60 MINUTES II:--Regularly scheduled one-hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Tuesday, 9:00-10:00 PM.

SUNDAY EDITION:--Regularly scheduled news interviews. Sunday, 6:30-7:00 AM.

FACE THE NATION--Regularly scheduled public affairs broadcast. Sunday, 10:30-11:00 AM.

COMMUNITY AND VOLUNTEERISM: Topics in this category include inspiring individuals and community relations.

NEWS 2 AT NOON: 1/31, "Hometown Hero" Correspondent Lisa Hill discussed the achievements of a community organization in Chinatown dedicated to helping introduce Asian American immigrants to mainstream America; 2/28, Correspondent Lou Young discussed how a woman in New Jersey has made a difference in the lives of hundreds of orphan children from around the world; 3/20, Correspondent Sukanya Krishman discussed how the advice of a former college basketball player has kept many local neighborhood children away from trouble; NEWS 2 SPECIAL REPORT: 3/3, "Fulfilling The Dream," Correspondent Dana Tyler discussed how as part of Black History Month, Channel 2 honored a group of extraordinary African Americans whose daily contribution to the community has gone largely unnoticed; SUNDAY EDITION: 3/24, Correspondent Marcia Kramer, New York City Deputy Mayor Joe Lhota and City Councilman Bill Perkins discussed police-community relations in New York City and the political exploitation of these issues.
