

WCBS-TV QUARTERLY ISSUES/PROGRAMS LIST - January 10, 2001

Attached are listings of broadcast segments, which in the Station's judgment reflect Channel 2's most significant programming treatment of ascertained community issues during the proceeding three-month period.

Time period in day, day of week, source and, where appropriate, format descriptions follow the first appearance of the broadcast name. Date references refer to broadcast days rather than to calendar days. All times given are approximate.

PROGRAM INDEX

CBS 2 THIS MORNING, AT NOON, FOUR, FIVE, SIX and ELEVEN:-- Regularly scheduled news broadcast focusing on the latest on current issues. Monday-Friday.

CBS 2 "Hometown Hero"--A salute to individuals and organizations whose actions have resulted in a positive influence in the lives of others. Monday-Friday.

CBS 2 "Leaders of Tomorrow"--Special presentations of various length recognizing extraordinary achievements by high school students in the tri-state area. Friday 12Noon and 5:00 PM

FACE THE NATION--Regularly scheduled public affairs broadcast. Sunday, 10:30-11:00 AM.

60 MINUTES:--Regularly scheduled one-hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Sunday, 7:00-8:00 PM.

SUNDAY EDITION:--Regularly scheduled news interviews. Sunday, 6:30-7:00 AM.

CHILDREN AND FAMILY: Topics in this category include special services for children and parenting rights.

CBS 2 AT NOON: 10/19, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how a white couple from Staten Island that gave birth to a black baby due to a fertility clinic mix-up, was denied visitation rights to the child by his biological relatives; CBS 2 AT NOON: 11/7, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how movie theater owners have responded to criticism of violent movies aimed at children and how they are committed to upgrading security in order to keep minors out of "R" and "NC 17" rated movies; 11/24, Correspondent Angela Rae discussed a new seat belt law that would reduce the number of children killed or seriously injured in highway crashes; CBS 2 AT 5:00 PM: 11/25, "Healthwatch" Correspondent Paul Muniz discussed how a new computer tracking chip designed to help sick and missing children, has drawn criticism from some who are skeptical of the government's real intentions for this device; 12/12, Correspondent Stephen Clark discussed how the lives of over one hundred ill children were touched by an hour-long fantasy flight to the North Pole, sponsored by a major airline carrier.

COMMUNITY: Topics in this category includes public demonstration and celebrations.

CBS 2 AT 6:00 PM: 10/9, Correspondent Amanda Grove discussed how the celebration of the annual Hispanic Day Parade was a tribute to the many accomplishments of the Latino community over the years; CBS 2 AT 5:00 PM: 10/10, Chief Long Island Correspondent Jennifer McLogan discussed how some parents of a Long Island community are outraged over the failure of city official to address key community issues such as health concerns and education for their children; CBS 2 AT 4:00 PM: 10/23, Correspondent Aimee Nuzzo discussed how thousands of people protested in Manhattan and across the nation demanding the end to violence and racial profiling by police officers.

CRIME: Topics in this category includes sex offenders and investigations.

CBS 2 AT NOON: 10/19, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how an investigation of a priest who allegedly swindled millions of dollars from a church in Queens, New York has outraged many church goers; 60 MINUTES: 10/29, "Megan's Law," Correspondent Mike Wallace discussed how variations of Megan's law, which requires that communities be notified whenever a convicted sex offender moves into the neighborhood, have been adopted by every state, despite repeated court challenges; CBS2 AT 5:00 PM: 11/22, Correspondent Hazel Sanchez discussed how the group "100 Blacks in Law Enforcement" has offered a reward for the capture of a known felon connected to a series of rapes in Queens, New York; CBS 2 AT 6:00 PM: 12/23, Correspondent Amanda Grove discussed how the shooting of a man on a New Jersey commuter bus after a violent argument has many travelers concerned over passenger safety.

EDUCATION: Topics in this category include new educational programs for city schools.

CBS 2 AT 6:00 PM: 10/17, Correspondent David Diaz discussed how some feel the New York City's bilingual program has failed and suggestions by some community activists to revise the program's goals; CBS 2 AT NOON: 11/28, Correspondent Emily Frances discussed how the Board of Education has suspended a school principal after a predator went on the attack inside an elementary school in Queens, New York; CBS 2 AT 4:00 PM: 12/22, Correspondent Hazel Sanchez discussed how the New York City Board of Education has voted in favor of giving control of several city schools to a private management company.

GAY AND LESBIANS: Topics in this category include rights for homosexuals.

NEWS 2 AT 6:00 PM: 12/4, Correspondent Amanda Grove discussed how local gay and lesbian leaders celebrate the New York City Schools Chancellor's decision to terminate a contract with the Boy Scouts because of alleged discrimination against homosexuals; NEWS 2 THIS MORNING: 12/12, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how lawmakers in Nassau County have decided to add the words "sexual orientation" to the "age", "Gender" and "Disability" provisions in Nassau's human rights law, as a means to end bigotry against gays who apply for government aid.

GOVERNMENT/POLITICS: Topic in this category includes strategies and the campaign promises.

FACE THE NATION: 10/22, "Campaign 2000" New York State Governor George Pataki discussed the abilities of presidential candidates, Texas Governor George W. Bush and Vice-President Al Gore, to lead the nation; 11/5, "Election 2000" New Jersey Senator Robert Torricelli discussed the various possibilities for each political party to control the United States Senate; SUNDAY EDITION: 10/26; New Jersey State Senator Bob Franks and Political Correspondent Marcia Kramer discussed his views on abortion and gun control; 12/8, New York Congressman Anthony Weiner and Political Correspondent Marcia Kramer discussed how he continues to favor the traditional voting ballots and not technological devices, despite the controversy in Florida.

HEALTH: Topics in this category include medical research and new regulations.

60 MINUTES: 11/12, "The MMR Vaccine" Correspondent Ed Bradley discussed a report on the controversy surrounding a study showing a link between autism and the vaccine for measles, mumps and rubella; CBS 2 AT 5:00 PM: 12/2, "Healthwatch," Correspondent Paul Moniz discussed how a study revealing that an estimated forty percent of cancer patients receive under treatment for daily pain provoked a

national movement to require doctors and nurses to inform patients about pain management in out-patient clinics and nursing homes; 12/21, discussed how advocates considered new legislation on the protection of privacy a huge victory for patients rights; 12/27, discussed the nationwide shortage of pharmacists, despite the growing number of new pharmacies, and what some companies are doing in order to meet demand.

TEENAGERS: Topics in this category include drugs and teens.

60 MINUTES: 10/22, "Wall Street Whiz Kid" Correspondent Steve Kroft discussed how a sixteen year-old was able to make close to one million dollars trading stocks over the Internet; 11/3, Correspondent Paul Fleuranges discussed how several computer savvy teens stole thousands of dollars in Metrocards from New York City Transit vending machines; CBS 2 AT 4:00 PM: 11/22, "Healthwatch," Correspondent Paul Moniz discussed how over three million teenagers abuse alcohol in the United States and how researchers say young drinkers may hurt their ability to learn and remember due to an undeveloped brain; CBS 2 AT 5:00 PM: 11/27, Correspondent Aimee Nuzzo discussed how youth counselors are concerned over the growing number of teens who are turning to a popular Club drug known as "Ecstasy"; CBS 2 AT NOON: 12/13, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how New Jersey has raised the legal driving age from 17 to 18 in an attempt to minimize the number of auto accidents caused by young people.
