Reports and interviews usually two to three minutes in length, which expand upon current problems and issues facing the community.

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/1/12 – Two prevalent drawbacks are factors in people trying to save on their expenses - the money that people are spending on their cell phone bills and the hackers and thieves who are targeting them. A survey by CouponCabin.com found that almost half of Smartphone users pay more than 100 dollars on their phone bills each month. One in five spends more on their mobile plan than they do for groceries. Experts advise that to prevent the hacking problem use the password protection and install or enable the remote wipe function on the phone. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/1/12 – Macy's is ramping up its hiring for this year's holiday shopping season. The retailer says it plans to bring on 80,000 seasonal workers. That's up from last year when the company hired 78,000 people. There are more than 250 open positions across our state right now. The extra workers are needed to staff sales floors, store operations and call centers, as well as shipping centers for online orders. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/2/12 – Good news for the economy, US home prices are on the up and up. New statistics show home prices jumped 4.6% in August compared to a year ago. That's the largest year-over-year increase, in more that six years. Even with the gains, home sales and prices still remain below healthy levels. (1-2 minutes in length –5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/5/12 – The “Help Wanted” sign is now up at the newest grocery store in South Palm Beach County. Aldi's will be holding a job fair on October 6<sup>th</sup>, interviewing potential workers from 8AM until 4PM at the new Delray Beach location at the corner of Linton Boulevard and Military Trail. They have full and part time jobs paying anywhere from \$10 to \$20 an hour. (1-2 minutes in length – 4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/9/12 – Even with a weakening economy, there's some good news for job seekers. General Motors will hire up to 1,500 people to staff a new computer technology center near Detroit. GM is shifting the work from outside firms and plans to open four new tech centers in the U.S. Executives announced last month five hundred people would be hired for a center in Texas. As many as 10,000 people could be hired in the next three to five years. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/10/12 – There's some big news for Palm Beach County's economy. Local experts from the Hotel and Lodging Association are saying that for the first time since 2008, hotel occupancy is back up to pre-recession numbers. They attribute the rise in hotel demand to two things. One is an improving economy and two is an increase in marketing. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/10/12 – Shipping company Atlantic Caribbean Line says a bad economy has hit the cargo business hard. They had done fairly well until about a year and a half ago. Their main business is from construction projects in the Bahamas. But that country's economy has been slowing down and affecting the Fort Pierce based company. Most of those construction projects came to a halt in the last two years and they lost half of their business that way. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/29/12 – West Palm Beach City Commissioners have just signed off on a plan to build that long-awaited hotel next to the Palm Beach County Convention Center. The County came under fire for reaching a deal to build the hotel with the related companies and not looping the city into the process. The city raised concerns about the hotel being a tax-free property and losing out on hundreds of thousands of tax dollars. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/31/12 – Floridians are more confident these days that the national economy will improve next year. That's according to a report released yesterday by the University of Florida. Overall the report shows the state's consumer confidence index went up resulting in a five year high. (1-2 minutes in length – 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/2/12 – Wal-Mart is hiring in our area. The retail giant is looking to fill 90 positions at its new Boynton Beach Wal-Mart neighborhood market. It has opened a temporary hiring center at 9804 South Military Trail in Boynton Beach. You can also apply online. The majority of employees would begin work this month to prepare for the store's opening early next year. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/3/12 – A bad economy has been bad for business at Lake Park Harbor Marina. The 51 year old facility has struggled with low occupancy since the summer. So they are also lowering rates. The charter rates, the annual dockage rates and the winter dockage rates have all been lowered based on the footage of the boats, in an effort to encourage more rentals. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 –11/7/12 – Some AT&T customers may soon be getting a refund. The phone company has agreed to pay the federal government \$700,000 dollars for mistakenly forcing some Smartphone users into monthly data plans. In late 2009, AT&T began requiring new Smartphone customers to subscribe to monthly data plans. The requirements weren't supposed to apply to existing subscribers. The company must now restore the older plans to affected customers and offer refunds which could be up to \$30 a month. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/9/12 – Fifty two days until the fiscal cliff, and if you hoped Presidential election might mean more cooperation and a bipartisan deal to turn us away from the cliff, there is no sign of that happening. Instead the President and John Boehner laid out positions that sounded just like their old positions. (1-2 minutes in length –5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/13/12 – Hundreds of new jobs could soon be coming to our area. Pratt & Whitney is expected to announce they will be adding 230 new positions at its manufacturing plant in northwestern Palm Beach County. They'll be working on a new production line for commercial jet engines, with an average salary of about \$81,000. The company also plans to build a new facility, which will help boost the county's tax revenues. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 –10/1/12 – Palm Beach County Deputies need your help finding the person responsible for allegedly shooting a deputy in the neck with a BB gun. Just before 6PM the previous night a deputy responded to a call at the Pentecostal Church of God. Shortly after the deputy arrived he heard a gunshot. The deputy realized he was hit in the back of the neck with a pellet from a BB gun. Although this was just a BB pellet, PBSO isn't taking this incident lightly. Every time an officer is hot or injured in the line of duty law enforcement agencies take the situation seriously. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 10/1/12 – Two of the three siblings accused of a crime spree that started in Florida and ended with a shoot out in Colorado went in front of a Georgia judge and pleaded guilty. All three Dougherty siblings plead not guilty to bank robbery and guns charges back in May. Today, Ryan Dougherty and Lee Grace Dougherty changed their please. They are scheduled to be sentenced in December. All three still face charges in Florida, where authorities say they shot at an officer during a high-speed chase. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 10/2/12 – The Palm Beach County Sheriff's office is asking for your help to find two men posing as police officers to rob residents in Lake Worth. Deputies have released these sketches of the men they believe are responsible for incidents dating back to August. In each case, the suspects followed the victims to their homes and acted as police detectives. They would then force themselves inside and take money and valuables. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 11/2/12 – There's new information coming out about a 20 year old woman who was found dead in front of an abandoned home in Lake Worth Monday. The mother of Tiffany Nelson tells police that her daughter was stabbed to death. However investigators would only confirm that it's being treated as a homicide. For now the search for her killer continues and anyone with information is asked to call Crimestoppers. (1-2 minutes in length –5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 11/3/12 – New statistics show overall crime in Palm Beach County has not moved much in either direction. The report from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement includes both violent crimes – meaning murder or rape and non-violent crimes – like burglary and theft. Overall crime in the county dropped .3% from January to June. However the Village of Wellington saw an increase in crimes by more than 13%. In Delray Beach there was better news, total crime dropped more than 17%. (1-2 minutes in length – 4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 11/24/12 – Florida law enforcement agencies are taking advantage of the new technology and are using social media to fight crime and make arrests. If you do something illegal and decide to share it online – the pictures, posts, and videos become public, thus making them fair game for law enforcement. For instance, a 30-year-old in Collier County was recently arrested after allegedly bragging about beating up his neighbor on his twitter page. Unlike searching a home or password protected e-mail account, social media is considered public – so officers don't need a warrant or subpoena to search. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/3/12 – Police in Boca Raton need help in tracking down four dangerous suspects who robbed a T-Mobile store. The store is located on West Glades Road. Investigators say the suspects entered the store yesterday afternoon, handcuffed and pepper-sprayed the employees, and then made off with cash and other items. The victims are expected to be alright. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/6/12 – A Coast Guard crackdown based in South Florida has led to the seizure of \$45 million dollars worth of cocaine. Authorities say the cocaine was destined for Puerto Rico and US Virgin Islands. The operation based in St. Petersburg started in November with the discovery of cocaine off the coast of the Dominican Republic. Two days later, the second seizure snagged 1,800 pounds of cocaine in the same area. The operation has netted 20,000 pounds of cocaine and 6,900 pounds of marijuana over the last five months. (1-2 minutes in length -12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 –12/19/12 – Two minors have been charged for an armed burglary that caused tense moments at three Jupiter schools. Police tell us Jupiter Elementary and two pre-schools were on lock-down yesterday after a reported burglary in the Riverwalk development. The 14 and 15 year old suspects did not enter school grounds. A K-9 tracked the two boys down, and they were taken into custody. They were carrying a small handgun and a knife at the time of the incident. Since this comes on the heels of the Sandy Hook shootings, the schools were on high alert and nervous that it could end in a shooting involving children. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/3/12 – Fewer teens are drinking and driving. That's the word from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. In 1991, a survey of high school students found 22% admitted to getting behind the wheel after having a few drinks. That number has dropped to 10% in new surveys. Experts are attributing the numbers to better awareness and education in schools. (1-2 minutes in length – 4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –10/8/12 – Florida is weighing the pros and cons of allowing in-state tuition for children of illegal immigrants. State education authorities are debating how to respond to a federal ruling deeming it unconstitutional for colleges to charge higher tuition to the dependent of illegal immigrants. The state could lose up to \$200 million dollars a year if it has to reset tuition rates and offer lower tuition to all U.S. citizens whose parents aren't legal residents. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 10/10/12 – Florida Governor Rick Scott announced he's asking the legislature for more than \$2 million dollars to finance a teacher training program. He says the idea came from a week-long "Listening Tour" he wrapped up last month. The program would be designed to attract more money from private companies, education advocates and local school districts. Governor Scott says the goal is to have more than \$6 million dollars available for continuing teacher education. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/5/12 – Members of the State Board of Education will be in Boca Raton for a meeting to discuss Governor Rick Scott's College and Career First Initiative. The idea is to focus more legislative efforts on preparing our state's college students for the real world. It comes as a result of the Governor's education "Listening Tour" last month in which he met with students, teachers and parents to hear ideas to improve education. His new plan includes expanding charter schools, less state regulation of school districts and more resources for teachers. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –11/15 /12 – Education experts say more people are expected to take online college courses this year, and now it has some wondering whether those

classes are worthy of academic credit. If they do get the recognition, it could be a big game changer for students around the world, giving more people access to degrees like never before. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/20/12 – Teachers are calling on lawmakers to throw out a new system of evaluating their performance. They sat the recently adopted “Value Added Model” which bases half of a teacher’s performance evaluation on their students test scores and learning gains is flawed. The Florida Education Association has also sent a letter to Governor Rick Scott asking for his help in changing the evaluation process. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/26/12 – Offer a four-year college degree for \$10,000 dollars. That’s the challenge Governor Rick Scott is giving Florida’s schools. The Governor says it is simple – make degrees less expensive and more people get an education. But critics say it is not that easy – and could include a hidden price. Critics say it is a gimmick and can undermine the quality and value of an education. But many students feel that they can’t afford to take many classes at one time and so it takes longer to get a degree and join the workforce. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 11/29/12 – There’s some bad news from the U.S. Department of Education. New reports show our state has one of the lowest high school graduation rates in the country for the last school year. Taking a closer look at the numbers, only 71% of students earned a diploma. But education leaders here in our state say the survey doesn’t take into account the students who take advanced classes, or who leave high school with other certifications. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 12/1/12 – There are some mixed news on the local education front. Data just released from the last school year shows graduation rates rose in Palm Beach County and across the Treasure Coast. However, the Department of Education also says Palm Beach County’s drop-out rate was higher than the state average. According to the rates released last night, more Treasure Coast students stayed in school and graduated this year. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 12/4/12 – Florida schools are worth the investment. That’s what university leaders are trying to convince Governor Rick Scott. They’re launching a new campaign called “Aim Higher,” which will focus on the economic value that Florida colleges and universities have on the state economy. Governor Scott cut \$300 million dollars from Florida universities in the state budget this year. (1-2 minutes in length 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 12/12/12 – Governor Rick Scott wants to reform private education. Scott says students who receive state support to attend private schools

should be taking the same standardized tests as public school students. Right now, more than 50,000 students from low-income families get state support to attend private schools. The Governor spoke to the state's largest private school voucher program. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –10/2/12 – A Weston psychiatrist has been sentenced to ten years in federal prison for his role in what prosecutors called one of the largest and most brazen health care fraud conspiracies in recent memory. Yesterday Dr. Mark Willner who practiced in Fort Lauderdale was also ordered to pay more than \$51 million dollars. Willner was found guilty of conspiracy to commit health fraud earlier this year. His attorney plans to appeal Willner's conviction. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 10/7/12 – The battle over health care continues in Florida. Governor Rick Scott and the Republican-led legislature want to privatize the State's Medicaid program. As opposed to the Obama administration that wants to make more low-income Floridians eligible for Medicaid. Without a solution billions of federal dollars could go to other states, and many uninsured Floridians will continue to receive their health care in emergency rooms. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 10/12/12 – The Martin County Health Department is set to cut services and layoff some employees. The cuts to state and federal funding have left the health department's budget with a \$1 million dollar budget hole. The county says it will cut primary, pediatric and maternity services next year, with an unknown amount of employees being let go. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 11/8/12 – Governor Rick Scott said he still won't implement parts of President Obama's health care overhaul despite the re-election of the President. Scott says the overhaul would be too expensive and would harm businesses by raising their costs. Earlier this year the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the law but said states could decide whether to expand Medicaid programs to help lower the number of uninsured residents. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 11/15/12 – A West Palm Beach restaurant owner is trying to raise prices blaming it on President Obama's health care plan. John Metz, who owns more than thirty Denny's and Dairy Queen restaurants as well as a Hurricane Grill and Wings told the Huffington Post and Fox News he wants to add a 5% surcharge to food to offset Obama's health care plan. Customers are not hungry for the change. Reaction to the possibility has been bad. Starting next year, many owners will be slashing employee hours to avoid paying health insurance. The Healthcare plan will not be fully implemented until 2014. (1-2 minutes in length –11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 11/21/12 – The Department of Corrections is trying to privatize health care statewide and that's leaving hundreds of employees' jobs in limbo as the holidays approach. Florida spends \$350 million dollars a year taking care of sick and injured inmates. Now, nurses and the state employee union are suing arguing the 15 member panel doesn't have the authority to make wholesale policy changes. The state says privatizing health care in prisons could save fifty million dollars a year. State lawmakers defeated a plan to privatize a fourth of the prison system last spring. (1-2 minutes in length –5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –12/4/12 – An attempt by a group of legislators to privatize health care in Florida prisons has failed. Today a Florida circuit judge ruled in favor of unions challenging the privation plans. AFSME Executive Director Alma Gonzalez says the group of lawmakers trying to privatize health care was abusing their power. The lawmakers said privatizing health care could save the state \$50 million dollars a year, but now it looks like the issue will have to go in front of the full legislature if it's going to become law. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00PM)

PROBLEM /NEED 4 – 12/26/12 – The fiscal cliff might not be the only reason your taxes will be going up in 2013. New taxes are coming on January first to help pay for President Obama's health care overhaul. The hikes will fall mainly on people who make lots of money and employers. But experts worry those businesses could pass the higher costs onto everyone else. The raise in taxes is expected to add about \$150 billion dollars to the budget next year. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/10/12 – The state is adjusting goals when it comes to reading improvement among its students. The new standards will now be based on the race and ethnicity of students. Benchmarks are based on a six-year scale, with reading percentage expected at a certain level by 2018. Florida wouldn't be the first to use this strategy, as Virginia and Washington, D.C. have already implemented similar achievement policies based on race. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/4/12 – Florida Atlantic University in Boca Raton is getting national attention. A new survey ranks FAU as one of the top 50 schools in the country for producing Hispanic graduates. Many of the degrees were for engineering, business and social sciences. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 & 5 – 10/29/12 – Compared to white women, black women appear to have higher death rates the first several years after a breast cancer diagnosis.

Doctors at the Harvard School of Public Health followed nearly 20,000 women with stage one to stage three breast cancer over about seven years. Non-Hispanic, black women had a 48% higher risk for breast cancer death in the first three years after diagnosis, compared to white patients. (1-2 minute in length –6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 & 5 – 11/6/12 – A large study of the U.S. Hispanic population reveals a high prevalence of cardiovascular risk factors. The study from the University of Illinois at Chicago involved more than 15,000 Latino men and women living in the United States. Eighty percent of men and 71% of women had at least one risk factor for heart disease, like high cholesterol. Those who'd lived in the U.S. the longest had the largest numbers of risk factors. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 –11/10/12 – Another Bush is running for office. The nephew of former President George P. Bush's campaign paperwork in Texas is said to be cheered by Republicans eager for new Hispanic faces in the party. And it's fuelling speculation about what office he'll seek. The 36-year-old consultant is the son of former Florida Governor Jeb Bush. He became the family's latest to move toward public office this week. (1-2 minutes in length –4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 12/29/12 – Investigators continue to search for the killer of an area nanny. Detectives are handing out a sketch in the quiet, residential South Olive neighborhood of West Palm Beach - all in hopes of catching the person who killed 41-year-old Amaria Grant. Grant was from Jamaica and was shot multiple times on December 22<sup>nd</sup> while riding her bike near South Olive Avenue and Edmor Road. The suspect is an African American male between 5'7" and 5'10", wearing a shiny brown leather jacket and a stocking cap. This murder has shaken the quiet, bedroom community of upper, middle class families. Police are unsure who would have wanted to hurt this shy woman from Jamaica. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 –12/1/12 – Reports show graduation rates have also been increasing by 3.9% this year. That's the biggest increase since 2003. About 75% of high school students graduated within four years and there have been major improvements for minority students. But graduation rates for Black and Hispanic students still lag. (1-2 minutes in length - 4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/8/12 – West Palm Beach Police are investigating a body found in the Intracoastal Waterway. We're told several units are on the scene in the 5000 block of North Flagler Drive near Osprey Park. West Palm Beach Police say the body is of a middle-aged Black male. The body was found around 3Pm in the afternoon. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 10/9/12 – A new report find HIV related deaths are down for most segments of the population. The American Cancer Society says HIV deaths declined significantly between 1993 and 2007 except among African Americans. Researchers credit the widespread use of anti-viral medications but not everyone has equal access to these drugs. In fact, declines were highest among whites and those with the most education. HIV death rates remained high for Black men and were unchanged for Black women in the lowest socioeconomic bracket. (1-2 minutes – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 –10/8/12 – Electric cars might not actually be better for the environment. Researchers from Norway said the factories which make electric cars can emit more toxic waste than conventional ones. Still, researchers said electric cars can make sense in the big picture if the electric used to run them comes from low-carbon sources. That means, if your power comes from coal, than an electric car isn't really helping with pollution. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/17/12 – A passion for the environment is what drove a Vero Beach man to paddle the entire 165 mile length of the Indian River Lagoon. Today he came home to friends and supporters. Justin Riney called his effort Paddling for a Cause and while he raised some money to help keep the Indian River Lagoon clean, it was more about raising awareness about how important the lagoon is, and our roles in helping to keep it clean. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 10/23/12 – Experts are weighing in on the debate between organic and conventional products. The American Academy of Pediatrics says there isn't a big difference in nutritional value between the two groups. But studies show pesticides levels could have an impact on intelligence, behavior and development. The pesticides levels can have an effect on IQ levels. In large groups like a population, small changes in the equivalent IQ of up to 5 points can result. Five points for most individuals isn't very important, but for a whole population it is significant. But if families cannot afford the higher price of organic food the AAP says eating conventional fruits and vegetables is much more important than not eating health foods at all. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 11/24/12 – Part of South Florida's main tourist attraction is washing away. Super storm Sandy continues to have a lasting effect on the area's beaches, especially in Delray Beach. In just one day the beach can lose 25 or 30 feet of sand. Since the start of Super storm Sandy the beach has lost about 80 feet, which means a number of sea turtle nests have been lost as well. Not only are the beaches at risk but many very expensive homes could be lost to the beach erosion, and owners worry about their property. Delray Beach has approved a \$9.2 million dollar beach renourishment project. (1-2 minutes in length -10:00AM)

THESE PROGRAMS FEATURE PROMINENT NEWSMAKERS ON A NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL LEVEL, OR AS FICTIONAL DEPICTIONS OF CURRENT TOPICS.

WPTV produced a half hour weekly News and Political talk show entitled "To The Point with Kelley Dunn." The show is co-hosted by news anchors Kelley Dunn and Michael Williams, and features a roundtable discussion of the week's political news and an interview with a local newsmaker.

PROBLEM/NEED 1, 2, 3 & 4 – 10/7/12 – A debate between two State Senate candidates Ellen Bogdanoff (Rep.) and Maria Sachs (Dem.) about how they would address the issues of the state's economy, crime, education and health care. Both women are waging a very "ugly" campaign of negative advertising and that too was addressed. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 1, 2, 3 & 4 – 10/14/12 – Two candidates for State Representative, Tom Gustafson and Bill Hager were interviewed about their positions on the state's economic recovery, their positions on crime, and gun control, the state's educational system and the Obama Healthcare plan. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 10/12/12 – This show was done on location at Lynn University in anticipation of the final Presidential debate to be held the following day. People that were interviewed included Lynn University President Kevin Ross, the chairperson of the Presidential Commission on Debates, and local Congressman Ted Deutch. All of these guests spoke about what hosting the debate has meant for the local economy in Boca Raton and South Florida in general and how it can help to attract future students to the University as well as teaching staff. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 1, 3, & 4 – 10/28/12 – An interview former West Palm Beach mayor Lois Frankel and her opponent Adam Hasner who are running for a Congressional seat. Both candidates spoke about what they would like to accomplish in Washington D.C. on the subjects of health care, and helping the local economy recover as well as money for education. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 12/23/12 – In the aftermath of the Sandy Hook School shootings in Newtown, Connecticut, local Palm Beach County Sheriff Rick Bradshaw was the

guest. He answered questions about statistics of gun ownership, gun-related deaths and what the laws are (and what he thinks they should be) for gun ownership. Also the question of buying guns at gun shows was a topic, and of course background checks. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 11/16/12 – Beginning at 4:30AM and continuing through every newscast through 6:30PM and through the Today Show from NBC we hosted an all day food drive at the WPTV studios. We reported live from our parking lot as we encouraged viewers to stop by the studios and made a donation of non-perishable food items. We raised over 17,000 pounds of food in one day, and did several interviews along the way with many local agencies that feed the hungry and homeless in our community. Many agencies are seeing more and more children and families in desperate need. (various lengths - 4:30AM, 5AM, 6AM, 7AM, 8AM, 12PM, 5PM, 5:30PM and 6PM newscasts)
