their migration and progress. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 3/18/05 – Today was the third day in a row that swimmers were called out of the water in Delray, Lake Worth and Palm Beach due to a heavy migration of Black Tipped or Spinner sharks. Several hundred sharks could be easily seen in the shallow waters off the coast. Environmentalists say that there probably aren’t more sharks than usual, rather the waters are unusually clear and therefore the sharks can be seen more readily. Even the NBC Today Show aired footage of the sharks as they make their way up the coast as part of their normal migration. Researchers always point out that sharks have more to fear from man rather than man fearing sharks. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/16/05 - Top federal officials say they're committed to restoring the Everglades and ready to move forward on several key projects. Today at a Coalition Conference the federal government said they are going ahead with the \$8.4 billion dollar restoration project. One goal is to restore the wetland around the Indian River Lagoon, slowing the water flow into Lake Okeechobee that feeds the Everglades. (1-2 minutes in length 7:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 1/26/05 – Jupiter's Morse Of Course screen printing donated three dozen t-shirts to the Busch Wildlife Sanctuary. The company hopes the shirts will help defray the expense caused by vandals last week. Thieves broke into donation boxes at the Sanctuary stealing over \$200 dollars. The non-profit organization that cares for and rehabilitates animals plans to sell the shirts in its gift shop. The Sanctuary has also received a \$1000 dollar donation from a local construction company. (1-2 minutes in length 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 1/27/05 – Undercover cops today discovered nearly two dozen students selling or distributing illegal drugs. After a six-month joint investigation by Palm Beach County School Police and the Sheriff's office, cops pretending to be students were able to make the arrests. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 1/31/05 – A major strike in the war on drugs happened today at Port Canaveral, the Coast Guard showed off what they intercepted in raids over the last two months. More than 15,000 pounds of Cocaine was seized with a street value of \$470 million dollars. During one of the raids the Coast Guard used a 50-caliber sniper gun to disable two fleeing boats. (1-2 minutes in length 7:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 2/18/05– Schools are now using the same technology that is used to safeguard military bases, airports and U.S. borders. Instead of handguns, school police are now armed with a cotton swipe and the latest technology. The system can detect a billionth of a gram of drug residue. School police are using it to detect illegal drug substances such as heroin, cocaine and marijuana on school property and students. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 3/18/05 – Medical Examiners are trying to determine what killed a newborn in Boca Raton. His parents admitted to being on a Cocaine binge when he died. Both were arrested and charged with child neglect but were released after prosecutors determined there was not enough evidence to prove they contributed to the death. Toxicology reports revealed no evidence of criminal conduct. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 2/28/05 – A tornado ripped the roof off a house in Palm Bay this weekend and revealed something the owner probably didn't want to show off. As police went door to door to see if everyone was okay, they found a house where no one was home but the damage revealed 54 marijuana plants inside and the equipment needed to grow them. When the owner returns from vacation he'll find a damaged home and face criminal charges. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 3/11/05 – A candy company that makes lollipops and gumdrops flavored like marijuana is facing some flack from lawmakers that want the products removed from shelves. The makers of Chronic Candy sell it with the slogan “every lick is like taking a hit” and claim it is not made with marijuana but hemp. However lawmakers are saying it glamorizes drug use. (1-2 minutes in length 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 1/06/05 – Colombian police have busted a unique smuggling operation. Police say the smugglers were surgically implanting packets of heroin and other drugs into the bellies of puppies. The police were tipped off about the operation by the neighbors of the smugglers. The six puppies rescued in the sting were carrying a total of ten pouches in their bellies. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 3/21/05 – Police in Vero Beach have arrested a suspected drug dealer. Friday night officials from Vero Beach’s critical response team searched the home of the 19-year-old drug dealer and found four pounds of marijuana and cocaine. The dealer is charged with drug trafficking, possession, and intent to sell. (1-2 minutes in length 7:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 2/06/05 – A major ecstasy drug ring has been broken up in South Florida. The twist is that two Miramar firefighters are arrested and more are being investigated. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/06/05– The City of West Palm Beach is paying tribute to the African American community. Residents gathered at Coleman Park on Saturday for dancing and food. Inside it was a history lesson, where there were hundreds of pictures on display of African American leaders from around the country and right here in West Palm Beach. (1-2 minutes in length 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/25/05 – Ineria Hudnell is a retired teacher who is now back teaching Black history to children and adults in our area. With the help of newspapers she’s collected she teaches about the first Black mayor of West Palm Beach, African American Police Officers, the first Black DJ and countless other events. Her love of African American history has influenced the leaders of today including City Commissioner Ike Robinson. (1-2 minutes in length 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 3/22/05 –Black women, both young and old joined forces today in the fight against AIDS. The Greater Palm Beach Chapter of the National Coalition of 100 Black Women hosted their annual power breakfast. This year’s focus was to bring awareness to AIDS and HIV on a local level. The function ended with a call to action to get police involved in legislation by writing to state congress and speaking to churches. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 1/04/05 – Tonight the U.S. Senate has its first Cuban-American member. Florida Representative Mel Martinez was sworn in today. Martinez replaces retiring Democrat Bob Graham. Martinez promised to follow Graham’s example of finding middle ground between parties on divisive issues. The 58-year-old said he hopes to show Floridians he is not the far-right candidate depicted during the campaign. (1-2 minutes in length 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/02/05 – A profile of Dr. Luis Sirotzky, a retired Kidney Specialist who is now back volunteering at the Caridad Health Clinic in Boynton Beach. The clinic serves over 4,000 members of the Hispanic community who are poor and do not have health insurance. Sirotzky is one of 75 doctors who volunteer their time at the clinic. Sirotzky was born and raised in Peru and his ability to speak Spanish is worth his weight in gold when it comes to helping out at the clinic. (1-2 minutes in length 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 1/20/05– A discussion during the Hablando Con La Comunidad program about a proposal to allow a large number of illegal immigrants, legalization in this country. So many members of the South Florida Hispanic community are illegal aliens and this kind of legislative proposal excites a large portion of the population that wants to stay and live in the country. (3-4 minutes in length 6:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 1/11/05 –This installment of the Dr. Phil program featured the actor Samuel Jackson and the real life coach that he portrayed in a movie, Coach Ken Carter. Carter made a name for himself by shutting down a high school basketball program until the athletes brought up their grades. Parents and School Administration were outraged but the Carter stood strong by the principle that the young men needed to be students first and athletes second. The team went on to raise their grades and produce a winning team. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 1/24/05 – This Dr. Phil featured Dr. Bill Cosby talking with Dr. Phil about challenges facing young people particularly young African American men who suffer from low self-esteem. Both men discussed ways to improve the self-esteem and to face some of the tough issues those parents and kids need to tackle. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –3/29/05 – This Dr. Phil show looked at the increasing number of teens who cheat and gamble. With poker sweeping the nation and sweeping teens as the new pastime, parents are concerned that this is leading to playing poker for money. Also teens who are using technology like text messaging to cheat on tests and the Internet to plagiarize, their parents react to these new forms of cheating. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 1/10/05 – This Oprah Winfrey program focused on women who are leading a secret double life. In many cases they were shoplifting from stores, they were prostitutes during the daytime, in some cases fighting horrible addictions that neither their husbands or families knew about until they got caught and arrested. Cases such as these are more prevalent than you may think. Oprah looked at what psychological reasons these women might have for turning to lives of criminal behavior. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 3/7/05 –This Oprah show dealt with coming face to face with your attacker. The daughter of a woman who was murdered and raped asks questions of the man who is charged with the crime. Then a hit man comes face to face with his target. What is at the root cause of why someone attacks and kills another person? And how can you live with yourself after it happens? (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)
