CBS 2 NEWS AT ELEVEN:-- "Shame On You" - feature of varying lengths focusing on consumer issues, business practices and government services. Thursday, 11:00 PM.

60 MINUTES:--Regularly scheduled one-hour news broadcast featuring detailed interviews and reports of various lengths. Sunday, 7:00-8:00 PM.

SUNDAY EDITION:--Regularly scheduled news interviews. Sunday, 6:30-7:00 AM.

CONSUMERISM: Topics in this category includes recalls and illegal billing practices.
