60 MINUTES II:--Regularly scheduled one-hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Wednesday, 8:00-9:00 PM.

48 HOURS--Regularly scheduled news broadcast. Friday, 10:00-11:00 PM.

SUNDAY EDITION:--Regularly scheduled news interviews. Sunday, 6:30-7:00 AM.

CHILDREN AND FAMILY: Topics in this category includes child safety and families of victims in World Trade Center attack.
