Reports and interviews usually two to three minutes in length, which expand upon current problems and issues facing the community.

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/1/12 – The report came today that we could see an end to a nearly 3 month decline in gas prices. US crude jumped by \$7.27 on Friday ending the week at \$84.96. The state average is holding at around \$3.13 a gallon and that's still lower than the national average of \$3.38. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/2/12 – If your vacation is looking a little empty these days try putting your getaway on layaway. Travel agencies are now offering layaway options including the retailer – Sears. The company just launched Sears Vacations for customers. Consumer watchdogs say it can be a smart option if you're looking to take a holiday. But they say watch out for additional fees, and try not to put payments on a credit card. (1-2 minutes in length - 4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/2/12 – Its a staple of any Fourth of July barbeque, but this holiday it could be looking a little weak. High heat and dry conditions across the Midwest are adding concerns over the corn crop. The forecast is offering little relief and little rain for now. Growers say the next two weeks are critical for the growth of the vegetable used in everything from cereal and sweeteners to animal feed and ethanol. (1-2 minutes in length –6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/3/12 – Shoppers get excited! The new Palm Beach Outlet Mall is going to start taking shape. A site contractors' fair will be held Monday. The contractors will give the outlets the look and feel of the Palm Beaches with landscaping, paving and more. At least 80 stores are expected to open in October of 2013. It is expected to create up to 1600 jobs, a big boost to our local economy. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/5/12 – New numbers show automakers continue to see a big boost in the number of new car sales. Almost 1.3 million cars were sold last month. That's a 22% jump from just a year ago. The big three automakers all posted increases. Chrysler saw a 20% gain for the month. If sales stay at this rate, it could be the auto industry's best year since 2007. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/6/12 – The latest job numbers are in and they show the economy is still struggling. 80,000 jobs were created, but that's not enough to lower the employment rate below 8.2%. Analysts are dissecting the numbers while politicians are talking about them. (1-2 minutes in length – 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/9/12 – More signs that our state is among the worst struggling with home foreclosures. New reports show we lead the country in forced-placed insurance premiums over the past 3 years. Force-placed insurance protects lenders against possible losses on property they've loaned money for. But the practice has drawn scrutiny in the past because the prices are usually much higher than policies sold directly to consumers. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/13/12 – More homes are being built across the country. The commerce department reports new home construction is up nearly 30% from a year ago. While these numbers are promising, economists say increased new home construction is in its early stage, and is still less than it was in the decade prior to the housing crash. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/18/12 – Lake Worth's property tax rate will not increase for the next budget year. City Commissioners agreed to keep the maximum property tax rate at \$5.46 per thousand dollar taxable value. The property tax rate does not include a separate levy by Palm Beach Fire Rescue that Lake Worth homeowners must pay. (1-2 minutes in length – 4:30AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/31/12 – The Delray Beach City Commission are meeting today to try to figure out how to plug a \$4 million budget shortfall. Right now commissioners are discussing whether to increase the milage rate or institute a fire fee on taxpayers. That fee could range from 70 to 80 dollars per household. A vote will take place on Friday. (5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 8/1/12 – “Geek-Squad” counters at local Best Buy stores could look a lot emptier in the coming days. Today 650 jobs are being cut from all stores nationwide. The layoffs are part of the company's plan to restructure operations and trim \$800 million dollars in costs. There is no word yet on exactly how many workers in Florida are being laid-off. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 –8/5/12 – With the Summer Olympics in full swing it's an exciting time to be in London. But some Brits want to get as far away as possible from the hustle and bustle of the games. And London's loss is Florida's gain! Several tourist spots have seen an influx of British visitors since the start of the summer Olympics. Local businesses say they certainly appreciate the majesty of the Olympics and the indirect economic boon. (1-2 minutes in length - 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 8/21/12 –The Sunshine State is among the top spots for this year's Labor Day travel. New hotels and airfare deals have lifted South Florida to sixth on Travelocity's Favored Destinations for Labor Day. Orlando ranks highest in the state coming in third on the countdown. Labor Day weekend is typically a time when hotels and travel companies offer specials to increase business. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 8/30/12 – Credit card debt is falling, as fewer Americans pay with plastic. The Federal Reserve Bank of New York says total credit card balances have dropped more than 22% since their peak in 2008. That is just over \$670 billion dollars in outstanding credit card debt. Credit checks also fell in the second quarter of this year - that's a sign of slower demand. One kind of debt is up – that's auto loans. Car buyers borrowed \$13 billion dollars in the quarter, and new car sales were up 16%. (1-2 minutes in length -12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 –7/9/12 –In Jacksonville, the worst tuberculosis outbreak in 20 years was kept a secret. According to an April 5th report by the Center for Disease Control 13 deaths and 99 illnesses were linked to TB. This came at a time when Governor Rick Scott signed a bill that shrank the Department of Health and closed the A.G. Holley State Hospital in Lantana - the state's only TB hospital. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 –7/9/12 – We all know smoking is bad for your health, and in one local city it could also be bad for your career. The city of Delray Beach is considering whether it will still offer jobs to people who admit they're smokers. For the city of Delray it is all about the cost of health insurance and health. City staffers say smokers cost the average organization \$12,000 a year in insurance and disability. The city is charged with balancing the budget and this is one way to do so. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 7/10/12 – The Republican-led House is debating legislation to repeal President Obama's healthcare reform law. The House is moving forward with what is essentially a show vote – but it is an important show for the GOP in this election year. The House is brushing aside the Supreme Court decision upholding the law. Senate Democrats are sure to shoot down any repeal. (1-2 minutes in length – 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 7/13/12 – Seven states including Florida are still trying to block part of the federal health care law that requires contraception coverage. They're continuing with their lawsuit despite the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that upheld most of the law. Seven attorneys general are challenging the rule, which they say violates the rights of religious groups that object to contraceptives. Constitutional law experts say it isn't a frivolous lawsuit, noting recent Supreme Court rulings showed sympathies for religious organizations being burdened by government. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 7/23/12 – Should all children get tested for high cholesterol? Doctors are still debating that question months after the government-appointed panel recommended widespread screenings that would lead to prescribing medicine for kids. The panel recommends that all U.S. children should get blood tests as early as age nine and that testing should begin much earlier for kids at risk of future heart disease including those with diabetes or a family history of heart problems. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 8/3/12 – An investigation is underway within the Palm Beach County Health Department after it was discovered an employee was allegedly collecting patient names and social security numbers for fraudulent use. Letters were sent from the County Health Department notifying close to two hundred people that their identity might have been stolen. The county says at least one of their employees is to blame but there could be more. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 8/8/12– Seven residents have been indicted on a healthcare scam in St. Lucie County. More than \$210,000 was embezzled from Policy Studies Inc. The company provides health and human services programs. One of the programs offered affordable care for children in Georgia. Each suspect is being charged with one count of conspiracy and 64 counts of mail fraud. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 8/29/12 – The flooding in our area leaves us at risk for mosquitoes, but Palm Beach County plans to stop the bugs before they develop. An aerial spraying is set for next weekend to halt the mosquito eggs from hatching. The eggs normally develop within 10 days to two weeks. The County Health Department plans to monitor mosquito traps in order to keep track of the threat. Permanent water mosquitoes have the potential to transmit diseases. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 –9/29/12 – The Palm Beach County Health Department says Boca Raton's Water Utility Department is violating state water safety statutes and it has been doing so for years. The Department of Health filed the notice of violations with five counts. One suggests waste water could be mixing with drinking water at nine or more points in the system. The Assistant City Manager of Boca Raton says that is absolutely not true and that corrections to the water system are complete. The Health Department says there is no reason to panic but changes need to be made. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –7/2/12 – Police, along with the State’s Attorney’s Office are looking for the thief who robbed two local prosecutors. The women were held at gunpoint outside Okeechobee Steak House in West Palm Beach, a landmark restaurant where many Sheriff’s employees like to eat. According to investigators the suspects took off with their wallets before leaving in a gold sedan. Neither of the women was injured, and the Sheriff’s office is putting their mug shots on Facebook to see if anyone recognizes them. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –7/10/12 – A man was killed last night in Belle Glade and three others were injured. This is the second murder in the area in a number of days. Investigators believe the shootout was gang related but they are having a tough time getting witnesses to come forward. They also are having the same problem with a Sunday morning shooting that left a young woman dead. A beloved grocery store owner was shot and killed down the street earlier in the year. The community is becoming known from the killing and crime, and not just the poverty and agriculture. (1-2 minutes in length - 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 –7/15/12 – Tomorrow marks one year since a Port St. Lucie teenager allegedly murdered his parents then threw a party. 18 year-old Tyler Hadley was charged with two counts of second degree murder for the bludgeoning deaths of his parents at their family home. Hadley threw a party during which he reportedly showed the bodies to a friend, who called Crime-stoppers. Hadley could go on trial sometime around Christmas. This murder and the nonchalance of the teenager shook the quiet, suburban community who knew the parents as hard working people. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 7/31/12 – Some State Troopers went back to school today at the Palm Beach County Sheriff’s Office. Crime Scene Investigators taught a two hour lesson on fingerprinting and DNA swabbing. FHP covers crimes on the highways and interstates. The Agency has regularly turned to Florida Department of Law Enforcement for all crime-scene fingerprints and DNA but sometimes PBSO’s aren’t available. So they hope to establish new lessons with fresh ties for interagency support. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 8/1/12 – The City of West Palm Beach’s Police Department doesn’t have hard numbers but it’s officers say several things have helped bring the crime rate down. One of the reasons is a greater presence of police, more neighborhood involvement and more lighting up and down Tamarind Avenue which is in the heart of the urban community. The City Commission is expected to sign off on new street lights as early as the following Monday. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 8/3/12– A child sex crime sting in Lake County has led to 26 arrests. Detectives say the men came looking for sex with a 13 year-old girl. Investigators posed as a child in various internet chat rooms, then gave the suspects the address to a vacant home. Authorities say one of the men is a sergeant in the Air Force, another drove all the way from Georgia. Most of the men have bonded out of jail. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 8/9/12 – Tonight Palm Beach Gardens Police Department will host their National Night Out Against Crime. The event, designed to raise crime and drug prevention awareness, will be held at the Municipal Complex on Burns Road. Night Out Against Crime will be in conjunction with Gardens Summer Market Nights. The free event is sponsored by the National Association of town Watch and will kick-off at 5:30PM. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 8/22/12 – The Boca Raton Police Department says it's beaten back a rise in crimes that plague neighborhoods. Burglaries, car break-ins and loitering are the crimes. They're making leads and their efforts appear to be paying off. Police have made a rogues gallery of the 41 suspects they've captured since operation neighborhood watch started in May. But many of these suspects have already been released from custody and police wonder when they'll strike again. (1-2 minutes in length – 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 9/3/12 – The investigation continues into a deadly shooting at a sweet sixteen party in Riviera Beach. The incident happened just before midnight on Saturday at the Riviera Beach Marina. The City's Mayor, Thomas Masters is urging the shooters to turn themselves into police. Two teenage boys were killed and six other party-goers were injured during the shooting. This is just the most recent shooting of many young people in Riviera Beach recently. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 9/6/12 – Two suspicious incidents at Publix's ATMs have Boynton Beach Police asking questions. Snapshots of both men were shown to the viewers – one recorded from the ATM camera and again from a nearby store security camera. The other, an alleged "Credit Card Skimmer" was spotted at the ATM outside the store. Both of the men pictured wore eyeglasses. Police are looking into whether the same person was involved in both incidents. (1-2 minutes in length 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 3 – 9/10/12 – Belle Glade City Commissioners are once again looking into imposing a curfew. The city has taken the idea to the Palm Beach County Sheriff's office, which is looking at youth crime statistics for the city. The move comes as the city deals with several high-profile deadly shootings from earlier this year. Details of the curfew have not been figured out. The mayor says that it won't happen until the Palm Beach County Sheriff's office tells them what they legally can enforce. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 –7/2/12 – A local newspaper, The Palm Beach Post is helping the community by donating truckloads of items to Gulfstream Goodwill Industries. The Post is making a sizable donation - a truckload of no longer used equipment. The donation includes printers, fax machines, furniture, keeps the donation local and green. Rather than putting all of this equipment into a landfill it will go to good use in the community. Sales revenue will go towards multiple programs that assist people across the five countries in which Gulfstream Goodwill serves. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 8/5/12 – An architecture and engineering company out of Delray Beach is the first “Certified B” corporation in South Florida. “B” companies aim to use the power of business to social and environmental problems. Sequil Systems earned the certification for advising contractors and engineers on how to create projects that are as environmentally sound as possible. (1-2 minutes in length -5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 8/4/12 – Hundreds of people formed a human chain along Florida beaches today, in an effort to protest offshore drilling and environmental destruction. The “Hands Across the Sand” event was one of several in South Florida and across the world raising awareness to clean energy alternatives and the need to fight oil dependency. Organizers say offshore drilling isn’t just a political issue each person has a direct impact on the environment. They are recalling for renewable energy policy at the state and federal levels. (1-2 minutes in length -11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 9/18/12 – The Florida Climate Institute is coming to our area. Florida Atlantic University is one of four universities joining the Institute. The plan is to develop new technologies to benefit the State’s economy and the environment. The institute is a joint venture created by the University of Florida and Florida State University. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 7/2/12 – The Moorings Club in Vero Beach is the first waterfront community on the Treasure Coast to sponsor the “Protect Wild Dolphins dock sign program. It’s an effort by Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute to protect Indian River Lagoon dolphins. The signs include facts about the species including their biggest threats and how you can help. Other communities and marinas are invited to join the effort. (1-2 minutes in length –5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 8/7/12 – Biologists say more Loggerhead turtles are choosing Jupiter Island as the place to nest. Biologists say the turtles like this area because it's so dark. As of that week, 6,440 endangered Loggerheads have made nests here along the 6.6 mile stretch of island. That's 70 % higher than last year's entire nesting season and we still have three months to go. Biologists say they're not sure what's causing the spike but it could be a number of things, including the recently re-nourished shoreline. Last summer a five mile stretch here had virtually no sand, now the turtles have up to 70 feet of beach. Also they say conservation efforts are finally paying off. (1-2 minutes in length –5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 4 – 8/17/12 – Some Vero Beach residents may soon be saving money on their water bill. The city council has approved a contract with Timothy Rose Contracting to construct a pump station for reuse of water. The water will be pumped from the main relief canal along 43rd Avenue and will then be treated and sent to reuse water customers. There is already a waiting list of 200 customers that want access to the reuse water for their lawns. (1-2 minutes in length – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM /NEED 4 – 8/20/12 – The Everglades restoration plans are taking shape and Palm Beach County is looking to add some of their waterways to the discussions. County Commissioners plan to meet with water managers to discuss a regional restoration plan that would include Lake Okeechobee, the Loxahatchee River and Lake Worth lagoon. The nearly \$900 million dollar deal for the Everglades, includes Mecca Farms helping to replenish the Loxahatchee River. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 7/2/12 – Riviera Beach Community Leaders say they are still waiting for their high school. The Palm Beach County School Board pledged to build one ten years ago and taxpayers have already contributed nearly ten million dollars for a planned forty-acre campus. School district authorities say the nearly one hundred million dollar project became a casualty of the recession and it currently "in limbo." (1-2 minutes in length – 4:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 7/9/12 – Three thousand parents contacted the state's temporary hotline with questions about FCAT 2.0. The hotline was up for about a month before being shutdown at the end of June. It was set up to help parents who had concerns about their students' FCAT scores. The Deputy Director of Education Relations for the Department of Education says the call center will be a key component as the state changes the way it tests and grades students. The hotline will be reactivated in mid-July when the Dept. of Education releases its school grades. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 7/11/12 – The newly released school grades that so many have been waiting for are finally in. The Board of Education recently changed the way grades would be measured. 89% of more than 2,500 public schools in Florida earned an “A”, “B” or “C” in this latest report. 11% earned a “D” or an “F.” Statewide the numbers are better than expected. There is a single “F” school in Palm Beach County. There were fewer “A” schools than a year ago, but more than twice as many “D” schools. The grades may not be as bad as they seem. (1-2 minute in length –5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 7/21/12 – Eleven Palm Beach County schools received the wrong grade this year. That’s because an error was made in calculating student learning gains. Grades will actually go up higher for schools and Palm Beach County School District will once again be “A” rated. Palm Beach County Schools Superintendent Wayne Gent was contacted by the State Department of Education yesterday with the news. (1-2 minutes in length 12:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 8/2/12 – Two thousand students are set to receive backpacks full of school supplies in Indian River County. The supplies will be handed out this week to kids at twenty seven public and charter schools. This year about \$30,000 was spent on the supplies, using donated funds from community members and organizations. (1-2 minutes in length –6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 8/16/12 – The Palm Beach County School District is entering their next phase to improve core curriculum. The common core state standard was introduced to kindergartners last year. But this year, the now-first-graders will continue to learn under the common core. The new standards dictate the level of education all Florida students are expected to have. By 2014, all state students are expected to learn under the common core standards. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 9/1/12 – The debate over charter versus public schools in Florida continues. Everyone from union leaders to former state governors is weighing in. The Florida Department of Education released a report in April that showed charter school students perform better. However that did not take into account that traditional schools service more low-income kids and students with learning disabilities. (1-2 minutes in length 5:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 9/5/12 – A controversial new ruling makes it illegal for Florida’s public universities and colleges to charge U.S. born students “out-of-state” tuition rates if their parents are in the country illegally. This could affect thousands of students. A federal judge in Miami claims the tuition policy violates the Constitution. Florida education officials say lawyer are reviewing the ruling and no decision has been made on whether to appeal. (1-2 minutes in length - 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 9/9/12 – Governor Rick Scott is starting a tour of the state during which, he will be listening to teachers, students and parents as they share their ideas on how to improve Florida’s education system. The Governor says he wants to hear education stakeholders voice their ideas on how to improve the education in Florida. The Governor will also be blogging about each day’s event. As the Governor visits different schools, a student film crew will document the event on video which will be posted on the Governor’s blog as well. (1-2 minutes – 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 7/16 /12 – The state is claiming victory in a year-long battle for access to a federal database that will help prevent non-citizens from voting. The federal government agreed to let Florida use a Department of Homeland Security database to challenge the names on voting rolls. The database lists people who are legally in the U.S. on either visas or “green cards,” but not eligible to vote. The Division of Elections will still have to develop its policy before it can begin checking names and that could take weeks. Opponents of a voter purge believe the state’s efforts are to discourage minorities from voting in November. That’s a claim the state refutes. (1-2 minutes in length -6:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 7/26/12 – Florida Atlantic University has been ranked one of the top 100, four-year colleges in the nation in producing undergraduate degrees for minorities. The newly released survey shows that FAU ranks 17th in the nation for conferring Bachelors degrees on to African-American students. And the school is 32nd in the nation for conferring Bachelors degrees on to Hispanic students. (1-2 minutes in length – 5:30PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 9/4/12 – A new report says minority groups are feeling the biggest impact of slow job creation in Florida. According to Florida International University’s Research Institute – blacks and Hispanics have the highest percentage of joblessness in the state. The report says because the state population is expected to increase the job market deficit is likely to continue to grow. (1-2 minutes in length - 6:00AM)

PROBLEM/NEED 6 – 9/17/12 – Researchers now say cancer is currently the number one killer among Hispanics living in the U.S. According to the American Cancer Society, cancer has now surpassed heart disease as the leading cause of death for those of Hispanic origin. The report says fewer Hispanics die from breast, lung, prostate and colorectal cancers than Caucasians and African Americans. But when it comes to cancers of the stomach, liver, cervix and gallbladder, the Hispanic mortality rates are much higher. (1-2 minutes in length 11:00PM)

PROBLEM/NEED 5 – 7/1/12 – An interview with the new Palm Beach County School Superintendent E. Wayne Gent revealed his plans for the District and the challenges he faces in funding cutbacks and expanding needs of the largest school district east of the Mississippi. PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 7/15/12 – State legislators Gayle Harrell and Mark Pafford discussed the Obama healthcare proposal, and the kinds of discussions that are happening on the national and state level about its viability. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 7/22/12 – This week's guests on To The Point were two local builders who looked at the current housing situation in South Florida and what the long term forecast is for growth in the state. Both men were candid about the setbacks and challenges the home building community has faced over the last few years. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 2 – 9/16/12 – An interview with the Director of Respect for Life, Catholic Diocese of Palm Beach and the head of Planned Parenthood of South Florida discussed the federal candidates and what their stances are on abortion and women's health issues. (30 minutes in length 10:00AM Sundays)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 8/16/12 – Impact 5: The Housing Crisis - An hour long prime time special, which was a town hall event at Port St. Lucie Civic Center, featuring six specialists in the housing field answering questions from the audience about the current state of the housing market in South Florida and what the future for housing might hold. (60 minutes in length 8:00PM Thursday)

PROBLEM/NEED 1 – 9/12/12, 9/19/12, 9/26/12, and 10/3/12 – Impact 5: The Housing Crisis – Each Wednesday for four weeks straight, we hosted a phone bank of professionals who could speak to the housing crisis and issues with foreclosures and short sales. The phone banks open in the early morning starting in our 5AM newscasts and were open until 9AM. Then they would be manned again starting at 4PM and going until 6:30PM answer the public's questions and directing people to services and agencies that could help them. Each time the phone banks opened the operators were busy the entire time answering calls. More than 100 calls each Wednesday were process through the 6 phone call bank. (5AM, 6AM, 7AM, 8AM, 4PM 5PM and 6PM newscasts – various lengths)
