NEWS 2 THIS MORNING, AT NOON, FIVE, SIX and ELEVEN:--Regularly scheduled news broadcast focusing on the latest on current issues. Monday-Friday.

60 MINUTES:--Regularly scheduled one hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Sunday, 7:00-8:00 PM.

60 MINUTES II:--Regularly scheduled one hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Tuesday, 9:00-10:00 PM.

SUNDAY EDITION:--Regularly scheduled news interviews. Sunday, 6:00-6:30 AM.

COMMUNITY: Topics in this category include community involvement and civic organizations.
