Reports and interviews usually two to three minutes in length, which expand upon current problems and issues facing the community.

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/1/09 – With a tightening economy, local pawn shops are doing a big business in collateral loans. A state senate bill has capped small loans at a 36% interest rate, which seems like a lot of money but on small items and small loans the interest rate doesn't translate to a lot of money. However these small collateral loans are helping many people actually make ends meet. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/2/09 – Wall Street extended a four week rally on more good news about the economy. The surge of buying was fueled by an “accounting rule change” that could strengthen the banks’ balance sheets, as well as new efforts by world leaders to fight the financial crisis. The Dow Jones and the NASDAQ both climbed. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/3/09 – Colleges and Universities are concerned about the shaky economy. They are worried applicants may hesitate when it comes to commitment because money is tight. Many schools are now getting proactive by making personal phone calls, sending personal letters or even flying in admitted students. But community colleges could benefit from the cash crunch with their cheaper tuition rates. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 & 6 – 4/3/09 – Hawks along with many other native birds have a chance to fly again thanks to the Folke-Peterson Wildlife Center. Located in Wellington, this not-for-profit group provides care for sick, injured and orphaned Florida wildlife in a state of the art veterinary hospital. But now because of the economy, the center needs help to keep its doors open. The center is asking viewers to help volunteers, donate materials, and donate money. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/3/09 – The postal service is considering changes in our mail service to battle a budget deficit and a slumping economy. The service announced it plans to close three mail processing centers in Arizona, Indiana and West Virginia. The Postmaster has already told Congress the service might need to cut mail delivery from six days a week to five. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/6/09– Today in Tallahassee, Florida lawmakers will be adding up how much money the state could bring in by closing loopholes in the corporate tax code. Faced with a three billion dollar budget shortfall, the Senate Finance and Tax Committee has unanimously approved a measure to update the law. The loopholes were written into the law in the 1970's in order to attract corporations to the state. In this economy same lawmakers sat it's time to bring the law into the new millennium. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/3/09 – Because of steady demand for more meals, a local soup kitchen recently expanded its kitchen facility. Each day volunteers hand out at least 500 hot meals from Lake Worth to Boynton Beach. As needy families increase in this tough economy, the group is growing desperate for support and donations. The soup kitchen also provides resources for parents like training, diapers and other supplies for young children. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/9/09 – In a tough economy, it's no surprise that many people are having trouble maintaining their swimming pools. But abandoned and neglected pools aren't just unsightly; they could very well put a family at risk. The health risks and safety issues mount when a pool is abandoned or not maintained. Mosquito larva and the dangers of an empty (or half filled) pool pose big trouble for families with small children. (1-2 minutes in length -12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/9/09 – After two years of bad news, the President says there's good news on the economy. The long dead housing market may be coming back, even in the hardest hit areas. And Wells Fargo's CFO says the bank, which received \$25 billion dollars will report record first quarter earnings. That information helped send markets soaring today with the Dow up more than 246 points. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/16/09 – The economy is lagging so badly along the Treasure Coast that renters may soon be able to call the shots. Right now there are apartment specials that give two months free rent, and no application fees to get vacant units filled. Local newspapers say apartments and condos with ocean views are more affordable than ever. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/19/09 – St. Lucie County may get a shot of adrenaline to boost its economy. County Commissioners voted on two proposals to change the County's bidding process. One ordinance would allow businesses the opportunity to match a bid submitted by a non-local business within 5% of the non-local bid. The other gives the County power to change the bidding process for stimulus projects designated by the board. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/22/09 – Another victim of the bad economy are weddings. Turns out a growing number of brides and their families are downsizing the invitation lists. A new Bloomberg survey says three-quarters of all upcoming weddings have reduced the number of guests, especially for receptions because of the high costs. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/22/09 – The economy has taken a turn for the worse along the Treasure Coast. It's so bad, that St. Lucie County leaders have declared a state of economic emergency. That declaration is similar to ones that follow natural disasters like hurricanes. It frees up funds and encourages spending on improvement projects. At this point, the county is not using their emergency reserves saved for disasters to pay for economic stimulus. The millions of dollars will come from bed taxes and impact fees among other sources. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/1/09 – Florida's Education Commissioner expects a decision today on whether schools will receive stimulus money. The state is counting on about \$2.2 billion dollars for schools. Without the cash, they will face steep cuts. The U.S. Secretary of Education must approve a waiver in order for schools in our state to qualify for that cash. The State Education Commissioner says he is confident Florida will receive that waiver. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/7/09 – Governor Charlie Crist has no shortage of reading material. Parents, teachers and students have sent him more than 1,000 letters and e-mails demanding an end to cuts in education. They might pay a price to get their wish. The Governor is considering a penny sales tax increase to fund schools, and the idea is getting support from around the state. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/8/09 – Kids in schools in Palm Beach County came home today talking about their teachers wearing bandages in class. The County's Teacher Association is urging all teachers to wear facial bandages today, as well as red clothing, as a way of showing that state cuts to education can hurt. The County may have to eliminate pay raises next year if more cuts come. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/23/09 – This morning the Presidents of Florida's 11 state universities will talk about the proposed budget for higher education. Meanwhile Florida hasn't submitted its application for a waiver to pull down \$2 billion federal education dollars. The U.S. Dept. of Education is waiting on the state to get the ball rolling. (1-2 minutes in length - 10:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 4/28/09 – More than 100 jobs are being cut from Indian River County School System. They include 59 teachers and 47 support staff. The number could vary depending on what the Florida legislature does next month, but Indian River County could be looking at an \$8 million dollar loss next year. (1-2 minutes - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2– 5/5/09 – Roughly one out of seven college students may be over-paying to finance their education. The number of students who took out private loans to pay for school doubled this year. Private loans have high interest rates and inflexible payment plans. Students might wish to fill out a “FAFSA” application that would open the door to federal loans, grants and subsidized interest payments. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 5/20/09 – It will cost teachers more money to take their certification exams. The state Board of Education voted for an increase. Starting September 1st, the fees will be doubled to \$100 for each of the three tests. That is just eight months after they were raised from \$25 to \$50. The new fees are expected to generate more than \$8 million dollars. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 5/21/09 – The Florida Dept. of Education released F-CAT scores for third grad reading and math. While Palm Beach and Saint Lucie County scores lagged a bit, Martin County did better than the state average. The reading section is critical for third graders, who could be held back if they do not score at least 200 points out of a possible 500. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 –5/26/09 – A news conference was held in Palm Beach County to discuss the economy and education. Congressman Robert Wexler, Palm Beach County School Superintendent Art Johnson, and Palm Beach County School Board Chairman Bill Graham will talk about how the economic stimulus package will impact the County’s schools. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 6/16/09 – Florida State University is cutting \$56 million from its budget. To make ends meet, the school may layoff 200 employees and cut programs. And the students are feeling cheated. The tuition keeps rising, the Bright Futures scholarships are reduced, and departments and classes are taken away. And it’s not FSU. Three consecutive years of budget cuts have hurt all of Florida’s universities. An education activist says that the state will be paying for the cuts for years to come. (1-2 minutes in length -12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 & 1 –4/6/09 – Nursing homes are concerned that the care seniors expect could be curtailed if lawmakers follow through with proposed spending cuts. Senior advocates and nursing home workers gathered at the state capitol today urging the Senate to leave funding alone. One proposal chops \$81 million dollars from a Medicaid that helps fund nursing homes. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/10/09 – Most American teens aren't getting an annual physical. Researchers followed the medical history of 8,500 teens to see how many were getting their recommended check-ups. They found only 38% visited a doctor for a routine exam in the past year. It is recommended teens see a doctor every year to learn about dental care, health eating, exercise and other health and safety issues. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 & 1 – 4/17/09 – Many Americans trying to survive the recession are willing to take a bite out of their savings for their children's health care and in some cases dentists are helping bridge the gap. Some are waiving costs for X-rays, letting patients stretch out down payments, and being flexible on installments. Parents should not be afraid to ask their medical or dental providers for this financial flexibility. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/28/09 – The CDC is testing a 17 year old patient from Delray Beach for possible swine flu. But it will be days before the results are back. Meanwhile officials are urging viewers to learn about the virus but not panic. A representative from the Palm Beach County Health Department walked viewers through the steps of what actions and pre-cautions will be taken should the Delray case in fact be one of Swine Flu. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/11/09 – President Obama is expected to get a big boost in his effort to reform the nation's health care system. Hospitals, insurance companies, drug makers and doctors are offering a \$2 trillion dollars in spending reductions over the next ten years to provide medical insurance to all Americans. The full details of the plan will be released later. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 & 1 – 5/22/09 – Across our area and throughout the state, there is a glimmer of optimism that we may be turning the corner on the recession. For the first time in nearly three years the state's unemployment rate has fallen to 9.6%. That's down two tenths of a percentage point from March. While that's not huge, it is the first decrease in quite some time. Economists say in order to establish a trend the unemployment rate would have to continue to decrease over the next three months. The construction industry leads in number of jobs lost, while jobs in private education and health care are growing faster than any other sectors in the state. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/28/09 – As the economy worsens, local non-profit organizations say they're taking a hit but a new fundraising campaign promises to change that. Clinics like the Community Health Center of West Palm Beach offer emergency care to people who can't afford traditional care. But with more than 275,000 local people without health insurance, the Center is struggling to meet demand. They have organized a "Safety Net Challenge" that will run through the end of May and it hopes to raise \$2 million dollars. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/30/09 – The health insurance crisis has gripped this nation from America's smallest towns all the way to the White House. Along the way millions are facing tough choices and it is hitting home here on the Treasure Coast. A local newspaper just completed a series of reports called "A Doctor's Day" detailing among many issues the lack of primary care doctors to go around. The series looked at how bad the problem is what caused it and what the solutions might be. (1-2 minutes in length -8:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –6/1/09 – Congress is back after a week-long recess for Memorial Day, and job number one is to enact sweeping health care reforms. The Senate Health Committee and the Senate Finance Committee are both taking up the issue of universal health care. Health care reform was a large part of President Obama's campaign effort. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 6/2/09 – One of the big issues in medical care today is the nurses. Not the quality of care they provide but rather the lack of nurses to provide that care. Hospitals all over the area are struggling to provide enough nurses. Many have very active recruitment programs in countries overseas to encourage young women to come to this country and learn nursing and get jobs. The lack of nursing care has caused many hospitals to pull back on services and trauma care. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 6/22/09 – When prescriptions add up to over \$2,700 a year, seniors have to pay thousands out of pocket until Medicare kicks in. But Washington is working on a plan to help. President Obama says drug companies are putting an \$80 billion dollar solution to help cover the gap. The drug companies' plan gives seniors a 50% discount on prescriptions when they are in the gap before Medicare pays. The Democrats want to have a healthcare reform bill in place by the end of July, but Republicans are cringing at what may be a cost of over a trillion dollars. (1-2 minutes in length –11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 & 1 – 4/2/09 – The St. Lucie County Sheriff's Dept. needs viewers' help finding the suspect in an arcade robbery. It happened outside the Famous Spin-Win Arcade in Fort Pierce. Police say the arcade employee stepped out on the porch at about 10:30PM and the thief grabbed her and made off with \$150 dollars. Petty crimes like this are getting more frequent and robbers are getting bolder. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –4/5/09 – A coalition of 15 churches and ministries from West Palm Beach gathered for a rally outside the Coleman Community Center in Dunbar Village to revitalize this neglected community. More than 100 volunteers put on gloves to clean and repair the surrounding building and home. The Christian Prayer and Action Coalition formed after the brutal rape and assault of a mother and her son in 2007. Surveillance cameras and guards are now in place and officials report that crime is down, but last July a three-year-old became a victim of a bloody attack. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 4/9/09 – The trial is underway for the man charged with sexually assaulting an 8 year-old and leaving her close to death in a Lake Worth dumpster. Milagro Cunningham's attorney admits his client committed the crime, but is asking the jury to find him insane. A plea deal of 25 years was rejected by the judge last year. If convicted, Cunningham faces life in prison. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –4/12/09 – The State's top law enforcement agency is facing some significant funding cuts. Lawmakers are debating cutting the budget of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement by 10% to 15%. That could force the agency to close most of its field offices across the state. The good news is South Florida agencies can already handle high profile cases. The Sheriff's offices in Palm Beach, Broward and Miami-Dade counties already have experts on staff and sophisticated crime labs. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 4/15/09 – Cops are now using the web to communicate. A growing number of police departments are using Twitter and other social networking sites to get messages out to consumers. Some departments use Twitter's short text message format to warn of traffic problems or why they're in certain neighborhoods. Others offer crime prevention tips and ask for leads on specific crimes. Even the FBI is on Twitter. They have 2,000 followers. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 4/25/09 – Smuggling illegal immigrants into Florida is not against state law, but the House has unanimously passed a bill to change that. While human smuggling is a federal crime, state and local law enforcement officers cannot make an arrest. That's allowed suspects to get away before federal agents can arrive. The bill passed yesterday would permit state and local officers to arrest smugglers and charge them with a first degree misdemeanor. The likely scenario is they would then be turned over to federal authorities. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 5/31/09 – A local man was a victim of crime as he and some friends stopped at an ATM in Lake Worth. Surveillance video shows a man wearing a mask approached the local man in his car in the early hours of the morning. He robbed all the car's occupants. When the victim drove off to a nearby mall to report the crime he was followed by the robber in a stolen car. That's when the robber shot the victim three times. The victim was lucky to survive the attack, and very unhappy that what started as a robbery could have ended tragically. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/22/09 – The U.S. Supreme Court today decided whether a city that scrapped its admittance test to its firefighters unit once no black applicants qualified was an act of reverse discrimination. The justices quizzed attorneys on whether their arguments would be the same if the results were flipped and all those who qualified for the promotions were minorities. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 4/30/09 – Palm Beach County Commissioner Addie Greene has retired after nine years on the commission seat. Through the years she has helped projects geared towards children including helping Gramercy Park with a community center. Now she is embarking on a new life with the Palm Beach County Caucus of Black Elected Officials. Governor Charlie Crist will decide on her successor. Four African Americans have applied for the position. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 5/26/09 – A local political activist is asking the American Civil Liberties Union and the Justice Department to investigate what he calls a conspiracy by the City of West Palm Beach to take property from poor property owners. The activist says West Palm Beach has been systematically slapping tens of thousands of dollars in code violations on people's homes, essentially forcing them to sell the property to the city for close to nothing. He says the Community Redevelopment Agency should instead be using funds to help people improve their property. Wealthier land owners are left alone, while minorities are being targeted. (1-2 minute in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 6/25 /09 – In breaking news that was confirmed from California, singer, songwriter and performer, Michael Jackson died. As one of the most iconic music stars of the last 40 years and a hero in the African American community, the public outpouring of grief across the country and across the world was tremendous. An investigation and autopsy into what caused him to die at the age of 50 is underway. (4-5 minutes in length 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/8/09 – Scientists from the NOAA’s fisheries service in Miami have been carefully tracking Biscayne Bay dolphins. And while there’s no immediate emergency, there’s concern about the dolphins’ long term viability. They found that flame retardant is 300% higher in downtown dolphins than in others nearby. PCBs are two times higher and DDT is five times higher than other nearby dolphin pods. Flame retardants are used in all kinds of fabrics as well as computers and circuitry. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/14/09 – A new solar powered generator is now available on the market and its popularity may be growing in large part because of how quietly it operates. While the generator, which uses three solar panels can power you house for weeks, it cannot power the whole house, only appliances such as a refrigerator or televisions. Larger drains of power such as air conditioning units or water heaters still require smaller stationary units. The fact that this solar generator is very quiet is appealing because most generators are loud and annoying. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/3/09 – Vice President Joe Biden swore in Eric Holder at the Justice Department. Holder is the first African-American to hold the job of top law enforcer. The new Attorney General has pledged to reverse what were widely seen as Bush Administration efforts to politicize the department. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/24/09 – A new stamp will be unveiled today in honor of Black History month. The Civil Rights Pioneers stamp will be presented at the West Palm Beach main post office. The postal service honors twelve African-American leaders on this 100th anniversary celebration of the NAACP. The Civil Rights Pioneers stamp went on sale nationwide over the weekend. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 2/24/09 – One out of every five Floridians is African American. However, Blacks make up about half of the state’s prison population. A coalition of lawmakers, department heads, and civil rights activists are looking for ways to reduce that percentage. The panel says Florida could help by hiring more African American teachers and promoting responsible fatherhood. It also suggests re-instituting mandatory health classes and better access to vocational training. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/22/09 – People all over the world celebrate Earth Day by bicycling, recycling, pitching smart grid technology, and even Disney Nature is premiering its first film “Earth” in theaters nationwide. And Disney promised to plant a tree for every ticket purchased during the weekend. More and more people are finding ways to be sensitive to the environment and incorporate positive behaviors such as recycling. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 5/3/09 – Martin County commissioners will consider an agreement that could bring a Reclaimed Water System to the area. The city of Stuart and South Martin Regional Utility would take deep-well injected water as a way to save money and help the environment. If approved the Reclaimed Water Facility could be completed in late 2010. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 5/16/09 – Coral Cove Park in Tequesta is helping give back to the environment. A beach clean-up is underway to support the Perry Institute for Marine Science. Coral Cove Park is located in Jupiter, and is a great learning resource for young people who want to learn more about the environmental sciences. (1-2 minutes in length – 10:00AM)

THESE PROGRAMS FEATURE PROMINENT NEWSMAKERS ON A NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL LEVEL, OR AS FICTIONAL DEPICTIONS OF CURRENT TOPICS.

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 4/16/09 - The installment of the Dr. Phil program spoke about the new trend of “sexting” which is putting young teens at risk. While many young girls feel they need to do this to keep a boyfriend interested, many young boys are facing sex offender charges for forwarding such material over the Internet. A young girl committed suicide once a nude photo that she sent was distributed across the Internet. Dr. Phil and two experts answer audience questions and give guidance on how to handle this should it occur in their family. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 5/15/09 – This Dr. Phil show dealt with the latest trends in teen addiction and dangerous behavior. Nutmeg, candy, cough medicine, air fresheners all sound like common household products, but teens may actually be abusing them. One couple that was featured on the program spoke about how they initially looked the other way when their son started smoking crushed candy and then snorting powdered drink mix. They feel this led to his marijuana use. A doctor who works with addiction was on the program. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –6/1/09 – On this Dr. Phil show the subject of killer texting was discussed. A number of very serious and fatal accidents have occurred across the country on public transportation due to the operator texting personal messages while operating the bus or train. Distracted drivers are causing accidents all over the country, this program looked at the dangers texting poses and what kinds of legislation could be imposed against it, particularly in public transportation. (60 minutes in length 3:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 4/2/09 – This Oprah Winfrey program featured money expert Suze Orman giving advice on how to survive the recent economic downturn. With 15 jobs lost every minute and 10,000 houses foreclosed every day, this is the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. Suze gives strong advice and practical steps to not only survive but to thrive in this environment. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 4/22/09 – This Oprah Winfrey show was dedicated to Earth Day and looking at what steps viewers could take to do their part to protect the environment. The show followed trash from the time it leaves your home to where it actually ends up. Third generation explorer Fabien Cousteau showed what is happening in our oceans. The program ended with showing viewers how to go green and save money in their homes. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM /NEED 1 – 5/20/09 – This installment of the Oprah Winfrey show looked at what audience members thought they could live without. This program posed a challenge between two families to live for one week without cell phones, computers, television sets and other must-have electronic devices. The show followed up with the families' weeks later to see how they make use of their time and how much they've incorporated the gadgets back into their lifestyles. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 6/18/09 – This Oprah Winfrey program featured reporter Lisa Ling exploring how the downward spiraling economy is causing tent cities of homeless people to emerge all over our country. The cameras follow a family that went from living in a condo and driving a Lincoln Navigator a year ago to sleeping in homeless shelters and carrying all their possessions around in a garbage bag. Then viewers heard from a woman who was making \$70,000 a year and is facing eviction. (60 minutes in length 4:00PM)
