## **Agriculture and Business**

A popular place to workout changed ownership. Newton Health and Fitness changed hands for the first time in 22 years in April. Meanwhile, Kendrick Buick-Cadillac-Nissan announced it would no longer sell GM vehicles. At the end of the month an area business got a bit of a scare, after a car crashed into it.

**April 16<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story Aired During 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration 2:00)**

One of Lafayette's oldest fitness centers is now under new ownership. Barry Newton handed over the reins this month after owning Newton Health and Fitness for 22 years. At age 65, he says it was time for him to retire.

Lafayette resident Marc Vaughn is the club's new owner. He says he was born and raised here, attended Purdue University and co-owns a janitorial service business with his wife. Now Vaughn says he has big plans for his new business.

**April 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 (Story Aired During 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :45)**

Kendrick Buick-Cadillac-Nissan Incorporated announces that it will no longer sell G-M vehicles. The company will change its name to Kendrick Nissan, Incorporated and focus all its efforts toward the Nissan franchise. The company's president, Marty Kendrick, filed arbitration in January to the non-renewal notice he was given after GM filed bankruptcy in June 2009.

**April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story Aired During Morning Broadcast 5 am – 7 am, Duration :30)**

A driver is behind bars after crashing into a business in downtown Lafayette. The accident occurred at 6th and Salem Streets last night. Police say a car was resting against the Varsity Clubhouse after it hit a vehicle westbound on Salem Street. Lieutenant Brad Bishop says the Varsity Clubhouse did not report any damage. No one was injured. Bishop says the driver of the vehicle that caused the accident was arrested on unrelated charges.

**April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story Aired During Morning Broadcast 5am – 7am, Duration :55)**

A Lafayette man has big plans for an empty restaurant, but he'll need your help to realize them. Andre Lucas wants to open up "The River," what he calls an upscale soup kitchen to feed those in need at the old Ryan's Steakhouse building on highway 52 in Lafayette.

Lucas, and many others are taking part in the Pepsi Refresh Project. Right now he's in 69th place, with votes from the public, he hopes to move up the leader board.

**June 15<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :50)**

In Benton County...homes, cars, and crops were destroyed in Monday night's storm. One farmer says he owns about 550 acres of land and 400 acres of crops were destroyed. Howard Sturgeon says a farming expert told him the best way to recoup some of the losses could be planting soy beans. But with all of the rain, Sturgeon says he wouldn't be able to do that for at least a week. Besides all of the crop damage, Sturgeon's barn was whipped-out thanks to straight-line winds of up to 100 miles per hour. He says he was thankful when neighbors came out to help him clean up the mess. Sturgeon wasn't the only farmer with crop damage.

According to the National Weather Service, more than 5-thousand acres of crops are lost because of hail in Benton County Monday night.

**June 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :30)**

A woman was rescued in Battle Ground yesterday, after her car was stranded in flood waters on North 9th Street. Three Tippecanoe County Sheriff Officers waded in the water to bring the woman to safety. In Clinton County, waters from the middle fork of the Wildcat Creek spread cross Edna Mills. About 14 homes and one business in that area were surrounded by water.

**June 25<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration 2:10)**

State Road 38 in Dayton closed more than a week ago but local business owners say there needs to be away to get though the construction. Ava Wilhite talked to owners with businesses who say this is affecting their business negatively.

**June 25<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration :50)**

Employees at Lafayette's Alcoa plant will not go on strike. Early this morning union members and the company agreed to a ratified contract that runs through 2014. Here's a breakdown of the numbers...339 employees voted "for" the ratified deal...123 were "against" it. USW Local 1-15-A President Jerry Misner says the negotiation was a grueling process.

## **CRIME**

Police say Mandy Newkirk-Denison allegedly took more than 14-thousand dollars from the softball league. A Klondike Elementary School teacher gets probation and community service. **April 8<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :25)**

A West Lafayette man is arrested for child pornography. Officers took 20-year-old Charles M Watts into custody. Lt. Troy Harris says a search warrant was served at Watts' home. Police say an investigation revealed child pornography on Watts' computer hard drive. Watts is charged with possession of child pornography. He was booked into the Tippecanoe County Jail.

**April 16<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :25)**

State Police arrest the former treasurer of the Greater Lafayette and Area Surrounding Girls Softball League. Police say Mandy Newkirk-Denison allegedly took more than 14-thousand dollars from the softball league.

Newkirk-Denison is being charged with three counts of Forgery , seven counts of Theft and one count of Money Laundering. She is being held in the Tippecanoe County Jail on a two-thousand dollar bond.

**April 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :40)**

A former Klondike Middle School teacher gets probation for a felony charge of possession of marijuana. Former health and wellness teacher James Page was in court today in Tippecanoe County. Judge Don Daniel sentenced Page to one year of unsupervised probation and 96 hours of community service. According to the Tippecanoe County Prosecutor's office, Page was arrested last September after Indiana State Troopers found 35 marijuana plants growing at the home of his friend Samuel Patterson. Page was found to have been assisting Patterson in growing the plants for personal consumption. Page pled guilty to a felony charge of Possession of Marijuana over 30 grams.

**May 15<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :35)**

A Chicago man faces two felony charges here in Tippecanoe County for allegedly using counterfeit money at a local Wal-Mart. According to court documents, 26-year-old Michael Quentin Neal paid for a notebook computer with six counterfeit one hundred dollar bills. The transaction took place on May 9th, about 20 minutes before midnight. The documents say the next day a woman came to the Wal-Mart on Veterans Memorial Parkway to try to return the laptop that was purchased with the counterfeit money. Police officers later connected the woman with Neal, as the mother of his daughter. Neal was arrested for forgery and theft, both felonies.

**May 16<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration 1:15)**

We're learning more information about the crash, in which the Tippecanoe County Sheriff says alcohol and drugs were a factor. According to Purdue Police Lieutenant Sarah Sheppard, 34-year-old Luis Gonzalez-Diaz had a blood alcohol content of point-one-seven at the time of the crash, around 3-30 this morning. Sheppard is the squad leader of the Lafayette Metro Fatal Alcohol Crash Team. She says Gonzalez-Diaz was arrested for "Operating a Vehicle While Intoxicated-Causing Serious Bodily Injury," "Operating a Vehicle While Intoxicated," and "Operating a Vehicle While Intoxicated-Endangering a Person."

**May 17<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :25)**

Logansport police make an arrest in the case where a four-year-old girl was raped. Police Chief AJ Rozzi says officers arrested 22-year-old William R Wilson. Police say he is not a register sex offender.

He moved to the Logansport area about two months ago. The girl was taken from her mother's boyfriend's house and then raped and beaten inside a garage about a block away. A neighbor found the girl alone near the corner of Plum Street and Linden Avenue.

**May 26<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :20)**

A man and woman have been arrested for several felony charges. Lafayette police Captain Bruce Biggs says police were called to 915 South 16th Street Sunday afternoon around 1-30 after a report of a stabbing. Biggs says Alena Terry was arrested for several felonies...including battery with a deadly weapon. LaShawn Allen was also arrested.

**May 27<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration :25)**

A Lafayette man is facing up to 50 years in jail for dealing drugs. Tippecanoe County Prosecutor Pat Harrington says 38-year-old Citron Stovall has been convicted of two counts of dealing cocaine, and one count of cocaine possession. Stovall was arrested in August of 2008 after officers found almost 13 grams of cocaine under the driver's seat of a car he was in. Stovall will be sentenced July 10.

**June 11<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :45)**

A former Purdue student is sentenced for his role in the shooting death of his friend last August. Tippecanoe County Prosecutor Pat Harrington says 23-year-old William Calderon, of Fort Wayne, pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of pointing an unloaded firearm. Calderon was arrested after 21-year-old Landon Siena was killed when Calderon's roommate Cory Lynch accidentally fired a gunshot that hit Siena in the neck.

The men say they had been drinking and playing pranks on each other. Harrington says Calderon received a one-year sentence, including 120 days in Allen County Community Corrections followed by probation and substance abuse counseling. Lynch was sentenced to two-years community corrections, probation, and substance abuse counseling in March.

**June 16<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration :40)**

A father and son are in jail today on drug charges. Kokomo police say Troy Welch and his son Justin Welch were arrested last night after a six month long drug investigation. Troy faces felony charges for cultivating marijuana, possession of marijuana over 30 grams, and maintaining a common nuisance. Justin faces a felony charge for possession of marijuana over 30 grams. They both face a misdemeanor count for possession of drug paraphernalia. Their bonds are set at ten thousand dollars.

**June 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :50)**

A man is sentenced after leaving the scene of a car accident where his passenger died. Tippecanoe County Prosecutor Pat Harrington says 38-year-old Mario Lopez of Honduras will serve five years in prison. Lopez was charged with leaving the scene of an accident resulting in death and property damage, and driving without a license. Lopez crashed a truck into construction equipment in October 2009 on State Road 43 near the I-65 overpass after returning from an Illinois car auction. 41-year-old Everardo DelReal of Boswell was pinned in the wreckage and later died. Harrington says Lopez fled into a near by cornfield because he didn't have a license and didn't want to get in trouble with the law. Lopez later was arrested when he went to an emergency room to have a cut on his face treated.

**June 25<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :20)**

No charges will be filed against a substitute Delphi Community High School nurse accused of having a relationship with a 17-year-old male student. 34-year-old Leah Abbott was arrested for five counts of child seduction in March. Special Prosecutor Kristen McVey from the Tippecanoe County Prosecutor's Office says evidence does not warrant the filing of a criminal charge.

**June 29<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 6 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:00)**

Two people are in critical condition after their vehicle catches fire. Tippecanoe County Deputy Jacob Amberger says 19-year-old Brookston resident Ashlee Roy was driving a green Chevrolet SUV on State Road 43 yesterday a little after six p-m. He says she was waiting to make a left turn when 23-year-old Lafayette resident Jared Manny rear ended Roy's SUV. Roy's SUV caught on fire and Roy and her passenger 29-year-old Brookston resident Alisa (Ah-LEE-Sa) Howe had to be pulled from the vehicle by passing motorist and Manny.

Roy and Howe were flown to St-Joseph Hospital in Fort Wayne, suffering from burns from fire. They are both in critical condition. Manny's passenger 20-year-old Clarks Hill resident Tucker Hayden was taken to St-Elizabeth, complaining of chest pain and is in satisfactory condition. Due to the severity of the injuries, the Lafayette fatal alcohol crash team was called in to investigate. Manny was arrested for operating a vehicle while under the influence of a controlled substance and taken to the Tippecanoe County Jail.

## **DIVERSITY**

**In May, Lafayette Urban Ministry announces \$2.1 million is raised to help offer 12 new programs. Also, the NAACP hosts a bowl-a-thon to raise money to start a youth chapter.**

**May 20<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during the 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration :55)**

Lafayette Urban Ministry is 80 percent of the way to its Campaign for the Future goal of two point eight million dollars. The two point one million dollars raised so far is helping LUM to offer 12 new programs, many of them starting this summer. The LUM achieve program will begin in August and help at risk eighth graders entering Jeff High School. Executive Director of LUM Joe Micon says several other programs will help provide financial literacy for low income families.

**June 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:00)**

A local organization is hosting a bowl-a-thon to raise money to start a youth chapter. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People or N-double-ACP is holding a fundraiser Saturday to start a youth group in Tippecanoe County. The proceeds will support children's activities and field trips. Chair for the Bowl-A-Thon Maurice McMillan says the fundraiser will bring people together for a good cause.

## EDUCATION

Money concerns continued to capture the headlines during the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter. Benton Community School Corporation teachers, along with several other area school corporations were laid off in the second quarter. Two former area teachers were in court for their respective indiscretions with students.

There was some good news on the education front also, as five middle and high school teachers were recognized for their contributions to education.

**April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :30)**

Tippecanoe County teachers were honored last night at the Golden Apple awards banquet. Five middle and high school teachers were recognized for their contributions to education. Three of the five teachers, more than half the award winners, are art or music educators. This was the first Golden Apple award for a Central Catholic teacher. Winners received one-thousand dollars.

The Golden Apple awards aired on WLFI Wednesday, April 28th at 7pm.

**April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration 1:05)**

Teachers in the Benton Community School Corporation will also see lay offs. It was a full house at the meeting last night, as parents, teachers and even two young students asked the school board to reconsider cutting back on art, music and physical education...and laying off nine of its teachers.

Sixth grader Hunter Rice decided to speak up and tell the Benton Community School board how she felt.

**April 21<sup>st</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration :40)**

Court hearings have been set for two former Twin Lakes School Corporation teachers and coaches accused of child seduction. Former wrestling coach and Special Education teacher Scott Hardy faces two felony counts of child seduction. A pre-trial conference in White County Superior Court has been scheduled for June 1.

Hardy's trial date has been set for June 22. Retired Twin Lakes football coach and former teacher Mark Hay will have an initial hearing in Howard County on May 19. State Police say Hay engaged in inappropriate conduct with a minor on school property during school hours from March 2007 through May 2009. Howard County prosecutor Jim Fleming has been assigned as special prosecutor for the case.

**May 18<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration :55)**

Purdue officials have suspended two fraternities placed another on probation for violating university regulations and Interfraternity Council Risk Management policies. Associate Dean of Students, Pablo Malavenda, says Pi Kappa Alpha and Delta Upsilon were cited for alcohol violations, and Omega Psi Phi was cited for hazing. In order to maintain university recognition, Pi Kappa Alpha and Delta Upsilon may not host or co-sponsor functions where alcohol is served during. The fraternities also must participate in alcohol education and leadership programs. The university's investigation of Omega Psi Phi concluded that the fraternity conducted hazing activities. The chapters also may not use university logos, trademarks or name; receive university funding; and are not be eligible for awards through Purdue, regional and national associations or the fraternities' national headquarters. Malavenda says the sanctions will extend through at least May 2, 2011.

**May 26<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :30)**

School corporations are being advised their 2011 budgets could include cuts like those seen in 2010. In a memo sent out to school corporations across the state, Indiana Department of Education Chief Financial Officer Lance Rhodes says IDOE is recommending schools beginning the 2011 budgeting process to quote "assume levels that represent percentage reductions similar to 2010 reductions."

The Indiana Department of Education will be holding a budget workshop in June about school finances.

Schools could know at that time how severe future cuts would need to be.

**June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration 2:20)**

It was the last day of school for one teacher in Cass County. Ava Wilhite tells us why George Knutson served almost half a century with Southeastern School Corporation. Children at Thompson elementary school have been shouting answers at Mr. Knutson for 49 years. In the fall he told students he would drop dead in his classroom before he would retire but, some recent events in the corporation changed his mind.

**June 10<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration 1:00)**

State Superintendent of Public Instruction says education budget cuts will help schools better target instruction. Tony Bennett spoke at the North White School Corporation school board meeting last night. The state cut many school districts' budgets almost five percent this year because of a revenue shortfall. And a recent memo from the Indiana Department of Education's Chief Financial Officer warns districts could face a similar cut next year.

Bennett says fewer educational dollars mean school corporations will be forced to put money towards what they identify as their core mission.

**June 16<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 6 o'clock broadcast, Duration 2:27)**

Lieutenant Governor Becky Skillman was at the state FFA convention at Purdue University today announcing a new partnership. Aaron Leedy caught up with the Lieutenant Governor to learn more about it, including her recent trip to China. Lieutenant Governor Skillman says Indiana FFA and Indiana State Department of Agriculture will be partnering thanks to a new leadership position. Skillman also commented on her recent trip to China.

**June 29<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration 1:00)**

I-STEP test results are in and Lafayette School Corporation superintendent Ed Eiler says he's pleased with his district's progress. Eiler says L-S-C's initial test results are slightly higher than the state average. But he says there are still areas where he'd like to see improvement. The district made many efforts to raise test scores. Miller Elementary underwent a major restructuring in order to improve scores to avoid being taken over by the state. Eiler says he's optimistic about the school's future.

## **HEALTHCARE**

The Lafayette area is under a high pollen alert in April. Also in the second quarter Purdue University announced it will make changes to healthcare and retirement benefits that affect both part and full-time employees. The university also announced it was trying to hire 50 people to help healthcare providers across the state.

**April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :50)**

The Lafayette area is under a high pollen alert, according to the National Weather Service. And, all that pollen is making people's allergies flare up. Unity Healthcare Allergy Doctor Ketan Sheth says more than 30 million Americans suffer from allergies. He says there are some ways you can make sure to feel your best, despite allergy season.

**April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:00)**

Local business owners now have a better understanding of the healthcare system, after a meeting this morning. "Impact of health care reform," was the title of Neil Pickett's program. Pickett talked about several important issues for business owners like: choice of provider, quality of care, and added cost. The Director of Health Policy and Analysis of Clarian Health Indianapolis says the language in the bill will be tough for business owners to navigate.

**May 12<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:00)**

Purdue University will make changes to healthcare and retirement benefits that affect both part and full time employees. University President France Cordova spoke at a part-time employee forum this afternoon. She says the university will be rebalancing retirement and medical benefits but there will be no elimination of benefits.

Cordova says the changes made will apply to all employees. The conclusion not to eliminate benefits came after internal study and an additional study performed by Hewitt. University Treasurer Al Diaz says the university does not know yet how much part time employees will contribute towards benefits.

**June 14<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:30)**

Purdue is trying fill 50 new positions to assist healthcare providers throughout the state. Back in February we reported on Purdue receiving 12 million dollars to assist healthcare providers across the state to switch from paper records to electronic. Now, the university is looking to fill 50 positions. Indiana Health Information Technology Extension Center Director Monica Arrowsmith says the employees will work in various roles helping Indiana healthcare providers implement electronic medical records. Arrowsmith says most of the positions will require a degree. People who are comfortable speaking and can learn new material are desired.

## **ROADS and TRANSPORTATION**

Mother Nature played a substantial role in transportation in the second quarter as flood waters make some area roads impassable. Road construction on Purdue's campus made commutes across campus difficult. And, Purdue students are helping those in the Third World go green by using materials already available to solve some tough problems in Africa. The car was built mainly out of wood.

**May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :50)**

Purdue students are helping those in the Third World go green by using materials already available to solve some tough problems in Africa. A group of mechanical engineering students built this mostly wooden truck to make transportation easier in rural Africa. It's called a basic utility vehicle or B-U-V. Students needed to use only materials available in that part of the world--mainly wood. It can hold up to eight people or 12-hundred pounds of materials. The group will travel to the western African country of the Republic of Cameroon to show villagers how to make the vehicle on their own.

**May 24<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration :45)**

Area drivers are being greeted by 'road closed' signs on Purdue's campus. More than 300 construction projects have drivers finding new routes around campus. Seven streets and several lanes are closed for construction. West Lafayette City Engineer Dave Buck says this construction season is an unusually busy one. He says the city is working with Purdue to keep traffic flowing.

**May 28<sup>th</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 11 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:20)**

A stretch of County Road 350 South officially has a new name. Lafayette Mayor Tony Roswarski cut the ribbon for Veterans Memorial Parkway this morning. He was joined by two World War Two veterans. Clarence Minniear served in the U-S Army and Betty Lutz Reed served in the U-S Coast Guard. Veterans Memorial Parkway stretches eight miles, from U-S 231 to State Road 26 East. The city of Lafayette recently completed a four-point-one million dollar project to widen a mile and half of the parkway into four lanes. The project also added a landscaped median with street lighting, as well as sidewalks and walking trails. Roswarski says he's proud to have the new name honor our local veterans.

**June 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during morning broadcast, Duration :25)**

Clinton County EMA director Darrell Sanders says the town is being evacuated due to high, rushing water. Sanders says the decision to evacuate came at nine o'clock this morning. He says residents are being taken to a staging area in Rossville by boat, truck and by Rossville school busses. INDOT shut down State Road 26 between Rossville and Edna Mills due to water washing over the roads.

**June 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during am broadcast, Duration :50)**

The intersection at Taft and Morehouse Roads was completely flooded by the early morning rain, rushing past this house. Albert Brewer has lived here for 50 years and says flooding like this is rare. Although many drivers attempted to cross the flooded roadways, the Tippecanoe County Sheriff's Department says it can be a deadly mistake.

**June 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2010 (Story aired during 5 o'clock broadcast, Duration 1:20)**

Many Tippecanoe County drivers found flooded roads on their way to work. Laura Kirtley has more on what drivers need to know about water-covered roads.
