CBS 2 THIS MORNING, AT NOON, FOUR-THIRTY, FIVE, SIX and ELEVEN:-- Regularly scheduled news broadcast focusing on the latest on current issues. Monday-Friday.

60 MINUTES:--Regularly scheduled one-hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Sunday, 7:00-8:00 PM.

60 MINUTES II:--Regularly scheduled one-hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Wednesday, 8:00-9:00 PM.

48 HOURS--Regularly scheduled news broadcast. Friday, 10:00-11:00PM

COMMUNITY: Topics in this category include community involvement and city pride.

60 MINUTES: 10/13, "The End Of The Embargo?" Correspondent Ed Bradley discussed reactions from New Jersey's Cuban community to President George W. Bush's plan to lift the 40-year trade embargo against Cuba; CBS2 NEWS AT 4:30 PM: 10/22, Correspondent Penny Crone discussed how New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg announced that he will not participate in the St. Patrick's Day Parade if organizers object to whomever he invites to march with him; CBS2 NEWS AT NOON: 11/25, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how according to a recent Quinnipiac University poll, eighty-two percent of New Yorkers are proud of the community's response to the World Trade Center attacks; CBS2 NEWS AT 4:30 PM: 12/10, Correspondent Lou Young discussed how New York City Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly attributes the reduction in crime rate to community involvement.
